PARISH PRAYER

Heavenly Father, we the parishioners of St John's are grateful for all we have received from the men, women and children of our past. Help us to cherish and maintain our parish heritage. Most of all, enable us to be people who welcome the stranger, the needy, the sick and the lonely. Like St John, our patron saint, may we be people who love others, as your Son Jesus, asked us to do. Holy Hunchbacks

Dear brothers and sisters,

Once again, a happy Easter to all! It is the most joyous time of year, celebrating and glorying in the resurrection of Our Lord and Saviour. I pray it has been a time of great blessing for you and your families.

This Sunday marks the end of the Easter octave – the 8 days of solemnity that the Church takes to honour that one great day of the Resurrection. It was traditionally known as "Low Sunday" or *Quasimodo* Sunday. The name isn't suggesting that we are all looking a little uglier after drinking and eating chocolate for a solid week, but is the Latin opening for the invitatory antiphon of the day, taken from the first letter of Saint Peter: "*Like newborn infants, you must long for the pure, spiritual milk, that in him you may grow to salvation, alleluia*". (*Quasimodo* - "as if, as it were"). The famous character in the books was of course abandoned as an infant at Notre Dame, hence his name.

It has now come to be known as Divine Mercy Sunday, as it is when we celebrate and honour what we hear in the Gospel: the Risen Lord breathing the Holy Spirit on the disciples and granting them the authority to forgive sins. That is, the ability to impart God's mercy. It's an amazing gift to the church and one that ought to be celebrated. We do this specifically on this day by venerating the image of the Divine Mercy, which we will have especially presented on the sanctuary this weekend.

The church has also extended to us on this feast of Divine Mercy the opportunity to gain a **plenary indulgence**. You may have heard the term before but not understood exactly what it meant. As the name implies, a plenary indulgence is something that provides us a complete remission of punishment in purgatory for those sins the guilt of which has already been forgiven. This remission is made available by the authority of the Church: the power of 'binding' and 'loosing' of sins (Mt 18:18)

There are of course always terms and conditions! To receive this plenary indulgence (in addition to venerating the Divine Mercy image) it is also necessary, within several days prior to or following Divine Mercy Sunday, to fulfil these other requirements. 1. To receive Holy Communion; 2. To go to sacramental confession (this can be up to twenty days before or after this Sunday); 3. To say some prayers for the Holy Father, and 4. Have no deliberate attachment to sin.

This Quasimodo Sunday, I hope you take the chance to make your souls beautiful in the eyes of God.

SECOND READING Apocalypse 1:9-13,17-19

My name is John, and through our union in Jesus I am your brother and share your sufferings, your kingdom, and all you endure. I was on the island of Patmos for having preached God's word and witnessed for Jesus; it was the Lord's day and the Spirit possessed me, and I heard a voice behind me, shouting like a trumpet, 'Write down all that you see in a book.' I turned round to see who had spoken to me, and when I turned I saw seven golden lampstands and, surrounded by them, a figure like a Son of man, dressed in a long robe tied at the waist with a golden girdle.

When I saw him, I fell in a dead faint at his feet, but he touched me with his right hand and said, 'Do not be afraid; it is I, the First and the Last; I am the Living One. I was dead and now I am to live for ever and

ever, and I hold the keys of death and of the underworld. Now write down all that you see of present happenings and things that are still to come.'

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia!
You believe in me, Thomas, because you have seen me; happy those who have not seen me, but still believe!

GOSPEL John 20:19-31

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you. 'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.' After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him: 'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.
