Dear brothers and sisters,

We celebrated the feast of St Thomas Aquinas during this past week – on Thursday to be precise. Some would say St Thomas is arguably the greatest theologian the Catholic Church has ever had. Others would say that there is no argument: he is hands down the greatest theologian the church has ever had.

A priest of the Order of St Dominic, he was born in 1221 in southern Italy to a noble a family but renounced his titles and heirs to take up the religious life. His family were dead against him doing so and went to great lengths to prevent him joining the order, including kidnapping him on his way to the monastery and at one stage sending a woman of disrepute up to his room to try and seduce him otherwise. Thanks be to God, he chased that woman out of his room and managed to elude the grasp of his two brothers, and from there got to work on becoming both a saint and doctor of the church.

What we find in the theology of St Thomas is a precision and clarity regarding some of the deepest mysteries of our faith. While others would rely on allegory and more abstract means to help us understand the things of God, Thomas brought a more scientific and investigative approach to make his discoveries. It is no wonder, as he learnt from St Albert the Great, a great theologian and natural scientist, who formed the basis for what we now know as the scientific method.

In order to come to the truth, Thomas would posit a claim or outline a teaching of our faith. He would then formulate several different challenges and arguments seeking to refute that claim. He would 'put in under the microscope' you might say. The claim would either stand up to the challenges or falter, and thereby show if the belief was to be held as true or not.

As I suggested to the congregation who were present at Thursday's mass, we would do well to adopt such a strategy in our own lives. When making a decision it is a wise thing to raise every possible counter argument as to why you might not go down that path. If after that you can still justify the call, then go for it. Likewise when we take a position about current issues, we should raise our own challenges to the position to make sure we are not just accepting popular opinion or being blinded by our own bias. It will give you peace of mind to know that you have a considered opinion, and also be helpful for when people wish to oppose you, as there is a good chance that you have already satisfied every possible argument against it in your own mind!

PARISH PRAYER

Heavenly Father, we the parishioners of St John's are grateful for all we have received from the men, women and children of our past. Help us to cherish and maintain our parish heritage. Most of all, enable us to be people who welcome the stranger, the needy, the sick and the lonely. Like St John, our patron saint, may we be people who love others, as your Son Jesus, asked us to do. We make this prayer, through Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

TEACHING AND HEALING WITH AUTHORITY

Today's Gospel (Mark 1:21-28) describes the first public act of Jesus. He enters the synagogue at Capernaum, teaches with impressive authority and dramatically frees a man possessed by an evil spirit.

What is really surprising is that the people in the synagogue seem just as impressed by the authority with which Jesus teaches as by the authority with which he drives out the demon. The two activities are not unconnected. Driving out the demon enacts more visibly and physically a liberation that his teaching produces in the hearts and minds of the people. As they drink in his words, they are set free from captivities of prejudice, fear, scruples, guilt, and ignorance about God. A false image of God can be truly be an enslavement.

The ancient world attributed to demonic possession various pathologies that modern medicine would ascribe to mental illness. Beyond clear cases of possession, the demonic can refer to any condition that controls human lives, inhibiting freedom and choice, stunting personal growth, alienating persons from God and their own true humanity, rendering relationships with others poisonous or destructive. Addictions of all kinds come to mind (substance abuse, alcoholism, gambling, pornography, etc.), their destructiveness symbolized by the "convulsions" inflicted on the man in this scene by the departing demon.

Rather than being mere spectators of what is being described, the Gospel invites hearers to identify with Jesus' audience in the synagogue, listen to his teaching, and to consider ways in which our own lives need to be set free through the teaching and the power of Jesus.

HISTORICAL CONTEXT - HE SAID WHAT?

In an age when most people were illiterate, Jesus appears to have been quite well educated. Some suggest that he may have spoken three or four different languages. He obviously spoke everyday Aramaic, as it was spoken in that region. Jesus also appears to have been taught Hebrew, the language of religious texts and religious practice. Greek, the language of trade in marketplaces, was a language that Jesus probably used when helping Joseph sell his carpentry products at stalls and markets. Finally, Jesus probably picked up a reasonable amount of Latin, the language of the Roman occupiers — he was able to hold a conversation with Pontius Pilate.

GOSPEL

Mark 1:21-28

Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the Sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority.

In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.
