Guardians of the Tradition

Dear brothers and sisters,

On July 16, the feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, the Holy Father issued a *Motu Proprio* (literally translated to "of his own impulse") to the Catholic faithful. This document titled *Traditionis Custodes* aims at regulating in our church the celebration of the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite, also know as the Traditional Latin Mass. Archbishop Peter Comensoli has asked that we priests share this information with you over the weekend, so here we are.

In effect, the document revokes the freedom granted by Pope Benedict XVI in 2007 that allowed any priest anywhere the right to offer mass according to the 1962 Missal. Permission to do so now may only be granted by a Bishop and only in rare circumstances. The decision is aimed at ensuring what the Vatican II Council aimed at in its constitution on the Sacred Liturgy: the full, conscious and active participation of the whole People of God in the mass and to be uniform in that worship. It is also aimed at ridding the church of a division that Pope Francis believes has emerged between those who regularly attend the TLM and the rest of Christ's faithful.

In reality, the document impacts very few of us personally. Outside of the parish of St John Henry Newman in Caulfield, there are less than 10 parishes in our Archdiocese that offer one, maybe two TLMs in a week. There are, however, a small but strong number of faithful in our diocese who do appreciate the solemnity and the nod to antiquity that the celebration of these mysteries carry. Many of them are young adults and families.

The lockdowns and restrictions of the past year have given us all a taste as to what it is like to have the mass taken away from us: it can be very saddening and even traumatizing. All of us should be conscious of and keep in prayer those members of the Body of Christ who have been greatly dispirited by this decision. You would forgive these folks asking the question: why this and why now? With everything that should be on the Holy Father's table including clerical abuse scandals, Vatican corruption charges, German Bishops threatening schism, Coronavirus etc. (all of which has contributed to a bleeding of numbers in the Western Church), we've all of a sudden got serious concerns about the way people are praying? As our Archbishop himself has written, for many this document will be met with bewilderment.

How *Traditionis Custodes* will be implemented is yet to be determined locally. Whatever the impact, the desire for ever greater communion in the church is a noble one, and one in which we should all pray for.

GOSPEL

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee – or of Tiberias – and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.
