Dear Parishioners, Friends and Visitors,

In my last two reflections on this weekly newsletter, I have decided to reflect on the parish prayer, so beautifully prepared by Fr Ted, and which we pray each day and before each Sunday Mass. I believe this prayer can easily be taken as our parish community's mission statement. The prayer invites us to 'cherish and maintain our parish heritage;' I would like to unpack this statement.

Our parish community is one of the very first parishes established in the Melbourne Archdiocese. The diocese of Melbourne was established in 1848 and St John's parish in 1851. We therefore have a long history as a parish and an old church building to remind us of this and to look after. We are entrusted to look after this rich heritage we inherited.

Part of the heritage is also the faith we practice and the Catholic tradition we have inherited. The question that arises is: how do we preserve heritage? We know that for a valuable property to be handed down to later generations, it has to be restored and maintained. In some building this also requires updating the building to suit contemporary needs and at times even replacing some of the original stones and structures that made up the building. One can choose not to replace the original stone, but this may cause the building to deteriorate and eventually fall apart.

I use this as an analogy. Perhaps it may be easy to understand the need to preserve a building, it is not as easy to understand how to preserve tradition. Tradition is often compared to a precious but very fragile artefact; an expensive and unique work of art. At times it is compared also to a lump of clay. The art of enjoying and preserving tradition is in the way it is 'handed down.' The word tradition means handing down.

In museums, precious historic artefacts are often locked away behind glass cabinets so no one can touch them. They are nice to look at, but no one can interact with them. We are afraid that if anyone touches them, they can be damaged and lost forever. The other option is to open up the glass cabinets and let everyone handle the precious artefact, allowing people to enjoy it and risk it being damaged.

This is where the second image of the lump of clay comes in handy. Each time I hand down the lump of clay, it actually changes shape; as each successive generation accepts it and interacts with it, the clay will change in shape and will be marked with the fingerprints of all who handled it, but it is still alive and being enjoyed by all.

Our faith, our Catholic tradition, too needs to be handed down from one generation to another. In doing so we need to allow each successive generation to accept it and change it in a way that it can be understood and accepted by faithful Christians of that era. If we lock up our tradition a glass cabinet, we are guaranteed that it will never change, but we also know that it will become a museum piece and eventually die. This handing down of tradition is a very old concept and can be even observed in the scriptures, where stories are adapted to suit changing cultures.

Let us, as we pray, continue appreciating and handing down the heritage entrusted to us.

REGISTERING WHEN IN THE CHURCH: we have an obligation to take the name and a contact number of all who attend Mass to help stop the spread of the virus. To do this we have introduced a QR code which

can be scanned using a smart phone, and asked to insert your FIRST NAME and CONTACT NUMBER. Copies of this QR code and instructions are on the seats. You are requested to help those without a smart phone to enter their details. This system is a safe way of keeping records. The records will not be kept by the parish and can ONLY be used in case of a positive COVID-19 diagnosis.

This involves changing, washing and ironing the altar cloths, wiping down the pews, and other odd jobs as they arise. Sin entered the world through one man, and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. Sin existed in the world long before the Law was given. There was no law and so no one could be accused of the sin of 'law-breaking', yet death reigned over all from Adam to Moses, even though their sin, unlike that of Adam, was not a matter of breaking a law.

Adam prefigured the One to come, but the gift itself considerably outweighed the fall. If it is certain that through one man's fall so many died, it is even more certain that divine grace, coming through the one man, Jesus Christ, came to so many as an abundant free gift.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia!

The Spirit of Truth will bear witness to me, says the Lord, and you also will be my witnesses.

Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Do not be afraid. For everything that is now covered will be uncovered, and everything now hidden will be made clear. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the daylight; what you hear in whispers, proclaim from the house-tops.

'Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell. Can you not buy two sparrows for a penny? And yet not one falls to the ground without your Father knowing. Why, every hair on your head has been counted. So there is no need to be afraid; you are worth more than hundreds of sparrows.

'So if anyone declares himself for me in the presence of men, I will declare myself for him in the presence of my Father in heaven. But the one who disowns me in the presence of men, I will disown in the presence of my Father in heaven.'

OF WHOM TO BE AFRAID?

As a basic human emotion, fear can go two ways. It can be a safeguard and protection. Or it can be a force that cripples and disables. The key thing is to distinguish well-founded fear from that which is illusory or based on deception. A great part of spiritual direction consists in helping people to recognise their fears and see whether they are based on falsehood or reality.

Today's gospel addresses challenges believers face in living out and giving witness to their faith. Ringing through it is the refrain: 'Do not fear.' Jesus acknowledges that there will be much that will dismay believers and make them afraid. He urges them to distinguish appropriate from inappropriate fear.

Disciples need not fear persecutors who can only kill the body. Our physical existence is held in God's hands; we are precious in God's sight— infinitely more so than sparrows, none of whose falling to the ground escapes divine notice. In all threats, then, we can be confident that God will see them through to eternal life.

For disciples, the only truly valid fear is that of falling out of God's favour. The warning, 'Fear him, rather, who can destroy both body and soul in hell,' may refer, then, to those whose evil influence and deception could bring this about.

God's only desire is to impart to us eternal life. But we can so alienate ourselves from the outreach of divine love as to face eternal loss. It is of such a consequence that people ought truly to be afraid.
