I'm excited to say that public masses will be back on at St John's, as per the Government and Archdiocesan guidelines that are slowly allowing us to open back up. We are able to say mass in an outdoor space for 5 people (not including the minister). Not many, but it's a start!

Mass will be said Tuesday to Sunday at 9am in the memorial garden maze beginning this Tuesday, July 6. A second mass will be held on Sundays at 10am.

Those wishing to attend mass are asked to email the parish address at heidelberg@cam.org.au to make their booking. Alternatively, you can call through to the presbytery and inform me of the day you would like to attend or leave a message. Email is preferable as it allows us to easily record the names and contact details of those attending. You will be contacted back to confirm your booking.

Some considerations and conditions:

- Mass will be held weather pending. If it is raining or blowing a gale, mass will be cancelled. Those who miss out on such days will be offered the next available date.
- You will be required to wear a face mask during the service, except when assisting with a reading and when receiving Holy Communion.
- There will be some protocols to see to, so do try to be present at least a couple of minutes prior to mass beginning. If you'd like to go to the sacrament of confession before receiving communion again, be there earlier still. I'll be around the church and happy to oblige.

I ask you to please be patient and understanding through this. I'm sure there a going to be some unforeseen issues that arise. Let's hope that this is a very temporary arrangement and that we can gather again inside our beloved church of St John's soon.

THE SONG SUNG OVER THE CHURCH

Jesus probably told the parable of the Tenants against the religious leaders in Jerusalem in his day. Because they have resisted the prophets sent by God, the last of whom has been himself, they have shown themselves to be usurpers, retaining for themselves the "vineyard" (Israel) and its "produce" (the life of the people). For them, the arrival of the Kingdom (of God) will mean dispossession and retribution.

The early Church retold the parable in the light of Jesus' death and resurrection, and a belief in his status as God's Son. Also present is a bitter awareness of the No given to the Gospel by the bulk of Israel and a sense of the Church itself, made up of Jews and non-Jews, as the community of the Kingdom. Through the continuing presence of the risen Lord (Matt 28:20), the community can and ought to produce the "fruits" that God desires.

The long and tragic history of Christian intolerance and persecution of Jews calls for sensitivity in handling texts like this that reflect the early Church's disappointment with Israel's No to the Gospel. Today, we should move on from Christian triumphalism at Jewish expense to concentrate upon the "fruits" that God looks for from us. God has made the "rejected stone"—the crucified and risen Lord—the "cornerstone" of the Church. The question for us is whether the "song" sung by God over this new vineyard (cf. the First Reading) is one of delight or disappointment. Inevitably, perhaps, a bit of both. In either case it will be a song of love.

HAVE YOU THOUGHT? THE BENEVOLENT LANDOWNER

One of the images from this gospel that would have been puzzling to the audience, and may have tipped them off that Jesus was telling a parable with a particular message, is the image of the landowner being incredibly benevolent and tolerant of his rebellious tenants. Jesus' audience would have known that the law was always on the side of a landowner over his tenants. Any misdeed by a tenant farmer would have been dealt with swiftly and severely and yet the landowner in Jesus' story (God) is almost unbelievably patient and prepared to give the tenants every opportunity to do the right thing.

Isaiah 5:1-7

Let me sing to my friend the song of his love for his vineyard. My friend had a vineyard on a fertile hillside. He dug the soil, cleared it of stones, and planted choice vines in it. In the middle he built a tower, he dug a press there too. He expected it to yield grapes, but sour grapes were all that it gave. And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and men of Judah, I ask you to judge between my vineyard and me. What could I have done for my vineyard that I have not done? I expected it to yield grapes. Why did it yield sour grapes instead? Very well, I will tell you what I am going to do to my vineyard: I will take away its hedge for it to be grazed on, and knock down its wall for it to be trampled on. I will lay it waste, unpruned, undug; overgrown by the briar and the thorn. I will command the clouds to rain no rain on it. Yes, the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the House of Israel, and the men of Judah that chosen plant. He expected justice, but found bloodshed, integrity, but only a cry of distress.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM Psalm 79:9. 12-16. 19-20. **Response:** The vineyard of the Lord is the House of Israel.

You brought a vine out of Egypt; to plant it you drove out the nations. It stretched out its branches to the sea, to the Great River it stretched out its shoots. R./

Then why have you broken down its walls? It is plucked by all who pass by. It is ravaged by the boar of the forest, devoured by the beasts of the field.

God of hosts, turn again, we implore, look down from heaven and see.
Visit this vine and protect it, the vine your right hand has planted.

And we shall never forsake you again: give us life that we may call upon your name. God of hosts, bring us back; let your face shine on us and we shall be saved. R./

SECOND READING Philippians 4:6-9

GOSPEL Matthew 21:33-43

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people, 'Listen to another parable. There was a man, a landowner, who planted a vineyard; he fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower; then he leased it to tenants and went abroad. When vintage time drew near he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his servants, thrashed one, killed another and stoned a third. Next he sent some more servants, this time a larger number, and they dealt with them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them. "They will respect my son," he said. But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, "This is the heir. Come on, let us kill him and take over his inheritance." So they seized him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They answered, 'He will bring those wretches to a wretched end and lease the vinevard to other tenants who will deliver the produce to him when the season arrives.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures: It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone. This was the Lord's doing and it is wonderful to see? 'I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.'
