PHILIPPINES MISSION IMMERSION TRIP

This year, as a parish and school community, we have embarked on a new venture: a mission trip to the Philippines. Seven members of our parish, including three teachers from our parish primary school, were joined by a parishioner from Hoppers Crossing North and spent two weeks learning about how the Body of Christ works in the Philippines.

As it journeys in faith, the Body of Christ / the People of God looks for relevant answers to the questions it faces. Since the questions vary from culture to culture and in different situations, so also the answers provided need to be different. Answers relevant here in Australia, and in our parish, are not necessarily suitable for different areas in the Philippines.

The mission immersion trip provided us with a brief experience during with we could sample and participate in a number of ministries carried out among some who live in great material poverty. Often we were invited to share our love with those around us, challenging us to move out of our comfort zone to meet Christ in the poor we ministered to.

We will have time to talk more about our experience in more detail. Today I would like to thank you all for your prayerful support during our mission. Many parishioners have also supported our experience by donating money towards this initiative. We were also given money raised by the school from a number of fund raising events.

We donated the money raised by the school and the money donated by you parishioners, to the parish that hosted us to help them continue with the many programmes they have undertaken.

THE 'YEAR OF ACCEPTANCE'

At the beginning of his gospel, Luke addresses a certain 'Theophilus,' for whom the work is written. 'Theophilus' which means 'lover of God,' may not be the name of a real person but a symbolic 'stand-in' for the kind of reader Luke has in mind: someone who has received basic instruction but who needs to be confirmed in their Christian identity and conviction of the faith. This Luke intends to provide—not only for readers of his own day but for ours as well.

From this beginning of Luke's work, today's gospel takes us immediately to the Jesus' hometown Nazareth, where he launches his public ministry with a prophetic manifesto in the guise of a Sabbath sermon.

What a remarkably short sermon it is! Jesus reads a longish text from Isaiah, then simply proclaims: 'Today, this text is being fulfilled even as you listen.' End of sermon!

Jesus does not need to say any more. Providing the 'script' for his ministry, the text itself contains so much: good news for the poor, freedom for captives, sight for the blind, a 'year of the Lord's favour' (or 'acceptance.')

The 'year of acceptance' proclaims a time of unconditional release from all 'debt' of sin. This 'year' will prevail throughout the personal ministry of Jesus. Then, following his death, resurrection, and ascension, the Spirit will empower the Church at Pentecost to proclaim it to the end of time.

We still live within the scope of that 'year.' The great 'Today ...' of his brief sermon should resound in every sermon today.

FIRST READING

Nehemiah 8:2-6. 8-10

Ezra the priest brought the Law before the assembly, consisting of men, women, and children old enough to understand. This was the first day of the seventh month. On the square before the Water Gate, in the presence of the men and women, and children old enough to understand, he read from the book from early morning till noon; all the people listened attentively to the Book of the Law.

Ezra the scribe stood on a wooden dais erected for the purpose. In full view of all the people – since he stood higher than all the people – Ezra opened the book; and when he opened it all the people stood up. Then Ezra blessed the Lord, the great God, and all the people raised their hands and answered Amen! Amen!; then they bowed down and, face to the ground, prostrated themselves before the Lord. And Ezra read from the Law of God, translating and giving the sense, so that the people understood what was read.

Then Nehemiah – His Excellency – and Ezra, priest and scribe (and the Levites who were instructing the people) said to all the people, 'This day is sacred to the Lord your God. Do not be mournful, do not weep'. For the people were all in tears as they listened to the words of the Law.

He then said, 'Go, eat the fat, drink the sweet wine, and send a portion to the man who has nothing prepared ready. For this day is sacred to our Lord. Do not be sad: the joy of the Lord is your stronghold.'

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

TOGETHER: Your words, Lord, are spirit and life.

The law of the Lord is perfect, it revives the soul. The rule of the Lord is to be trusted, it gives wisdom to the simple.

TOGETHER: Your words, Lord, are spirit and life.

SECOND READING 1 Corinthians 12:12-30

Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink.

Nor is the body to be identified with any one of its many parts. If the foot were to say, 'I am not a hand and so I do not belong to the body', would that mean that it stopped being part of the body? If the ear were to say, 'I am not an eye, and so I do not belong to the body', would that mean

that it was not a part of the body? If your whole body was just one eye, how would you hear anything? If it was just one ear, how would you smell anything?

Instead of that, God put all the separate parts into the body on purpose. If all the parts were the same, how could it be a body? As it is, the parts are many but the body is one. The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I do not need you', nor can the head say to the feet, 'I do not need you.'

What is more, it is precisely the parts of the body that seem to be the weakest which are the indispensable ones; and it is the least honourable parts of the body that we clothe with the greatest care. So our more improper parts get decorated in a way that our more proper parts do not need. God has arranged the body so that more dignity is given to the parts which are without it, and that there may not be disagreements inside the body, but that each part may be equally concerned for all the others. If one part is hurt, all parts are hurt with it. If one part is given special honour, all parts enjoy it.

Now you together are Christ's body; but each of you is a different part of it. In the Church, God has given the first place to apostles, the second to prophets, the third to teachers; after them, miracles, and after them the gift of healing; helpers, good leaders, those with many languages. Are all of them apostles, or all of them prophets, or all of them teachers? Do they all have the gift of miracles, or all have the gift of healing? Do all speak strange languages, and all interpret them?

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! The Lord sent me to bring Good News to the poor. Alleluia!

GOSPEL Luke 1:1-4. 4:14-21

Seeing that many others have undertaken to draw up accounts of the events that have taken place among us, exactly as these were handed down to us by those who from the outset were eyewitnesses and ministers of the word, I in my turn, after carefully going over the whole story from the beginning, have decided to write an ordered account for you, Theophilus, so that your Excellency may learn how well founded the teaching is that you have received.

Jesus, with the power of the Spirit in him, returned to Galilee; and his reputation spread throughout the countryside. He taught in their synagogues and everyone praised him. He came to Nazara, where he had been brought up, and went into the synagogue on the sabbath day as he usually did. He stood up to read, and they handed him the scroll of the prophet Isaiah. Unrolling the scroll he found the place where it is written: The spirit of the Lord has been given to me, for he has anointed me. He has sent me to bring the good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives and to the blind new sight, to set the downtrodden free, to proclaim the Lord's year of favour. He then rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the assistant and sat down. And all eyes in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to speak to them, 'This text is being fulfilled today even as you listen.'

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
