Dear Parishioners, Friends and Visitors,

This time of COVID restrictions has been the cause of some frustrations but also of some very deep reflections. One such reflection, 'Living sacramentally,' was written by Helen Carboon, congregational leader of the Presentation Sisters in Victoria.

Carboon reminds us that while the sacramental life of the Church is essential for our Christian life, it is actually a very small part of our whole life. We come together as a Body of Christ to be energised through God's Word, the sacraments and our faith community so that we can return home to live what we have celebrated. At the end of the week we go back to our community, carrying with us the fruits of our sacramental living. Thus the gathering of the People of God becomes for us the *source* of our sacramental living, and the *summit* where we consecrate the fruits of that living. Life happens between this *source* and *summit*. If we do not live our life sacramentally, then we are failing the People of God we belong to; if we do not bring the fruits of our living to the *summit* then our sacraments are fruitless and useless.

At the end of each of our celebrations we are told to 'Go out and live what we have celebrated!' This 'mission' (sending) is so important that the Latin phrase *'ite missa est'* actually gave the name to what we now call the 'Mass,' (in Latin 'Missa,' and in Italian 'Messa')! How do I live sacramentally?

As a baptised Christian I am buried in Christ's death so that I live his resurrection. This new life in Christ means that everything I do carries the marks of Christ. What does Jesus teach in the gospel? How do I live those teachings in my daily life? Christ invites me love my sisters and brothers; how do I express this love in whatever I do?

In the sacrament of Reconciliation, acknowledging my sinfulness, I humbly approach the priest, representing God, and 'confess' my sins, requesting to be reconciled with God. This is the celebration of the sacrament, and I am assured that God, a loving Father, always forgives my sins. The sacramental living starts when I leave the church building and I am faced with people I disagree with, people who challenge me, those who have hurt and offended me. How do I live reconciliation here. We are told to pray: 'forgive us our sins as we forgive the sins of those who sin against us.' Because unless we forgive others their sins, then our sins will not be forgiven!

Often I catch myself acting like the Pharisee in the parable of the Pharisee and the publican (Luke 18:9-14). It is a great temptation to go to the synagogue to inform God what a good and holy person I have been; 'not like these sinners who are always offending you!' In the parable Jesus tells us that it is the humble tax-collector who goes home at peace with God, and not the 'holy' Pharisee. The tax-collector, recognised his sins and humbly asked forgiveness; the Pharisee thought he had the right and duty to sit in judgement on the sinful tax-collector.

In our parish prayer we pray that we welcome 'the stranger, the needy, the sick and the lonely.' I have often wondered who is the stranger who we need to welcome in our life. Who is the 'lost son' God is challenging us to embrace every day.



FIRST READING

Acts of the Apostles 2:1-11

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

SECOND READING 1 Corinthians 12:3-7, 12-13

No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord' unless he is under the influence of the Holy Spirit.

There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose.

Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia!

Gospel

John 20:19-23

In the evening of the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you', and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.' As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.' After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven: for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

THE SPIRIT: GOD'S EMPOWERING PRESENCE

Today's first reading, from the book of the Acts of the Apostles (2:1-11), locates the imparting of the Spirit on the Jewish feast of Pentecost, a pilgrimage feast celebrated fifty days after Passover. In biblical tradition, wind and fire signal the presence and power of God, as when Israel stood before God at the foot of Mount Sinai. What is described here seems to be a central fiery mass from which distinct 'tongues' ('as if of fire:' not real fire!) separate off and come to rest on individuals.

During his earthly life, the Spirit rested only upon Jesus (Luke 3:21-22; 4:14). Now, as he promised (Luke 24:49), it comes down upon the disciples, gathered with Mary his mother, who are now to be his witnesses—in first instance to Israel, eventually 'to the ends of the earth' (Acts 1:8).

The multi-nation variety of people who hear and understand the testimony of the apostles in their own language foreshadows this worldwide mission. In many languages the Church will communicate the single message of God's reconciling love. The gospel (John 20:19-23) associates the gift of the Spirit more closely with the resurrection. On Easter Sunday evening the risen Lord breathes out upon his disciples the Spirit that will empower them to take up the mission he has received from the Father. They are to pass on the reconciliation ('whose sins you shall forgive ...') that he, as Lamb of God (1:29), has brought into the world. Fr Brendan Byrne sj

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
