Dear Parishioners, Friends and Visitors,

'A PENTECOST MOMENT!'

Last Saturday, at the Mercedes Hogan Performing Arts Theatre, Our Lady of Mercy College, we were treated to an excellent concert by the Jose De Piro Kabataan (youth) Orkestra that visited us from Dinalupihan, Bataan, in the Philippines.

Fr Joe Cremona, the parish priest who came up with the idea of this youth orchestra, explains that this is 'formation through music.' 'While it is good to promote professional musicians, it is much better to create musicians with human and Christian values.

Fr Joe carries out his ministry in a very poor area of the Philippines where the young people had no future. He started by turning his parish into a 'youth centre' welcoming children and providing them with a safe space.

When a guitar player visited the mission, he started teaching the children how to play music. This developed first into a folk band and then into the fully fledged youth orchestra that we were treated to.

The fast pace at which this development happened showed how important all this was for the children, giving them a new perspective and a new hope in life. Fr Joe insists that music is only the medium. While they participate in the centre, they also have to take part in programmes of Christian formation. Fr Joe also supports their families in their needs.

Pope Francis has once again brought mission and the preaching of the gospel to the forefront of the ministry of the Church. The preaching of the gospel is delivered in many shapes. This model used by Fr Joe is certainly one very valid way of spreading the good news in a very poor and financially disadvantaged region of the Philippines.

Since January 2017, as a parish, we have been supporting the education of these children through our monthly Gold Coin Collection. During the concert last Saturday, I presented Fr Joe with a cheque to the amount of \$6,847 representing the amount collected in 2018. Thank you for your generosity.

Fr Joe has also asked for any second hand instruments that could be donated for this cause. Two parishioners have already donated a violin and a flute. These will certainly be put to very good use. Thank you.

FIRST READING

Melchizedek king of Salem brought bread and wine; he was a priest of God Most High. He pronounced this blessing:

'Blessed be Abraham by God Most High, creator of heaven and earth, and blessed be God Most High for handing over your enemies to you.' And Abraham gave him a tithe of everything.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Psalm 109: 1-4

TOGETHER: You are a priest for ever, in the line of Melchizedek.

LEFT SIDE

The Lord's revelation to my Master: 'Sit on my right: I will put your foes beneath your feet.'

RIGHT SIDE

The Lord will send from Zion your sceptre of power: rule in the midst of all your foes.

LEFT SIDE

A prince from the day of your birth on the holy mountains; from the womb before the daybreak I begot you

RIGHT SIDE

The Lord has sworn an oath he will not change. 'You are a priest for ever, a priest like Melchizedek of old.'

TOGETHER: You are a priest for ever in the line of Melchizedek.

SECOND READING

Corinthians 11:23-26

This is what I received from the Lord, and in turn passed on to you: that on the same night that he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took some bread, and thanked God for it and broke it, and he said, 'This is my body, which is for you; do this as a memorial of me.' In the same way he took the cup after supper, and said, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Whenever you drink it, do this as a memorial of me.' Until the Lord comes, therefore, every time you eat this bread and drink this cup, you are proclaiming to his death.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! I am the living bread from heaven, says the Lord; whoever eats this bread will live for ever. Alleluia Jesus made the crowds welcome and talked to them about the kingdom of God; and he cured those who were in need of healing.

It was late afternoon when the Twelve came to him and said, 'Send the people away, and they can go to the villages and farms round about to find lodging and food; for we are in a lonely place here.' He replied, 'Give them something to eat yourselves.' But they said, 'We have no more than five loaves and two fish, unless we are to go ourselves and buy food for all these people.' For there were about five thousand men. But he said to his disciples, 'Get them to sit down in parties of about fifty.' They did so and made them all sit down. Then he took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven, and said the blessing over them; then he broke them and handed them to his disciples to distribute among the crowd. They all ate as much as they wanted, and when the scraps remaining were collected they filled twelve baskets.

CELEBRATING THE HOSPITALITY OF GOD

The gospel for today's feast very appropriately tells of the divine hospitality Jesus provided for thousands of people, multiplying loaves and fishes to feed them (Luke 9:11-17).

The twelve apostles, genuinely concerned, for the crowd, make a practical suggestion. Send the people away to find food and lodging for the night. Jesus throws back the challenge: '*You* provide them with food.' They are aghast. In human terms hospitality on such a scale is impossible. But Jesus is going to make them ministers of the hospitality of God.

The people are made to sit down in groups—a clear signal that they are about to be fed. Then, invoking heaven (to show the divine source), blessing and breaking the loaves and fishes (the language has clear Eucharistic echoes), Jesus miraculously makes it possible for the Twelve to feed the entire crowd—not merely adequately but so abundantly that even after all had eaten each of the Twelve has a full basket of broken pieces left over. God is never niggardly in hospitality; on the contrary, overflowing abundance is its mark.

It is significant that in the supply of food Jesus himself does not deal directly with the crowd. He leaves the distribution entirely to the disciples. He is apprenticing them to be ministers of God's hospitality themselves when, after his ascension, he is physically removed from the scene. In this way the episode foreshadows the Christian Eucharist, the rite in which the Church will experience and celebrate God's hospitality as a foretaste of the banquet of the Kingdom.
