Dear Parishioners, Friends and Visitors,

This week we celebrate Holy Week. We start on Sunday with the celebration of Palm Sunday, then Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday.

HOLY WEEK









Even though our church buildings are closed this year, the Church still celebrates this greatest of all weeks. We are the Church, we are the People of God, we are the Body of Christ. This year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we are not able to come together as a visible Body and People, but we are still able to come together and celebrate in our homes. The family Church is at the basis of the Universal Church. There is no Universal Church if we do not share faith as a family.

This year, in a very special way, we are being asked to be creative in the way we celebrate Holy Week. As usual, we will be using our parish web-site (cam.org.au/heidelberg/), and our parish Facebook page (facebook.com/stjohnheidelberg/) to provide resources to assist you at this time. The parish Facebook page is a public page and can be viewed by anyone, even if you do not have a personal Facebook profile page.

May I suggest we create a sacred space in our homes at this time. This does not have to be a big space, a small coffee table would do the job. Place it in a place where it can become the focal point of your family life at least during this week.

For Palm Sunday we can dress the table with a red cloth. We can place some olive or palm branches or any other type of greenery on the table, to remind us of the entry of Jesus in Jerusalem. We can even place the word Hosanna on this table, to remind us of the shouts of the people welcoming Jesus. As a family, we can then read the gospel of the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem from the gospel according to Matthew (21:1-11).

On Holy Thursday we remember service, the Eucharist and priesthood. We can cover our coffee table with a white cloth and place on it a small jug with water, a small bowl and a small towel. We can come together and read the narration of the Last Supper in the gospel according to John (13:1-15). John explains how Jesus washed the disciples' feet as a sign of service. We can imitate this by going around and washing each other's hands. We can also try to find time to pray in silence, thanking God for the gift of himself in the Eucharist. Please remember to pray for us priests. We need the prayers of you, the people of God, to continue our ministry among you.

On Good Friday we can cover the coffee table with a red cloth and place a crucifix on it, to remind us of the fact that Jesus died for us. We can decorate the crucifix with flowers and candles as we do our own adoration of the cross. We can come together and read the passion of Christ from the gospel according to John (18:1-19:42). We can share the parts of this reading among different members of this family. It is important to spend some time in silence at the end of this reading.

OBLIGATION TO ATTEND MASS: If you are unwell—no matter what the illness—or are at particular risk of contracting the virus, there is no obligation to attend Mass. Instead you can honour the Lord's Day by a time of prayer at home, reading the Scriptures or watching Mass online.

JESUS' PASSION ACCORDING TO MATTHEW

St Matthew's account of Jesus' suffering and death is haunted by the theme of guilt at the shedding of innocent blood.

Most prominent in this respect is the figure of Judas. We learn not only of his betrayal of Jesus but also of his subsequent remorse and futile attempt to rid himself of guilt by getting the chief priests to take back the blood money. Tragically, he does not seem to have believed that, like Peter, he would have found forgiveness and a fresh start with Jesus—so, unable to forgive himself, he takes his own life.

Next, Pilate, warned by his wife to have nothing to do with 'that innocent man,' washes his hands before the crowd, in a futile attempt to evade responsibility.

Finally, urged on by their leaders, the people as a whole answer, 'His blood be upon us and upon our children'. This cry, so devastating in its consequences down the centuries, in no sense means that Jewish people as a whole and for all time incur responsibility for Jesus' death. For Matthew it explains the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans in 70 CE, in the sense that the next generation ('our children') will bear the consequences of shedding Jesus' blood.

But all this evil—betrayal, miscarriage of justice, shedding of innocent blood—is gathered up and overcome by the divine love that is the true meaning of Jesus' death. Even as he dies there is already a hint of love's victory as the earthquake and opening of tombs foreshadows the resurrection.

SECOND READING

Philippians 2:6-11

His state was divine, yet Christ Jesus did not cling to his equality with God but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave, and became as men are, and being as all men are, he was humbler yet, even to accepting death, death on a cross. But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names so that all beings in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld, should bend the knee at the name of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, king of endless glory! Christ became obedient for us even to death dying on the cross. Therefore God raised him on high and gave him a name above all other names.

GOSPEL Matthew 27:26-54

He ordered Jesus to be first scourged and then handed over to be crucified.

The governor's soldiers took Jesus with them into the Praetorium and collected the whole cohort around him. Then they stripped him and made him wear a scarlet cloak, and having twisted some thorns into a crown they put this on his head and placed a reed in his right hand. To make fun of him they knelt to him saying, 'Hail, king of the Jews!' And they spat on him and took the reed and struck him on the head with it. And when they had finished making fun of him, they took off the cloak and dressed him in his own clothes and led him away to crucify him.

On their way out, they came across a man from Cyrene, Simon by name, and enlisted him to carry his cross. When they had reached a place called Golgotha, that is, the place of the skull, they gave him wine to drink mixed with gall, which he tasted but refused to drink. When they had finished crucifying him they shared out his clothing by casting lots, and then sat down and stayed there keeping guard over him.

Above his head was placed the charge against him; it read: 'This is Jesus, the King of the Jews.' At the same time two robbers were crucified with him, one on the right and one on the left.

The passers-by jeered at him; they shook their heads and said 'So you would destroy the Temple and rebuild it in three days! Then save yourself! If you are God's son, come down from the cross!' The chief priests with the scribes and elders mocked him in the same way. 'He saved others,' they said 'he cannot save himself. He is the king of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him. He put his trust in God; now let God rescue him if he wants him. For he did say, "I am the son of God."' Even the robbers who were crucified with him taunted him in the same way.

From the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land until the ninth hour. And about the ninth hour, Jesus cried out in a loud voice, 'Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani?' that is, 'My God, my God, why have you deserted me?' When some of those who stood there heard this, they said, 'The man is calling on Elijah,' and one of them quickly ran to get a sponge which he dipped in vinegar and putting it on a reed, gave it him to drink. 'Wait!' said the rest of them 'and see if Elijah will come to save him.' But Jesus again crying out in a loud voice, yielded up his spirit.

At that, the veil of the Temple was torn in two from top to bottom; the earth quaked; the rocks were split; the tombs opened and the bodies of many holy men rose from the dead, and these, after his resurrection, came out of the tombs, entered the Holy City and appeared to a number of people. Meanwhile the centurion, together with the others guarding Jesus, had seen the earthquake and all that was taking place, and they were terrified and said, 'In truth this was a son of God.'

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
