look to improve our practices in support of improved student learning outcomes.

Thank you to Fr Vinh Nguyen for his pastoral leadership of our school as students celebrated sacraments and attended school and parish Masses. It has been wonderful to come together as a Pastoral Leadership team and serve those in our care.

I will return to the role of Deputy Principal where I will continue to work with the students, families, teachers and leaders at St John's, living our school vision and providing leadership in Learning and Teaching and Wellbeing.

Celebrating St John's Feast Day Taking Social Justice Action

St John, the patron saint of love, loyalty, friendships, and authors, was celebrated Monday 27 November. This special St John's Day celebrated the diversity of cultures in our St John's Community. Students, staff and families gathered on the basketball court at 9.05am for a Whole school liturgy followed by a parade and a presentation of cultures.

We thank students for highlighting and celebrating the many cultures. Students then moved into vertical groupings, meeting new students across the school from Prep to year 6. The day ended with a Whole School Cultural Diversity Assembly at 2.30pm in the hall, where a number of students and families shared information about their individual cultures and the ways they celebrate individual cultures.

PARISH CENSUS – OVERVIEW OF DATA

In Oct/Nov our Parish undertook a census to assist us in our journey forward so we know our parish family in more depth— who we are, where we came from and what we do.

As with the school report above where cultures were celebrated, as parish, we too, have much to celebrate in that the census data shows us that we are truly a multicultural parish and here is a list of countries where we have come from:

Australia, Mauritius, Portugal, Italy, Poland, Latin America, India, Malta, Macedonia, New Zealand, Malta, Malaysia, China, Philippines, Asia, Croatia, England, Ireland, Germany, Sri Lanka, Vietnam, Peru, Serbia, Lebanon, Indonesia, Greece, Europe, Hungary, Burma, Columbia, Slovenia, Zimbabwe, Seychelles, France, United Kingdom.

The largest grouping from the nationalities given on the census card (and not all listed their nationality) were Australia 54, India 29, Italy 23, Chinese & Chinese Malay 16, Polish 15, Philippines 12, Sri Lanka 12.

As can be seen from the numbers below we have had some parishioners who may have been away or did not complete the census card. The cards completed show us we have 408 people – inclusive of 94 Children and 19 students or young adults .

Ages: Under 20 - 88; 20-50 aged group—122 50-70 age group—78; 70+ age group—120

Occupations: The largest group identified were 80 Retirees, then 40 in the Health Sector (including doctors, nurses, therapists, allied health etc.) 21 in Education sector, 16 in a broad range of management roles, 15 in engineering and building, students 10 and home duties 10 with other occupations noted as under 10 being—cleaning, hospitality, lawyers and accountants.

Summary: The results clearly show us that we have a large group of people who are now retired and a large group of health workers- which is not surprising having 4 hospitals in close proximity.

We have so many cultures to celebrate—a wonderfully diverse parish with so much to offer each other as parish family and the wider community. Thank you to all who completed the census.

Survey of Parishioners

Parishioners were invited to participate in a written survey in September 2023. It comprised nine questions and space for additional comments. There were about 50 survey forms returned with more than 500 comments and suggestions. With so many comments and suggestions, ranging from the broad and general to more personal specific interests, this is headline summary of the responses.

St John's is highly valued

St John's is highly valued by its parishioners as a community and place of worship. Parishioners overwhelmingly observed that St John's is a reverent place of worship; engaging of the congregation; friendly, welcoming and inclusive. It is valued for its focus on the Eucharist; the traditional and respectful liturgies; and the centrality of the Mass, including weekday masses, reconciliation, adoration and the rosary. The prominence of music and the choir was remarked upon by many respondents. The outreach to the Primary School children was celebrated and encouraged.

The friendly, engaging manner of the Parish Priest, Fr Vinh, was cited in many responses. His homilies were praised and his openness to all welcomed. The work of many volunteers, especially our Parish Associate, is respected and appreciated. Post-Covid, there is a real sense of renewal and optimism. While recognising that there will always be ongoing challenges, the Parish is hope-filled. As one parishioner

noted in gratitude and belonging: "It is my local parish."

The welcome of families, especially those with children, the elderly and people of different ethnic backgrounds was noted.

The beautiful and historic Church of St John the Evangelist, including its many internal features and the surrounding gardens, is highly appreciated as central to the fostering of a Christian spirit and the encouragement of worship and prayer.

The community and social activities - including the Gems group, the morning teas, sausage sizzles and parish luncheons - are prized for building a spirit of community and camaraderie. The regular provision of information and encouragement through the *Bulletin* and the *Eyrie* are appreciated. There was strong sense that the parish is inclusive of people of many different backgrounds in the spirit of the 'universal church'.

There was also a desire not to rest on our laurels, but to build upon these achievements, as discussed below.

Building on our strengths

There were a range of suggestions about how to build upon what is highly valued at St John's.

Enhancing our Catholic faith:

There were various suggestions for enhancing the Catholic faith of parishioners. These ideas included: a range of talks, faith enrichment programs, bible talks, adult catechesis, missions, retreats and alpha course etc; a children's liturgy of the word and

special blessings for children; a youth ministry; a marriage course and spiritual retreats; an evening Mass and meditation; Divine office; and seasonal study groups. Enhancing the opportunity for private prayer - for example, dedicating the side chapel to St Mary of the Cross - was also proposed.

Welcoming parishioners:

While recognising the friendly, embracing nature of parishioners, there were suggestions for enhancing the welcoming experience. These included more people to welcome parishioners to Mass and hand out newsletters; and simple name badges for volunteers including those welcoming parishioners, serving morning teas or assisting in other ways and a medallion or sash for special ministers; more social events, such as trivia and movies nights; expanded communal activities - for example coffee and raisin toast after morning Masses and/or a cup of soup after evening Masses.

Outreach:

Many parishioners also stressed the evangelical mission of St John's. Suggestions included organised and regular visitation programs for elderly and single parishioners; a list of people who can assist with day-to-day living tasks such as trades people and computer advice; renewing the visitation program and Masses at the hospitals; and the preparation and distribution of a welcome brochure for the local community.

Building community:

In additional to the range of current communal events, there were suggestions for an annual fête or fair celebrating a particular feast day, perhaps with a range of ethnic foods; increased social activities between the school and parish; and more opportunities for the involvement of the teachers and parents of time; and expanded music for school children in the parish, such as a morning coffee for parents after school drop-off; and opportunities for more interaction between older parishioners and school children. While current prayers are inclusive, suggestions included special Prayers of the Faithful, and special Masses from time to time.

Structural suggestions:

Appreciating the rich history of the parish, members of the congregation were very supportive of the need to maintain and, when necessary, restore the structure of the beautiful, historic property. There were a number of current concerns mentioned: the provision of a new confessional; adequate heating and air circulation; the reconstruction of the steps to the church; and improvement of the lobby area; the upgrade of the toilets and the unobtrusive use of modern communications, especially for the elderly, school children and special uses such as funerals. Ongoing maintenance of the property, including regular cleaning, is also accepted.

Other issues:

Other matters mentioned included the provision of more electronic card readers in the foyer; the number of collections; an ongoing and updated list of tasks and volunteers; an art and craft stall, for example at Christmas the various Masses.

Looking ahead -

the 175th anniversary

The first Mass in the 'Heidelberg Mission' was held on 23rd May 1848 in the home of Alexander McKillop and Flora Ann MacDonald. Present at that Mass was their six-year-old daughter Mary McKillop.

The opening and dedication of the Church of St John the Evangelist took place on Sunday 14th April, 1861.

The 175th anniversary of the church of St John the Evangelist occurs on 14th April 2026, in about 2 ½ years' time.

Many suggestions were made for the celebration of this significant anniversary, embracing the establishment of a planning group, a calendar of events and preparation milestones. Specific suggestions included a Mass celebrated by the Archbishop and former Parish Priests, a luncheon or dinner, the publication of an anniversary book, an histori-

cal display, a plaque to mark the occasion, a time capsule, a Priests honour board, a special recognition of the contribution of the Sisters of Mercy to the parish and schools, historic talks, a concert, a school Mass and celebration, a coffee table book on the architectural features of St John's, a 'Back To' St John's event, historical snippets in the Bulletin and the Eyrie, a bookmark and so on.

It was also suggested that the anniversary could mark the beginning of a project of evangelisation in the spirit of St John and the mission of the parish. The need for an assistant Priest to enable and expand the missionary work of the parish, especially the chaplaincy to the local hospitals, was seen as a priority by many parishioners.

Appreciation

We thank the many parishioners who contributed their time and thoughts to this survey. It provides us with an invaluable opportunity to assess the role of St John's currently, and to explore how we can continue to enhance it as a home of spiritual, communal, family and individual enrichment in the coming years.

Giving thanks for all the help you have given me over the past year, and looking forward to continuing to work with and for you as one parish family in the challenges ahead.

As we prepare ourselves and welcome the celebration of Jesus' birth I wish you all a very blessed joyful Christmas. Fr Vinh
