Dear Parishioners, Friends and Visitors,

It is with a deep sense of gratitude that I share this message with you. I am infinitely grateful to God above all, for his constant faithfulness and mercy towards me; gratitude to the Melbourne Archdiocese for the trust it placed in me when I was asked to look after the Heidelberg parish; and, most of all, to you, the parish family at St John's, for your warm welcome and for accepting me as part of your family.

I arrived at Heidelberg, totally unannounced and unexpected, in October 2013. Fr Ted was not feeling well, I was looking for a new ministry, and Archbishop Hart asked me whether I could minister for a few months among you. The initial agreement was for three months! I had heard of the Austin Hospital, because a good friend of mine had done some studies there, but I had absolutely no idea where Heidelberg was on the map. A month after I arrived in Heidelberg, I was asked whether I would like to stay on as parish priest! These seven years at St John's have been a time of great grace; it has been inspiring journeying with you all.

It is time now to part ways. I understand this is not the ideal way of giving you this news, but our Novel friend Corona Virus has interfered, so I have to make this announcement by letter rather than in person to you at Mass. I will be leaving St John's and moving to a mission in the Philippines. As a member of the Missionary Society of St Paul, I have been in the Philippines a number of times for short periods of time; this time it will be a permanent posting for me. Someone once told me that, although it will be difficult to leave family and friends at St John's, I cannot leave my heart here; it will be of no use to you and I would be of no use in my new mission. Instead I will carry you with me in my heart.

Through Baptism, every Christian is a missionary; we are all invited to spread the Good News wherever we are. Being a missionary is also a way of building bridges between different parts of the Church. My going to the Philippines can also be St John's mission: I will carry your love and support with me in my new mission.

The plan is to leave St John's on Sunday 16th August; after some time with my family and a time of spiritual retreat, I will start my new mission in December or January. I have already prepared the 'parish profile' which will now be sent out to all the priests in the archdiocese for them to consider whether they would like to take on this ministry. We can start praying now for the new parish priest that will be part of your family in a few months' time.

Thank you to all for your love, friendship and support. There are too many people to mention. I will pray for all of you for your generosity towards me. Between now and August I hope we will have time to farewell each other.

ETERNAL LIFE

In today's gospel, Jesus leaves what is for him safe country, across the Jordan, to give life to Lazarus, his friend. By going to Judea, he puts his own life at mortal risk.

What Jesus does for Lazarus in fact plays out in miniature the whole pattern of his life and mission. As incarnate Son of God, he leaves the 'safe country' of his eternal dwelling with the Father (John 1:1-2) to enter our world and, at the cost of his own life, give eternal life to us all.

Jesus delays a few days before acting on the sisters' message about their brother's grave illness. In effect, he allows Lazarus to die. Odd though the delay may seem, it allows him to enter into the grief of Martha and Mary, and, ultimately, the grief of all mourn the death of loved ones. Jesus weeps (v. 35), addressing not only death but the grieving for the death of loved ones that affects all human beings.

Jesus in the end restores Lazarus to this present life. But the miracle is more importantly a symbol of the 'eternal life'—death's true remedy—that Jesus ('the resurrection and the life') has come to impart to all.

Confronted with the prospect of death, each one of us is 'Lazarus,' the friend for whom Jesus left the 'safe country' of his Father's home to give his life that I might live. This is how we should hear the Passion in the weeks to come.

Ezekiel 37:12-14

The Lord says this: I am now going to open your graves; I mean to raise you from your graves, my people, and lead you back to the soil of Israel. And you will know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves and raise you from your graves, my people. And I shall put my spirit in you, and you will live, and I shall resettle you on your own soil; and you will know that I, the Lord, have said and done this — it is the Lord who speaks.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Psalm 129

TOGETHER: With the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption.

LEFT SIDE:

Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord, Lord, hear my voice! O let your ears be attentive to the voice of my pleading.

RIGHT SIDE:

If you, O Lord, should mark our guilt, Lord, who would survive? But with you is found forgiveness: for this we revere you.

LEFT SIDE:

My soul is waiting for the Lord, I count on his word. My soul is longing for the Lord more than watchman for daybreak. (Let the watchman count on daybreak and Israel on the Lord.)

RIGHT SIDE:

Because with the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption, Israel indeed he will redeem from all its iniquity.

TOGETHER: With the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption.

SECOND READING

Romans 8:8-11

People who are interested only in unspiritual things can never be pleasing to God. Your interests, however, are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him. Though your body may be dead it is because of sin, but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself because you have been justified; and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ! I am the resurrection and the life, says the Lord; whoever believes in me will not die for ever. Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ! The sisters Martha and Mary sent this message to Jesus, 'Lord, the man you love is ill.' On receiving the message, Jesus said, 'This sickness will end not in death but in God's glory, and through it the Son of God will be glorified.'

Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, yet when he heard that Lazarus was ill he stayed where he was for two more days before saying to the disciples, 'Let us go to Judaea.'

On arriving, Jesus found that Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days already. When Martha heard that Jesus had come she went to meet him. Mary remained sitting in the house. Martha said to Jesus, 'If you had been here, my brother would not have died, but I know that even now, whatever you ask of God, he will grant you.' 'Your brother' said Jesus to her 'will rise again.' Martha said, 'I know he will rise again at the resurrection on the last day.' Jesus said:

'I am the resurrection and the life.

If anyone believes in me, even though he dies he will live,

and whoever lives and believes in me

will never die. Do you believe this?'

'Yes, Lord,' she said 'I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who was to come into this world.' Jesus said in great distress, with a sigh that came straight from the heart, 'Where have you put him?' They said, 'See how much he loved him!' But there were some who remarked, 'He opened the eyes of the blind man, could he not have prevented this man's death?' Still sighing, Jesus reached the tomb: it was a cave with a stone to close the opening. Jesus said, 'Take the stone away.' Martha said to him, 'Lord, by now he will smell; this is the fourth day.' Jesus replied, 'Have I not told you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?' So they took away the stone. Then Jesus lifted up his eyes and said:

'Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer.

I knew indeed that you always hear me,

but I speak

for the sake of all these who stand round me,

so that they may believe it was you who sent me.'

When he had said this, he cried in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, here! Come out!' The dead man came out, his feet and hands bound with bands of stuff and a cloth round his face. Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, let him go free.'

Many of the Jews who had come to visit Mary and had seen what he did believed in him.

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
