Dear Parishioners, Visitors and Friends,

In the past few weeks, reading through the gospel according to Luke at our Sunday Masses, we came across two very important gospel passages. We reflected on the parables of mercy where Jesus talks about those who are lost and the great celebration that happens when they are found; great news as we encounter a God of infinite love and mercy. Moreover Jesus also warned his disciples that he came not to bring peace but division. The question is how to hold both these, and many other gospel passages, in equal balance in our life of faith.

When we gather each Sunday we come together as a faith community to eat and be nourished by the word of God and the food of the Eucharist. We come bringing with us our whole life. As Christians we invite God to influence the whole of our being, each action we take—family life, culture, politics, leisure and all other aspects we participate in. God invites us to place him in the first place, and everything else follows. The question will always be how to listen to God's word and live as a mature citizen in Australia and in the world today.

We often meet people who want to separate God from the world; separate the spiritual and material. This is not the gospel Christ preached. Jesus tells us that whoever is not ready to shoulder the cross and follow him, is not worthy of being called a Christian.

Some people claim to be people of faith, listening to the gospel message and eating of the Eucharist, and yet are not ready to let their faith influence other aspects of life. Sociology, psychology, science, politics and many other areas of life inform us on how to understand humanity and the world we live in. Topics like abuse, violence, crime, family life, education, migrants, refugees, racism, reconciliation, ecology and many other hot topics need to be discussed and studied through a variety of lenses and perspectives. We as intelligent and mature citizens of world and of our country are invited to listen to the different voices and decide where we stand on these many different issues.

It has become fashionable in today's world, to accept the different voices but deny a voice to people of faith. We find it difficult to see how the word of God can contribute to the discussion about to the different issues we encounter today. Yes, I understand that in some aspects, a number of faith leaders have gravely abused their position, yet the word of God remains alive and active in our midst and, as people of faith, we need to add our faith relationship to the many other voices that we have come to recognise and listen to.

When we talk about abuse, violence, crime, family life, education, migrants, refugees, racism, reconciliation, ecology and the whole range of different topics, after listening to the different voices, we also need to ask ourselves 'how does the word of God inform us about these topics today? What does my faith lead me to today? How can I be a person of faith and a good citizen?

The moment I protest when I hear a person of faith open God's word and reflect on the different issues in today's world, then I know that I am closing myself to God's life within me. This is what Jesus meant when he said he came not to bring peace but division; his word is a word that challenges us and often divides us.

Habakkuk 1:2-3; 2:2-4

How long, Lord, am I to cry for help while you will not listen; to cry 'Oppression!' in your ear and you will not save? Why do you set injustice before me, why do you look on where there is tyranny? Outrage and violence, this is all I see, all is contention, and discord flourishes. Then the Lord answered and said, 'Write the vision down, inscribe it on tablets to be easily read, since this vision is for its own time only: eager for its own fulfilment, it does not deceive; if it comes slowly, wait, for come it will, without fail. See how he flags, he whose soul is not at rights, but the upright man will live by his faithfulness.'

TOGETHER: If today you hear his voice, harden not your

LEFT SIDE

Come, ring out our joy to the Lord; hail the rock who saves us. Let us come before him, giving thanks, with songs let us hail the Lord.

RIGHT SIDE

Come in; let us bow and bend low; let us kneel before the God who made us for he is our God and we the people who belong to his pasture, the flock that is led by his hand.

LEFT SIDE

O that today you would listen to his voice! 'Harden not your hearts as at Meribah, as on that day at Massah in the desert when your fathers put me to the test; when they tried me, though they saw my work.'

TOGETHER: If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts.

SECOND READING

2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14

I am reminding you to fan into a flame the gift that God gave you when I laid my hands on you. God's gift was not a spirit of timidity, but the Spirit of power, and love, and self -control. So you are never to be ashamed of witnessing to the Lord, or ashamed of me for being his prisoner; but with me, bear the hardships for the sake of the Good News, relying on the power of God.

Keep as your pattern the sound teaching you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. You have been trusted to look after something precious; guard it with the help of the Holy Spirit who lives in us.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! The word of the Lord stands for ever;

it is the word given to you, the Good News. Alleluia!

GOSPEL

Luke 17:5-10

The apostles said to the Lord, 'Increase our faith.' The Lord replied, 'Were your faith the size of a mustard seed you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea", and it would obey you.

'Which of you, with a servant ploughing or minding sheep, would say to him when he returned from the fields, "Come and have your meal immediately"? Would he not be more likely to say, "Get my supper laid; make yourself tidy and wait on me while I eat and drink. You can eat and drink yourself afterwards"? Must he be grateful to the servant for doing what he was told? So with you: when you have done all you have been told to do, say, "We are merely servants: we have done no more than our duty.""

FAITH AND GRATEFUL SERVICE

Today's gospel falls into two distinct parts. First, the apostles ask Jesus to increase their faith. Jesus' response does not imply that the disciples have no faith. His point seems to be that the little faith they have is enough to work miracles if only they exploited its possibilities to the full.

As so often, Jesus employs everyday images—not without a touch of exaggeration— to drive home the point. On the one hand, a mustard seed is proverbially small. On the other hand, the extensive root system of the mulberry tree makes it notoriously difficult to uproot. Yet a word proceeding from a tiny amount of faith could bring about this effect. It is people of faith who channel God's power into the world.

In the second part of the gospel we might find offputting both the image of slavery and, even more, the suggestion that God regards us as 'worthless slaves' who deserve no gratitude whatsoever.

Jesus draws upon an aspect of life familiar to his audience (slavery) without necessarily approving of it. His point is that we should not serve God in the hope of gaining payment or due reward. That would amount to the kind of 'merit' mentality that St Paul, in particular, excluded. Long before we do any good work ourselves, our faith should make us conscious of the immense benefits we have already received from God. Our Christian service, then, will be an expression of faith and love, motivated by abiding gratitude for all God has done for us.
