Dear brothers and sisters,

Feast or Fast?

In the coming days, we have some of the greatest feast days of our church's year to celebrate. The feast of St Patrick is this Wednesday March 17, then the feast of St Joseph this Friday the 19th. Not too far down the track is the solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord on March 25.

As the name suggests, these days are meant to be marked with a feast: good food and drink shared, hopefully, with good company! But we are also, as you are no doubt aware, in the midst of the season of Lent. which is to be observed by practicing fasting and penance. So what to do?

We are blessed here in Melbourne in that we have St Patrick as the patron of our diocese, with our mother church and Cathedral named after the great apostle to Ireland. So, St Patrick's Day is elevated from a feast to a solemnity – the highest of honours. On these days the Mass celebrated is similar to a Sunday. It includes the Gloria, three readings and the psalm, and the priest wears white vestments. So too the feast of St Joseph, which in some parts of the world is still a holy day of obligation.

So, if St Joseph's Day (or St Patrick's Day or the Annunciation) falls on Friday in Lent (as it does this year), abstinence is not obligatory on this feast. From the Code of Canon Law:

Can. 1251 Abstinence from meat, or from some other food as determined by the Episcopal Conference, is to be observed on all Fridays, **unless a solemnity should fall on a Friday.**

This is always the rule. There is no fasting or abstaining ever required on Sundays or solemnities.

Many I know feel that if they don't go from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday abstaining from the chocolate or booze which they chose to forego, it's not a proper Lent. I appreciate the sentiment and bless you if you want to uphold that. But it is important to honour these celebrations in some way. Easter is greater than Good Friday and there are far more solemnities to celebrate than days of penance and fasting in our church. We as Christians are ultimately a people of triumph and joy, not doom and gloom. I know I'll be having a Guinness on Wednesday and a glass or two of red on the Friday. Feel free to join in!

CONFRONTING SIN TO FIND LIFE

Jesus' mysterious statement at the beginning of today's Gospel that the Son of Man must be "lifted up" alludes to an episode during the Exodus wandering of Israel (Num 21:4-9). Finding themselves in the wilderness without food or water, the Israelites grumble against the Lord and against Moses. As a result they are punished with a plague of poisonous snakes. But God who sent the punishment has also provided a remedy: the erection of a bronze figure of the snake in question. Looking upon this figure acts for the Israelites as a life-giving antidote to the poison. The Gospel finds here a pointer to the coming "lifting up" of the Son of Man upon the cross. As the Israelites found salvation and life by directly confronting what was afflicting them, so those who "look upon" the Crucified One with faith, seeing him as the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world (1:29), will find eternal life. The following sentence (3:16) wonderfully discloses the extremity of God's love. While desirous that we appreciate the evil and destructiveness of sin by confronting it in the cross, God's whole intent in regard to the world is not to condemn but to save and communicate life. Judgment, then, is not so much something to be executed in the future. Judgment is something that believers already undergo when they expose their lives to the searching but saving light that Christ, as "true Light", brings into the world. It is to this kind of "judgment" that Lent invites us each year.

FIRST READING

2 Chronicles 36:14-16. 19-23 \cap

All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity, copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy.

Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed everything of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep sabbath throughout the days of its desolation.'

And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: 'Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth; he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up.""

GOSPEL

John 3:14-21

Jesus said to Nicodemus: The Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved. No one who believes in him will be condemned; but whoever refuses to believe is condemned already, because he has refused to believe in the name of God's only Son.

On these grounds is sentence pronounced: that though the light has come into the world men have shown they prefer darkness to the light because their deeds were evil. And indeed, everybody who does wrong hates the light and avoids it, for fear his actions should be exposed; but the man who lives by the truth comes out into the light, so that it may be plainly seen that what he does is done in God.'
