FORMATION THROUGH MUSIC!

I will continue sharing about our Mission Immersion experience in the Philippines earlier this year. A large part of our experience was spent at St Catherine of Alexandria parish, in Dinalupihan, Bataan Province, north of Manila.

Parish life in provincial Philippines is very different from the corresponding reality in Australia. St Catherine's parish, made up of five barangay (villages), is in a very poor part of the province. Most people work in the rice fields, which means that work and income are very unpredictable. This forces many to leave the province to look for work overseas, leaving wife and children behind.

Part of the life of the parish is to try to break this cycle of poverty by offering religious and academic formation. Each barangay has its own primary school, and there is one regional high school in the area; so the parish offers music as an alternative type of formation.

Instead of roaming the streets, each day, after school, many of the children go to the parish Mass and then on to the parish grounds where they practice their musical instruments. What started as a small folk band with a few guitars and mandarins, is now an eighty strong youth orchestra that proudly gives public performances.

The Jose De Piro Kabataan (youth) Orkestra gives these poor young children something to look forward to. They grow in confidence and are being given an alternative to rely on as they build their future. For the St Catherine parish to run this programme, providing free musical instruments and free tuition, requires a large amount of financial support. This is where some of our financial contributions that we took up with us have been invested—to help give a future to children who otherwise would have no future!

THE CHALLENGE OF CONVERSION

Today's gospel gives us the second act, so to speak, of Jesus' visit to his hometown, Nazareth.

At first, the reaction of his townsfolk is favourable. They are 'astonished at the gracious words that came from his lips.' But their comment, 'This is Joseph's son, surely?' disturbs him. It shows misunderstanding of his status and mission. He begins to challenge them, citing biblical precedents (the prophetic careers of Elijah and Elisha) for a wide-ranging mission. The scene turns ugly and ends with an unsuccessful attempt to lynch him. Why does it all so suddenly go wrong?

As a gospel writer Luke is very concerned to depict human response to the message of Jesus and to probe the reasons that led so many to reject it. The message requires conversion at depth. When the Nazarenes say, 'Isn't this Joseph's son?' they are simply putting Jesus back in a box with which they are comfortable and keeping him for themselves. They show no real sense of who he really is (God's Son) or any grasp of the inclusive scope of the programme he has announced. The reason Jesus responds so aggressively is to bring their deepest thoughts to the surface and make them confront their narrowness.

The gospel illustrates the potential for violence that lies in every human heart when the limits of comfort and convention are challenged. The threat to his life that Jesus experiences in Nazareth will become an actuality later in Jerusalem. But there too, in resurrection and ascension, he will 'pass through the midst and go on his way.'

In the days of Josiah, the word of the Lord was addressed to me, saying, 'Before I formed you in the womb I knew you; before you came to birth I consecrated you; I have appointed you as prophet to the nations. So now brace yourself for action. Stand up and tell them all I command you. Do not be dismayed at their presence, or in their presence I will make you dismayed. I, for my part, today will make you into a fortified city, a pillar of iron, and a wall of bronze to confront all this land: the kings of Judah, its princes, its priests and the country people. They will fight against you but shall not overcome you, for I am with you to deliver you – it is the Lord who speaks.'

SECOND READING 1 Corinthians 12:31 – 13:13

Be ambitious for the higher gifts. And I am going to show you a way that is better than any of them.

If I have all the eloquence of men or of angels, but speak without love, I am simply a gong booming or a cymbal clashing. If I have the gift of prophecy, understanding all the mysteries there are, and knowing everything, and if I have faith in all its fullness, to move mountains, but without love, then I am nothing at all. If I give away all that I possess, piece by piece, and if I even let them take my body to burn it, but am without love, it will do me no good whatever.

Love is always patient and kind; it is never jealous; love is never boastful or conceited; it is never rude or selfish; it does not take offence, and is not resentful. Love takes no pleasure in other people's sins but delights in the truth; it is always ready to excuse, to trust, to hope, and to endure whatever comes.

Love does not come to an end. But if there are gifts of prophecy, the time will come when they must fail; or the gift of languages, it will not continue for ever; and knowledge – for this, too, the time will come when it must fail. For our knowledge is imperfect and our prophesying is imperfect; but once perfection comes, all imperfect things will disappear. When I was a child, I used to talk like a child, and think like a child, and argue like a child, but now I am a man, all childish ways are put behind me. Now we are seeing a dim reflection in a mirror; but then we shall be seeing face to face. The knowledge that I have now is imperfect; but then I shall know as fully as I am known.

In short, there are three things that last: faith, hope and love; and the greatest of these is love.
