Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Last Sunday we celebrated the Solemnity of the great Feast of Jesus Christ our King, bringing the liturgical year to a close. It was with overwhelming joy that we celebrated this Feast when Fr Vinh Do offered his first Mass for us in our parish church here at St John's after his ordination to the Priesthood. We give thanks to God for his such great love through his beloved Son Jesus Christ King of the universe, Eternal and High Priest to show us the way to the Father. We give thanks to God for the gift of the Priesthood to the Church so that he continues his love and care for us. Let us pray specially for Fr Vinh Do as he begins his priestly ministry that he may always follow faithfully in the footstep of our Lord Jesus Christ the King of love, to serve God's people with a humility, care, compassion and love as our Lord Eternal Priest did.

This Sunday is the First Sunday of Advent.

The word "Advent" comes from the Latin word *adventus* which simply means 'coming'. But whose coming are we talking about? Obviously we are beginning to prepare to remember God coming among us, with us and like us. And yet, although the Scripture for today does speak of the coming of God, it makes no mention of the coming of Christ as Christmas.

Actually, at this time we can speak of three comings of God. The first, is when Jesus, the Son of God came to be born in the stable at Bethlehem. But, today's Mass also speaks of the final coming of Jesus at the end of the world. And, there is still a third kind of coming we need to be aware of, namely, when God enters our lives every day. Every single experience can be an opportunity to make contact with God. And we are reminded of that ongoing contact with God especially in the celebration of the sacraments, including the Eucharist.

In his pastoral letter, "Welcome Home!", regarding the lifting of the general dispensation from our Sunday and Holy Day obligations as of the first **Sunday in Advent – 27 November 2022,** our Archbishop Peter Comensoli says, "Our communities of grace look forward to welcoming you this Advent. As the anticipation of Jesus' nativity grows, might we also extend our arms in invitation and welcome to others. Many family, friends and neighbours still experience uncertainty at this time. Being a people who can warmly provide a place of refreshment, hope and light is a gift in all the messiness of parish life. Here we can know that the door of grace is opened for us, the medicine of healing is there for us, and the hand of help is outstretched towards us."

A new year in the Church's calendar begins today. So, Happy New Year to all and welcome home!

GOSPEL FOCUS - GET READY!

Jesus draws a parallel between the people in Noah's time and the people of his own time. What it reflects is a complacency that periodically overtook the Jewish people. When the people bound themselves to God in covenant their lives gradually became better. Inevitably, their lives improved to such a state that they forgot God was responsible for their blessings. They ignored their relationship with God and became complacent about their good fortune. Ultimately, their comfort was brought to an end and they recognised once again their need for God. Jesus calls the people to get ready because the pattern is repeating itself.

THE PURPOSE AND SYMBOLISM OF THE ADVENT WREATH Advent, which begins the Church's liturgical year, begins this Sunday, November 27th. Advent encompasses the four Sundays and weekdays leading up to the celebration of Christmas. The Advent season is a time of preparation for our hearts and minds for the anniversary of the Lord's birth at Christmas. The use of the wreath and candles during Advent are a longstanding Catholic tradition that was originally adopted by Christians in the Middle Ages as part of their spiritual preparation for Christmas. The wreath itself, which is made of various evergreens, signifies continuous life. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes the eternity of God, the immortality of the soul, and the everlasting life we find in Christ. The candles also have their own special significance. The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent, and one candle is lit each Sunday.
