Dear Parishioners, Visitors and Friends,

'Who am I to judge?' (Pope Francis 2013)

On the last two Sundays, 27th October and 3rd November, we had two interesting gospel parallel readings where one of the characters chose to play the part of God and judge the sinner.

In the first case we had the parable of the 'holy' Pharisee, who boasts in front of God that he obeys all the precepts of the Law, while putting down the tax-collector standing behind him. In this case Jesus points out that the sinner goes back home reconciled with God, not the Pharisee.

Last Sunday we had the story of another tax-collector, Zacchaeus, who is marginalised by the community because of his role in the socio-political system. When Jesus goes to eat with Zacchaeus, the crowds are disgusted, because he has chosen to share life with a sinner!

The 'holy' Pharisee and the crowd around Jesus, while outwardly doing what the Law expects of them, have not listened to the message of the good news with their hearts. The first message of Jesus is not Law but mercy. When Pope Francis was asked whether there was conflict between truth and mercy, or doctrine and mercy, the pope responded: "I will say this: mercy is real; it is the first attribute of God.... Theological reflections on doctrine or mercy may then follow, but let us not forget that mercy is doctrine. Even so, I love saying: mercy is true." (Pope Francis quoted in 'The Name of God is Mercy,' 2017)

It is very easy to slip into the mistake of the Pharisee and of the crowd; we want to do God a favour and judge our sisters and brothers before he can get to it himself. What we do not understand is that God is not a human judge but a divine God. While God created us in his own image and likeness, we feel we can return him the favour by investing him with human qualities.

A human judge has the duty to judge according to written law; the human judge cannot see beyond the surface and can only judge according to what is seen and guided by agreed written law. God sees what is hidden from our human eyes. God can see beyond human behavior into deeper human intentions and human 'handicaps.' Moreover, while we think we are doing God a favour by sticking to the written law, God uses the higher measure of mercy when he looks at our actions. In his justice, God applies mercy, love and forgiveness before any written law.

Only God is all holy and perfect; we are all sinners in need of God's love, mercy and forgiveness. We all need to be thankful that God does not start from the written law but from mercy and love. In the gospel Jesus warns us: "Do not judge, so that you may not be judged. For with the judgment you make you will be judged, and the measure you give will be the measure you get." (Mt 7:1-2)

Behind every sinner, there is a human person in the image and likeness of God. Behind every divorced and remarried person, every person who commits adultery, every drug addict, illegal immigrant, homosexual, murderer or any type of sinful activity, there is an image of God. While we cannot approve of the act, our Christian faith asks us to support the sinner. Through our respect and love for the human person, the sinner may even return to God!

2 Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14

There were seven brothers who were arrested with their mother. The king tried to force them to taste pig's flesh, which the Law forbids, by torturing them with whips and scourges. One of them, acting as spokesman for the others, said, 'What are you trying to find out from us? We are prepared to die rather than break the Law of our ancestors.' With his last breath the second brother exclaimed, 'Inhuman fiend, you may discharge us from this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up, since it is for his laws that we die, to live again for ever.'

After him, they amused themselves with the third, who on being asked for his tongue promptly thrust it out and held out his hands, with these honourable words, 'It was heaven that gave me these limbs; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again.' The king and his attendants were astounded at the young man's courage and his utter indifference to suffering.

When this one was dead they subjected the fourth to the same savage torture. When he neared his end he cried, 'Ours is the better choice, to meet death at men's hands, yet relying on God's promise that we shall be raised up by him; whereas for you there can be no resurrection, no new life.'

2 Thessalonians 2:16-3:5

May our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God our Father who has given us his love and, through his grace, such inexhaustible comfort and such sure hope, comfort you and strengthen you in everything good that you do or say.

Finally, brothers, pray for us; pray that the Lord's message may spread quickly, and be received with honour as it was among you; and pray that we may be preserved from the interference of bigoted and evil people, for faith is not given to everyone. But the Lord is faithful, and he will give you strength and guard you from the evil one, and we, in the Lord, have every confidence that you are doing and will go on doing all that we tell you. May the Lord turn your hearts towards the love of God and the fortitude of Christ.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia!

Jesus Christ is the firstborn of the dead; glory and kingship be his for ever and ever. Alleluia!

GOSPEL Luke 20:27-38

Some Sadducees — those who say that there is no resurrection — approached Jesus and they put this question to him, 'Master, we have it from Moses in writing, that if a man's married brother dies childless, the man must marry the widow to raise up children for his brother. Well, then, there were seven brothers. The first, having married a wife, died childless. The second and then the third married the widow. And the same with all seven, they died leaving no children. Finally the woman herself died. Now, at the resurrection, to which of them will she be wife since she had been married to all seven?'

Jesus replied, 'The children of this world take wives and husbands, but those who are judged worthy of a place in the other world and in the resurrection from the dead do not marry because they can no longer die, for they are the same as the angels, and being children of the resurrection they are sons of God. And Moses himself implies that the dead rise again, in the passage about the bush where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is God, not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all men are in fact alive.'

GOD IS A GOD OF LIFE

In today's gospel, Jesus is challenged by some Sadducees, a Jewish sect one of whose key tenets is the denial of resurrection. The quibble they employ to make belief in resurrection ridiculous stems from the prescription of the Mosaic Law by which a man is required to raise up offspring for a brother who dies childless (Deut 25:5-6). The quibble rests upon a crass assumption that life after death is simply an extension of life in the present time. In his response, Jesus clarifies the matter. Firstly, in the case of the risen life, we are dealing with a totally new situation. Those who share in it enjoy immunity to death. Since they die no more, there is no need for procreation—nor, correspondingly, for marriage, the institution designed to supply it.

Secondly, the Sadducees' quibble trivialises both the nature of God and human relationship with God. The God who appeared to Moses at the burning bush (see Exod 3:6), did not say 'I was the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob,' but 'I am the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob,' The description not only evokes God's eternal being but implies the continuing personal existence of those with whom God remains in relationship.

Denial of the resurrection is denial of the nature of God as Israel—and the whole tradition deriving from Israel's faith—conceives God to be.

The gospel does not offer a theology of marriage. It makes a statement about God and the hope for sharing Christ's risen life that relationship with God entails.
