Dear parishioners, visitors and friends,

Recently I came across a very inspiring reflection by Pope Francis about how to celebrate in God's presence.

The pope was reflecting on a text from the second book of Samuel (6:12-19), where King David, leading the procession to the ark of God's presence to the city of Jerusalem, was dancing in front of the whole people. His wife Michal was not impressed with this, and reproached him, because she felt he was debasing himself. David's response was that he would much rather debase himself in front of his people and celebrate joyfully in God's presence, than respect his personal position in front of his people and not celebrate God! Michal, who could not understand this position, was punished by being barren.

Celebrating God's nearness

The people felt that God was close to them and they celebrated. Leading the procession was King David who sacrificed an ox and a fatling and joined the people shouting, singing and dancing 'with all his might.'

The fact that God was with them was the cause of their celebration. David danced before the people expressing his joy without feeling shy. It is the spiritual joy of encountering the Lord, of His return to the people. David loved the Lord, and he was happy and joyful to bring back the ark of the Lord with dancing and singing like all the people.

Pope Francis pointed out that we also experience this joy and celebrate 'when we are with the Lord' in our parishes or villages. In this regard, he recalled that at the time of Nehemiah, in the Old Testament, people wept with joy when the book of the law was found, and they continued their celebration at home.

Contempt of joy

Continuing David's story, Pope Francis said that one of his wives, Michal, Saul's daughter, reproached him with contempt saying he was dancing shamelessly like a vulgar, like one of the people.

The pope described Michal's reaction as contempt of 'genuine religiosity' and spontaneity of joy of being with the Lord. But David explained to her that he was rejoicing in the Lord as the ark was back home. The bible says that Michal was punished for this and did not bear children. Without joy in the heart, a Christian is barren.

Joyful evangelisers move forward

Pope Francis further explained that celebration is not only expressed spiritually but becomes sharing. After the blessing, David distributed to each person 'a loaf of bread, a cut of roast meat and a raisin cake,' so that everyone could celebrate in their homes. Pope Francis said that 'the Word of God is not ashamed of celebration,' at the same time he warned, of the danger of a joy that goes beyond limits, believing this is everything.

Pope Francis recalled that St Pope Paul VI in his Apostolic Exhortation 'Evangelii Nuntiandi,' said: 'the gospel will not go forward with boring, bitter evangelisers. It will only go forward with joyful evangelisers, full of life.' He urged for the joy of receiving the Word of God, the joy of being Christians, the joy of going ahead, the ability to celebrate without being ashamed and not being like Michal, formal Christians, prisoners of formalities.

FIRST READING

Isaiah 58:7-10

Thus says the Lord:

Share your bread with the hungry, and shelter the homeless poor, clothe the man you see to be naked and turn not from your own kin. Then will your light shine like the dawn and your wound be quickly healed over.

Your integrity will go before you and the glory of the Lord behind you. Cry, and the Lord will answer; call, and he will say, 'I am here.'

If you do away with the yoke, the clenched fist, the wicked word, if you give your bread to the hungry, and relief to the oppressed, your light will rise in the darkness, and your shadows become like noon.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Psalm 111:4-9

TOGETHER: A light rises in the darkness for the upright.

LEFT SIDE:

He is a light in the darkness for the upright: he is generous, merciful and just.

The good man takes pity and lends, he conducts his affairs with honour.

RIGHT SIDE:

The just man will never waver:
he will be remembered for ever.
He has no fear of evil news;
with a firm heart he trusts in the Lord.

LEFT SIDE:

With a steadfast heart he will not fear; open-handed, he gives to the poor; his justice stands firm for ever. His head will be raised in glory.

TOGETHER: A light rises in the darkness for the upright.

SECOND READING 1 Corinthians 2:1-5

When I came to you, brothers, it was not with any show of oratory or philosophy, but simply to tell you what God had guaranteed. During my stay with you, the only knowledge I claimed to have was about Jesus, and only about him as the crucified Christ. Far from relying on any power of my own, I came among you in great 'fear and trembling' and in my speeches and the sermons that I gave, there were none of the arguments that belong to philosophy; only a demonstration of the power of the Spirit. And I did this so that your faith should not depend on human philosophy but on the power of God.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia I am the light of the world, says the Lord; the man who follows me will have the light of life. Alleluia!

GOSPEL

Matthew 5:13-16

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You are the salt of the earth. But if salt becomes tasteless, what can make it salty again? It is good for nothing, and can only be thrown out to be trampled underfoot by men.

'You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill-top cannot be hidden. No one lights a lamp to put it under a tub; they put it on the lamp-stand where it shines for everyone in the house. In the same way your light must shine in the sight of men, so that, seeing your good works, they may give the praise to your Father in heaven.'

BE SALT AND LIGHT

To appreciate what Jesus has in mind in the images of 'salt' and 'light' we need to recall the setting of the sermon that continues in the gospel for today. Jesus is addressing his disciples in the presence of a great crowd of burdened and afflicted people gathered on the plain below (Mt 4:23-25).

In the opening words of the sermon Jesus called 'blessed' people prepared to live in the vulnerable, non-grasping ways listed in the nine beatitudes. Now it becomes clear that they thereby become a blessing not just for themselves but for the burdened mass of humanity as well. As those who really lift other people's burdens, they become and remain the 'salt of the earth' and 'light of the world.'

Salt can hardly 'lose its taste.' Nevertheless, if it is contaminated and so (in the days before refrigeration) rendered useless for preservation, it is only good for salting the path outside the house, where it will be trampled underfoot. Disciples who fall away from their vocation may face a similar fate.

Jesus' comments in relation to 'light' fall into two parts. First, in biblical tradition Jerusalem was the archetypal 'city built on a hilltop.' When the temple was illuminated at night, Jerusalem could well be described as 'the light of the world.'

Secondly—and more mundanely—one does not go to the trouble of lighting a lamp and then hiding it.

So we are to be like lamps kindled by God. Schooled by Jesus, our good works are to give light and hope in a darkened world.
