#### **MESSAGE FROM FR MARIO**

Dear Parishioners, Visitors and Friends

Scripture tells us the story of a God who is love and who, through this love, reached out to us so that we could get to know him. The opening of the letter to the Hebrews reminds us that in the past God had spoken to his people on many occasions and through a variety of messengers, in these last days God has spoken his full and final Word, Christ. The books and stories in the Old and New Testaments are proof to us of this great love of God.



This year I had the privilege of visiting Uluru. I had long wanted to visit and pay homage to this sacred space in the spiritual tradition of Australian indigenous inhabitants; for me this was a kind of pilgrimage. As we walked around this monumental rock formation and took in the geological explanation of its existence and the Tjukurpa creation stories and morality of the Anangu peoples, we were shown the different Tjukuritja, signs and marks left by these ancestral beings as proof of Tjukurpa. I was amazed at the similarity between our Bible stories and the proof we find there of God's immense love for us, and the Anangu peoples' reference to these Tjukuritja.

The similarity between our religious culture and the culture of our Australian indigenous does not end there. It is witnessed in a very special way on the Easter Vigil when we light our fire (the Easter candle) and sit around it enjoying its light and its warmth as we narrate these stories of God's love for us, his people. Indigenous people too gather around their fires and narrate their *Tjukurpa* and dreamtime creation stories, handing them down from generation to generation. After all, for centuries, our own scriptural tradition too was an oral tradition!

After Uluru I travelled through Alice Springs, Brisbane and Manila, on to a small parish community in the province of Bataan, north of Manila. Here I stayed with an old and respected friend of mine who is responsible for the parish of St Catherine of Alexandria, in Pagalanggang (Dinalupihan district).

Fr Joe has been journeying with this community for the past ten years. This is a poor agricultural community where often parents have to leave their children with their grandparents while they go overseas to try to find a job to maintain their family. This causes great disruption in the upbringing of the family.

Apart from offering spiritual support to his community, Fr Joe has also been trying to find a way to help younger generations build a better future for themselves. It is better to teach a poor person to fish than to feed him! If one simply reaches out into one's pocket and hands out food, the person might be satisfied for one day but will come back next day, if you teach that person a trade, then he can earn his own living and move forward on his own. Using this philosophy, Fr Joe has created the Jose Depiro Kabataan (youth) Orchestra, he provides the children in the parish with instruments and with teachers to teach them music, hoping that one day they might be able to use their musical knowledge to advance themselves and their families! Apart from enjoying the company of Fr Joe and the people in his parish, I was also truly inspired by this energy and enthusiasm as he reaches out proactively to these young people in his parish.
