Dear Parishioners, Visitors and Friends,

THE KINGDOM OF HEAVEN

October is the month of evangelisation. This year Pope Francis invited us to celebrate a special missionary month of prayer, reminding us that we all have a mission. Our mission is to preach the good news and to help grow the People of God.

I suggest that November is the month of the Community of Faith. It is the month when we are invited to remember the members of the Body of Christ who are already in the fullness of God's glory, those in the process of being purified and we who are still on the journey here on earth.

Many times during the year we are invited to celebrate the lives of saints. I like to refer to the saints as our sisters and brothers in the faith. Like us, they have been called, baptised and sent to be light to the world and salt of the earth. We are invited to look at the saints and reflect on how they lived their faith and their discipleship of Jesus so that, like them, we may also learn to follow Jesus more faithfully.

On the first day of the month of November, we are invited to celebrate one feast day for all our sisters and brothers who are saints; those who have reached the fullness of their glory in God. We are created in the image and likeness of God, we are given the life of God, and we are invited to become part of the kingdom of God, in a limited way here on earth, and in its fullness in heaven. Paul says that here we see things as in a reflection, as if in a mirror; but then the mirror will shatter, and we will be able to see God as he really is!

On All Saints' Day we do not only celebrate those saints who have been officially declared to be so, but also the great multitude of faithful believers who also walked their journey faithfully and are now in the fullness of God's glory. Among these I recognise relatives and friends who have lived a good and holy life. The prophet Isaiah says that on the holy mountain, an image of heaven, God holds a banquet feast of rich foods and fine wines. At this banquet sit God with his angels and all our sisters and brothers who are in his presence. When we come to eat and drink the Body and Blood of Christ, we sit at this same banquet with God and all his saints, and our relatives and friends.

On the second day of November, and to a certain extent throughout the month of November, we remember those of us who have run their race and are waiting to be washed clean. The truth is that God has saved us and has forgiven us all our sins, but we are still sinful human beings. If we take a white cloth and wash it in bleach, it might look clean in our eyes; but when we put it up against the sun, we will probably still see traces of old stains. Similarly, through the sacraments, we are reconciled with God and we try our best to live a holy life, yet we are never perfect. What looks clean in our eyes looks terrible when compared to the brightest light that is God. The embarrassment we feel when we realise how stained we really are is a good image of purgatory. We all need this space where we can let God clean us; perhaps a time when our sinful eyes can get accustomed to the bright light that is God. If it is painful to look directly at the sun, a created being, how much more painful will it be to face God in all his brilliance.

Let us support, in our prayers, our sisters and brothers in their process of being cleansed.

To turn now, brothers, to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and how we shall all be gathered round him: please do not get excited too soon or alarmed by any prediction or rumour or any letter claiming to come from us, implying that the Day of the Lord has already arrived.

GOSPEL Luke 19:1-10

Jesus entered Jericho and was going through the town when a man whose name was Zacchaeus made his appearance; he was one of the senior tax collectors and a wealthy man. He was anxious to see what kind of man Jesus was, but he was too short and could not see him for the crowd; so he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to catch a glimpse of Jesus who was to pass that way. When Jesus reached the spot he looked up and spoke to him: 'Zacchaeus, come down. Hurry, because I must stay at your house today.' And he hurried down and welcomed him joyfully. They all complained when they saw what was happening. 'He has gone to stay at a sinner's house' they said. But Zacchaeus stood his ground and said to the Lord, 'Look, sir, I am going to give half my property to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody I will pay him back four times the amount.' And Jesus said to him, 'Today salvation has come to this house, because this man too is a son of Abraham; for the Son of Man has come to seek out and save what was lost.'

THE CHALLENGE OF INCLUSION

The chief tax collector, Zacchaeus, faces a double barrier in his attempt to see Jesus. He is too small of stature to see over the crowd and, as one who plies a despised and resented occupation, no one is going to make way for him. So, like a curious youngster, he climbs a tree.

It is hard not to see a comic touch when Jesus stands beneath the tree and bids Zacchaeus to come down and be his host that day.

But the tax collector's hospitality to Jesus, while a great joy for him, soon becomes a problem for everyone else. They mutter and murmur: "He has gone to stay at a sinner's house."

Sinner or not, Zacchaeus declares a policy of extravagant generosity: half of his wealth will go to the poor and anyone defrauded will receive compensation four-fold.

This draws from Jesus a truly memorable declaration: "Today salvation has come to this house." What Zacchaeus has experienced amounts to a virtual 'definition' of salvation: the joy of being found by the Lord, conversion of heart, transformation of life, and inclusion within the community ('this man too is a son of Abraham').

But what of the crowd? The inclusion of the tax collector in the community demands conversion of them as well. Are *they* also transformed? We do not know. Here is where the episode holds out a wider challenge. Salvation is not just about Jesus' kindness to individuals. It has a social dimension as well. Are we comfortable with all who Jesus wants to include in the community of the Kingdom?
