## 'IT IS YOUR FACE O LORD THAT I SEEK, HIDE NOT YOUR FACE' (PSALM 27:8)

Our chief purpose in this life is to be holy, because God is holy. Each one of us will be restless until we rest in God in this life, and ultimately to rest in the sleep of peace in the new life to come is what we are called to. In that new life we will no longer see God under the veil of the sacraments and other treasures of our faith, but we will see God as he really is. We will look upon his face and thus contemplate his beauty and love: the height of heavenly glory.

Though no person here on earth can see the face of God and live (Exodus 33:20), we do pray that God looks at us: that he lifts his countenance upon us and watches over us always (Numbers 6:24). The heart of our Christian faith is belief in the incarnation of God in the person of Jesus Christ. God assumed our human nature in order that he might redeem it. The face of Jesus is quite literally the most beautiful thing the world has seen.

In my last parish, many of the Italians had a great devotion to the Volto Santo: the Holy Face. We had a large painting and shrine dedicated to it in the corner of St Ambrose' Church. I'll admit that the image itself wasn't overly flattering, but that's not really the point. A more ancient tradition is that of Veronica's Veil, the fabric that wiped - and left an image of - the face of Christ as he carried his cross to Calvary. The name "Veronica" is the Latin version of the Greek word berenike, or "bearer of victory", rendered perhaps not so eloquently in English to "Bernice". The Catholic Encyclopedia however, suggests the name began from the words "vera icona" or "true image" and thus named the lady in light of the relic. According to apocryphal sources, Veronica is the same woman who in the Gospel of Luke was cured of her ailment by touching the hem of Our Lord's garment. A brave and faithful woman she was!

What's my point here? In short, God taking on a human face in Christ means that our human faces bear an image of the Divine. Currently in Melbourne, whenever we are out, our faces are to be covered by the wearing of a mask. This is not a good thing. Now before anyone labels me an "anti-masker", let it be known that I understand why we're being asked to do so at the moment (despite studies suggesting that the effectiveness of face masks is minimal, especially when they are not applied and handled properly). But we as Christians must know that to cover our faces is to cover up the most obvious reflection of the image and likeness of God within us. It renders us less than what we are, which will naturally lead to people treating one another as such. Society is very fractured at the minute. I can only think that this disconnect will be exacerbated by not being able to meet each other "face to face". I know in certain parts of the world, people wearing face masks is a common sight. I really hope that doesn't happen here once the danger of this virus has subsided. You might very slightly increase the chance of getting or spreading a lurgie, but that's a risk we should all be willing to take so that we can get a glimpse of an image of God each day, and also share ours with the world.

## TREASURE KNOWLEDGE

The Jesus questions his disciples about popular perceptions of who he is. Their report shows that people cast him in familiar but totally inadequate roles. The reality requires a leap in imagination and faith achieved in Simon Peter's response: 'You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God'. Beyond being Messiah of Israel, Jesus is related to God in a unique, filial way.

Peter has conferred a title upon Jesus. Now Jesus confers a blessing and three roles upon him. He is 'blessed', not because he is virtuous, but because God has revealed to him a knowledge that unaided human understanding could never achieve. Everything the Church has to say flows from this God-given knowledge of Jesus. This is the inexhaustible treasure that it holds in trust for the world.

Simon's first role is indicated by his name: 'Peter' (= 'Rock'). He is 'rock', again not because of his personal qualities but because of his knowledge of Jesus. Built on this 'rock', the Church will be a community of life, against which the powers of death ('gates of the underworld') will not prevail. The gift of keys, a biblical image (see the First Reading) signifies delegated authority (from Jesus) in the household of God (the Church).

The final role, 'binding and loosing', refers to the power to interpret and adapt Jesus' authoritative teaching to new situations. In this way the Church, as both expression and foretaste of God's reign ('Kingdom of Heaven') on earth, is equipped to discern God's will in the changing circumstances that will confront and challenge it in its passage down the ages.



## Matthew 16:13-20

Then Simon Peter spoke up, 'You are the Christ,' he said, 'the Son of the living God.' Jesus replied, 'Simon son of Jonah, you are a happy man! Because it was not flesh and blood that revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. So I now say to you: You are Peter and on this rock I will build my Church.
