Dear Parishioners, Visitors and Friends,

This week I return from my annual leave to enter the seventh year of our faith journey together. Once again I thank you for welcoming me into your families and your community, allowing me to celebrate your faith and those special moments in your family life. The main feature of my time away this year was a visit to Perth and to Margaret River, very nice and quiet places to be in. I also managed to visit the small paradise in Rottnest island! It was a beautiful restful time.

One Sunday, while I was away, as we celebrated Sunday Mass, the main celebrant looked at us and welcomed: good morning Church! What a beautiful expression, full of meaning. A constant reminder that we are the Church, the community of faith. When we refer to the Church, the Body of Christ, the People of God, community of faith we do not look beyond ourselves, but rather within. You and I, we are the Church of Christ in Heidelberg, we celebrate, eat and become Body of Christ for all around us.

This is not an easy message to proclaim or to witness to. It has never been easy to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ. Christ warned his disciples that he had come to bring not peace, but division. Families will be divided for and against Christ and his gospel. As Christians we are invited to take up the cross every day and follow him. Christ's cross was not a decorative, light plastic cross, but a rough piece of timber, full of splinters!

Over the past six years we have witnessed the landscape of our faith shift from under our feet. The 'Holy' Church we have come to know and love has now shown itself to be a sinful Church. I have often written and spoken about this reality and I understand that some among us may be tired of hearing about this very painful reality, but unfortunately for all of us, this dreadful reality is not going away and we might need to learn to live in the painful messiness of this time.

My role is not to judge, much less to condemn, but to speak God's love and mercy. Every time I hear about the many crimes committed by those who have been entrusted to look after our beautiful vulnerable children, my stomach churns; I feel sick at the knowledge of all that has been going on around us in the name of our 'Holy' Church.

I do not write asking you to feel sorry for me, but I feel the need to share with the family of God around me, how all this effects me as I decide and choose to continue to offer my poor ministry within this community of faith. As much as it is within my power, I apologise for the sins of those who should have known much better than to abuse those entrusted to their care. I pray that we as a poor, sinful, humbled Church may one day find healing. I reach out to the many among us who feel hurt by the actions of many in our midst.

At times I feel helpless, as if this great tragedy has taken away my voice. I realise that we can no longer speak with authority, since we have gravely abused the trust that was given us. Someone challenged me to reflect on why do I stay on in my ministry. My response is that I choose and decide to stay, as long as there are people who want to continue to be people of faith and journey as a community.

that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even came and licked his sores. Now the poor man died and was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried. 'In his torment in Hades he looked up and saw Abraham a long way off with Lazarus in his bosom. So he cried out, "Father Abraham, pity me and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am in agony in these flames." "My son," Abraham replied "remember that during your life good things come your way, just as bad things came the way of Lazarus. Now he is being comforted here while you are in agony. But that is not all: between us and you a great gulf has been fixed, to stop anyone, if he wanted to, crossing from our side to yours, and to stop any crossing from your side to ours." 'The rich man replied, "Father, I beg you then to send Lazarus to my father's house, since I have five brothers, to give them warning, so that they do not come to this place of torment too." "They have Moses and the prophets," said Abraham "let them listen to them." "Ah no, father Abraham," said the rich man "but if someone comes to them from the dead, they will repent." Then Abraham said to him, "If they will not listen either to Moses or to the prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone should rise from

day. And at his gate there lay a poor man called Lazarus,

the dead."'

In the parable about the rich man and the beggar, Lazarus, we should not assume that the rich man was notably wicked. It was more that, absorbed in his comfortable life, he did not notice the poor beggar lying in need at his door. Likewise, we are not told that Lazarus was notably virtuous or deserving. It was his desperate situation that attracted the attention of God.

The action of the story swings upon the notion of a great reversal. The reversal occurs when both men die and go very different ways. The rich man is carted off to Hades, while Lazarus is gently conveyed (by angels) to the bosom of Abraham. (Such 'destinations' reflect images of the afterlife conventional at the time; the parable does not teach the existence of a fiery hell!). The point of the story is that, across the change from this life to the next, situations remain fixed. In this life, the rich man's indifference meant that no crumb of comfort passed from his table to the beggar outside; there was no 'crossing over' from one side to another. Now, in the afterlife situation exactly the same fixity prevails—except that now all is reversed. The problem is not so much the rich man's wealth in itself but the fact that his high living blinded the him to the need of a fellow human being, and wider social responsibility. The opportunity to attend to such obligations though will not last for ever. Ultimately, the parable is about conversion and the difficulty that riches put in its way.
