A LETTER REGARDING THE NEWS OF CARDINAL PELL'S CONVICTION

Tuesday 26th February 2019

Dear Parishioners

As I sit down to try to put a few thoughts together, I am still trying to gather myself after hearing the shocking news made public this morning. It is true that through the international media many had been aware of Cardinal Pell's conviction last December, yet I was not prepared for its publication today.

Since there is an appeal pending, not much can be said at this stage, as we wait for justice to take its full course. For those in our community who have personally experienced abuse, this news once again opens up old wounds. I empathise with all abuse victims and their families, and pray for them that they might be able to find some healing. If I can be of any assistance in offering a space where stories of abuse can be shared, I am happy to make myself available.

For Catholics, Cardinal Pell has not just been one of us, but also one of our leaders. We have heard of Cardinal Pell being accused of knowing about abuse by priests and not acting to prevent it, but today's news has taken things to another level. Another one of our church leaders has been found guilty of sexual abuse against minors. Once again this gives rise to feelings of mistrust in the church we form part of. Can we still trust this institution which for so long has been so dear to us?

I have to admit I do not have an answer to these questions, I am struggling to make sense of things that are happening around us.

Allow me to humbly go back to a theme I have reflected upon a number of times. I still believe in a God of love as revealed to us in Jesus Christ, and I am very sure that my God is very angry at the abuse that has been carried out in his name. I am also aware that many of my sisters and brothers too hold on to their faith. This faith we all share is the bedrock of our community. As I struggle to make sense of what is happening around us, I still offer to be of service, as best as I can, to this community of faith.

I try to avoid to use the term 'church' and instead use more scriptural terms as 'Body of Christ,' 'People of God,' or 'community of faith.' I find it helpful to distinguish between our faith community and the institution that has been shown to be guilty of abuse.

I offer this reflection to you in the hope that it may help you make sense of events.

When this perishable nature has put on imperishability, and when this mortal nature has put on immortality, then the words of scripture will come true: Death is swallowed up in victory. Death, where is your victory? Death, where is your sting? Now the sting of death is sin, and sin gets its power from the Law. So let us thank God for giving us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Never give in then, my dear brothers, never admit defeat; keep on working at the Lord's work always, knowing that, in the Lord, you cannot be labouring in vain.

Jesus told a parable to his disciples, 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit?

The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own

eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

'There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'

REMOVING THE PLANK

I lived once with a senior priest who was rather prone to correcting the faults of others and putting them right when he thought they had got things wrong. Asked once by a younger member of the community whether he had ever been wrong himself, he replied: 'Just once—when I thought I had made a mistake but then discovered that I had been right all along!'

That man did a lot of good work over a long life. But perhaps he had not reflected on Jesus' words in today's Gospel today as much as he did on other parts of scripture.

The illustrations to which Jesus appeals—one blind person leading another; attempting to remove the splinter in a neighbour's eye when one has a plank in one's own—are exaggerated and humorous. The original hearers probably fell about laughing. It seems that Jesus often appealed to images like these in order to penetrate people's defences and get them to think. It is hard enough to know what is in one's own heart—to recognise the 'plank' that may be there, inhibiting right vision and accurate judgment. Yet, even so, we are still confident that we can see and so we set about commenting upon and seeking to root out the failings of others.

If God, who really does see the heart, acts with such generosity, understanding and compassion, then that—not judgment and condemnation—should surely be the model for human interaction.

Jesus' final image in the gospel invites us to ask Shine on the world like bright stars; you are offering it what our thoughts, words and actions say about our own hearts.
