

Dear Parishioners and Friends

Merciful like the Father

As we prepare for the celebration of the Lord's passion, death and resurrection in this Jubilee Holy Year of Mercy, it is important once again to reflect on God's infinite source of mercy.

God is perfect and in God everything is in perfection. When we talkabout God's perfect justice we also need to mention his perfect mercy. God's justice is seriously tempered by his mercy. While a human judge can only do justice by what can be discerned by limited human resources, and we know that at times this justice can be imperfect, God can see beyond outward appearances. God's perfect justice can see the inmost parts of our own

being and hence his merciful justice is always perfect.

The gospel according to John reminds us that God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life (Jn 3:16). This mystery happened in a special way at Christmas when the Son of God took on our own human flesh; it happened also when the Son of God was prepared to give up his life and die on the cross. If anyone wants to know how much God loves us, we only have to look at the cross! St Paul reminds us that God not only became human, but he actually lowered himself to taking on the shape of a slave, dying on the cross for our salvation.

We cannot overstate God's infinite merciful love. Yet this is not the end of the story. Pope Francis chose as the motto for this Holy Year of Mercy the phrase: Merciful like the Father. This is a

call for each one of us to mirror God's mercy among our sisters and brothers. It is very easy to judge those we think are less holy than us. In the gospel Jesus often criticizes the Pharisees and the scribes for the way they judge the taxcollectors and the sinners. We are all equally sinful and we all equally depend on God's merciful love for us. Our role is to be open and welcoming. In the parable of the Prodigal Son the Father tells the older son: All I have is yours. The return of the prodigal son will not in any way impact on what is already ours.

God's mercy is infinite and there is enough of it to go around for all of us sinners.

Let us be merciful like the Father!

Jubilee Holy Year of Mercy

In this year of Mercy here in Heidelberg we give thanks for the Sisters of Mercy. Founded by Catherine McAuley in 1831 the Sisters of Mercy started in Dublin to provide general education and education in faith for the poor in Ireland.

At the invitation of our parish priest, in 1910 the Sisters of Mercy commenced our school. Whilst we no longer have sisters teaching at the school we give thanks for all those wonderful women who did in the past. Their love of the Lord, their dedication to doing his work in our school and parish has greatly enriched our parish life over many years.

We give thanks for the sisters of Mercyliving a mongst us today and are now retired; some who spent years teaching here and as missionary Sisters of Mercy overseas.

We are blessed to have Sr Lore to tirelessly working as our pastoral associate visiting the sick and elderly, organising children's liturgy and the sacramental program as well as sharing her musical talents to enrich our weekly Masses.

Today, the main ministries of the Sisters of Mercy are in education, community service and health, including the Mercy Hospital for Women in Heidelberg.

Some sisters are educators, theologians, scripture scholars, liturgists, writers and publishers, researchers, archivists, historians, musicians, artists, bioethicists, ecumenists, canon lawyers, lawyers and advocates for justice. They are a talented bunch of women who give their lives to the service of others.

The Sisters of Mercy are advocates for people with no voice and for those seeking justice at home and beyond.

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
