29TH FEBRUARY / 1ST MARCH 2020-1ST SUNDAY IN LENT, YEAR A

Between 6th and the 27th October of last year, Pope Francis convoked a regional synod for the bishops of the Pan-Amazon region 'to identify new paths for the evangelisation of God's people in that region,' specifically the indigenous peoples who are 'often forgotten and without the prospect of a serene future.' After each of these synods, the pope issues a reflection on the synod discussions. On 2nd February, Pope Francis issued his Post-Synodal Exhortation called Querida Amazonia—Beloved Amazonia. The full text of this papal document can be found on our parish web site and facebook page, or at the Vatican web site, Vatican.va.

The pope's exhortation is not only addressed to the people living in the nine countries that make up the Amazon region, but to the whole world. His wish is to help awaken our affection and concern for this land which is 'ours,' and to invite us all to value it and acknowledge it as a sacred mystery. (5) This is not the first time Pope Francis has spoken about our responsibility towards the world and the environment. In May 2015 he wrote an encyclical 'Laudato Si',' speaking about the care of our common home. Both documents are very important reading for all Christians!

In our contemporary world, we have landed in a situation where we cannot risk speaking about the environment without being accused of being political! The discourse about the environment has been claimed by policy makers and it is perceived that any comment made about this topic means that one is taking sides with one political colour or another. This is indeed a very sad state we find ourselves into. Yes, indeed, the environment, and any discourse which effects our life as humans, is political, because human beings are political beings, but this does not mean that one has to align herself or himself with one political ideology.

Many commentators would point out that Church leaders should not meddle with party politics; I totally agree with this statement. It is not the role of any Church leader to endorse or condemn any particular political ideology; the role of Church leaders is to guide the Church in the light of the word of God. Indeed, the Church leaders are only a small part of the Church. The Church, the People of God, the Body of Christ, is made up of all who believe. We are all created in the image and likeness of God and we all have a duty to ensure that the environment around us is safe for us to enjoy, and for our own children to grow up in.

The environment is not, and should never be a political football. Decisions on the environment should not be based on the amount of votes one policy will gain or lose. Discussion and decisions about the environment should be above any shape of party politics.

As baptised members of the Body of Christ we believe that the world we live in is ultimately created by God for us to enjoy, not to abuse. We are created, in the image and likeness of God, as part of this beautiful world we call home. The world itself is in God's image and likeness, and we are called to join God in his creation. As co-creators we are required to respect, enhance and protect our God-given home. We do this, not only because we believe in God, but also because we are invited to love and respect those around us and the future of humanity, our own children!

TRUST UNDER TEST: Both scripture and the lives of the saints suggest that when people are called by God for some purpose they soon go through a period of test. In hearing and following God's call they may experience a great sense of affirmation and freedom. But then comes a 'desert' experience, often prolonged, in which they learn far more deeply what it is to be a human being in close relationship to God. Stripped of the usual props and comforts, and with all illusions unmasked, they come to feel their own human powerlessness and utter dependence upon God. Only so can they become effective instruments and channels of God's grace in the world

Each of the first three evangelists portrays Jesus undergoing such an experience of test following his baptismal reception of the Spirit. Matthew's account has strong echoes of the experience of Israel recorded in Deuteronomy, chapters 6-8. During their forty-year wandering in the desert the people could expect God to give them food (the manna), protection from enemies, and eventual entrance into the Promised Land. But they were not to put God to the test by trying to force the divine hand.

The three temptations put to Jesus all contrive to get to him to do precisely this: force God's hand in these same areas: food, protection, and possession of the land (understood now as involving lordship of the entire world). Dismissing each suggestion with a word from Scripture, Jesus sets the direction of his life irrevocably. He will carry out his messianic task in complete trust, obedience and unselfish love.

Then he breathed into his nostrils a breath of life, and thus man became a living being.

The Lord God planted a garden in Eden which is in the east, and there he put the man he had fashioned. The Lord God caused to spring up from the soil every kind of tree, enticing to look at and good to eat, with the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden.

The serpent was the most subtle of all the wild beasts that the Lord God had made. It asked the woman, 'Did God really say you were not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?' The woman answered the serpent, 'We may eat the fruit of the trees in the garden. But of the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden God said, "You must not eat it, nor touch it, under pain of death"." Then the serpent said to the woman, 'No! You will not die! God knows in fact that on the day you eat it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods, knowing good and evil.' The woman saw that the tree was good to eat and pleasing to the eye, and that it was desirable for the knowledge that it could give. So she took some of its fruit and ate it. She gave some also to her husband who was with her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened and they realised that they were naked. So they sewed fig-leaves together to make themselves loin-cloths.

SECOND READING

Sin entered the world through one man, and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. Sin existed in the world long before the Law was given. There was no law and so no one could be accused of the sin of 'lawbreaking', yet death reigned over all from Adam to Moses, even though their sin, unlike that of Adam, was not a matter of breaking a law.

Adam prefigured the One to come, but the gift itself considerably outweighed the fall. If it is certain that through one man's fall so many died, it is even more certain that divine grace, coming through the one man, Jesus Christ, came to so many as an abundant free gift. The results of the gift also outweigh the results of one man's sin: for after one single fall came judgement with a verdict of condemnation, now after many falls comes grace with its verdict of acquittal. If it is certain that death reigned over everyone as the consequence of one man's fall, it is even more certain that one man, Jesus Christ, will cause everyone to reign in life who receives the free gift that he does not deserve, of being made righteous. Again, as one man's fall brought condemnation on everyone, so the good act of one man brings everyone life and makes them justified. As by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience many will be made righteous.

GOSPEL

Matthew 4:1-11

Jesus was led by the Spirit out into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights, after which he was very hungry, and the tempter came and said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to turn into loaves.' But he replied, 'Scripture says: Man does not live on bread alone but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.'

The devil then took him to the holy city and made him stand on the parapet of the Temple. 'If you are the Son of God,' he said, 'throw yourself down; for scripture says: He will put you in his angels' charge, and they will support you on their hands in case you hurt your foot against a stone.' Jesus said to him, 'Scripture also says: You must not put the Lord your God to the test.'

Next, taking him to a very high mountain, the devil showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendour. 'I will give you all these', he said, 'if you fall at my feet and worship me.' Then Jesus replied, 'Be off, Satan! For scripture says: You must worship the Lord your God, and serve him alone.' Then the devil left him, and angels appeared and looked after him.

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
