## St. John's Netball Club—Adrian Daly

Most people in our Parish of St John's will be aware that we are fortunate enough to have a tennis club. With its carpark right next to the presbytery, countless parish and school families have enjoyed the three courts for generations. But did you know that there is also a netball club?

I have been a parishioner at St John's Parish since 2007, but I only became aware that there was a netball club seven year later. Alexandra, our eldest child, got the chance to join a new team of Year 2 Students. The exact origins of the St John's Heidelberg Netball Club is not documented, but it goes back to at least the 1980's as some mothers of current players recall playing themselves.

It has become a sport and club that our whole family have become involved with over time. Alexandra continues to play and has just completed her first season in the Under 18s section, I have been a coach for the club since 2016, and my wife Emma is club secretary and Juliet I our youngest is now in her second year of playing. Even our son Liam filled in once when a team was short of players! There are many families that could tell a similar story.

The club has changed somewhat during these last few years. It was run by one president with informal support from coaches and other parents. The need to address transparency and to abide by Child Safety Standards meant this changed in 2017.

Sharing the same name, former principal and Parish Priest, Nick Marinelli and Fr Mario Zammit supported



the re-organisation of the netball club to create a constitution and committee with the club being under the auspices of the parish.

The change, while difficult initially, has allowed the club to successfully gain grants and sponsorship to be able to update equipment and uniforms as well as host our own clinics and NetSetGo programs. Despite the setbacks with COVID, we have five teams playing in Macleod each Saturday throughout the year ranging from Under 9s through to Under 18s with a sixth team likely to begin in July. I was proud to be coach of two of these teams to finals recently.

We have current and past students of St John's ranging from Year 2 up to Year 10 currently with some of those older players now coaching the younger teams. However over time, I realised that I missed the company of people. I began to search for in-person connections again as the COVID restrictions were slowly released. I had also become "Zoom intolerant".

A friend told me of the "Made for Greatness" evenings at St John's and that I was welcome to come

The talks given by the priests in the church are always great and the social gathering afterwards starting to build some new friendships. I had forgotten how much I had missed this part of church life - that of being present among other faith-minded people is best in person.

God is gentle in tough times, and this was my initial experience of the men's gatherings. After the rough times of the past two years, it was a welcomed experience to be back in God's good care among good people.
