Dear Friends,

In reflecting on the Gospel of this Sunday's Mass when the disciples of Jesus asked him to "Increase our faith" the Lord spoke to them and advised them that they should be like the faithful servant who is faithful to his master and fulfilled the duty which was entrusted to him. Like that faithful servant, then the task has been done, in their manner, not certainly to take pride in, but say, "we are merely servants: we have done no more than our duty."

"Lord, increase our faith" is a request that we also make. We know, in fact, that salvation comes from faith. By faith Abraham left his land, by faith Moses led the people of God free from slavery and by faith he brought them to the Promised Land. But faith is not a static reality that one owns like an object. Nor is it adherence to abstract truths. Faith is above all a gift which we receive and which must be kept and cultivated. It is, as St Paul says, born of hearing. Every day therefore it must be nourished from the Scriptures and must manifest itself in prayer and charity. Jesus, in the Gospel of this Sunday's Mass, says to the disciples and to us that when faith is strong, it is enough to have it as a tiny mustard seed in order to be able to uproot a tree and transplant it in the sea. It is this power that the disciples of Jesus have received from God.

It is this power that we too have received from God. When we live out that faith in our daily living by a life of prayer, worship of our God and a life of charity in service towards our brothers and sisters. There are many tasks for volunteers in our parish of St John's that need many hands to help. May I encourage you all to take part actively in building up our parish community so as our faith community becomes even stronger in unity, love and service. Let us ask the Lord that same question as the disciples asked, "Lord, increase our faith", so that we may become faithful servants to God in order to transform the hearts and lives of others in our family, in our parish community here at St John's Heidelberg and in the wider community.

'Which of you, with a servant ploughing or minding sheep, would say to him when he returned from the fields, "Come and have your meal immediately"? Would he not be more likely to say, "Get my supper laid; make yourself tidy and wait on me while I eat and drink. You can eat and drink yourself afterwards"? Must he be grateful to the

servant for doing what he was told? So with you: Take up your burden now, walk 'til you find when you have done all you have been told to do, say, "We are merely servants: we have done no more than our duty."

GOSPEL FOCUS - FAITH

The disciples ask Jesus to increase their faith, but their question – and the reply given by Jesus – does not make clear the faith that they want increased. Is it their faith in God; their faith in themselves; or their faith in the people they are called to serve? The response by Jesus suggests that, in fact, it is faith in all these things. Faith in God and faith in self are intrinsically linked and Jesus makes plain to the disciples that this faith must find its expression in selfless service to others.
