MEDITATION

Today we read the little foreword with which Luke the Evange-list prefaced his book. This is a precious testimony to the reliability of the reports in the Gospels. Let us not forget: right from the beginning, Jesus' followers took an interest in keeping an exact memory of his words and deeds and in passing on an equally exact account. These were of course the words and deeds of their revered and beloved Master. The people in the first Christian communities did not want to hear fairy stories or legends but careful and accurate reports. They wanted to know how it had been, what he had said and taught, what his dreadful suffering in Jerusalem had been like, and the wonderful thing that happened then, when he did not remain in the tomb but rose again.

Luke quite consciously intended to provide an account of Jesus that was reliable, the fruit of exact historical research, based on the original sources. Like Theophilus in the first century, the people of the twenty-first century can stake their lives on the Jesus we meet in the gospels, and on his teaching.

THE LORD'S PRAYER: THE OUR FATHER

The Our Father is the only prayer that Jesus himself taught his disciples (Mt 6:9-13; Lk 11:2-4). That is why the Our Father is also called "the Lord's Prayer". Christians of all Christian denominations pray it daily, both in the liturgy and privately. The conclusion, "For thine is the kingdom ... "is mentioned as early as the "Teaching of the Twelve Apostles" (Didache, ca. AD 150), and so it can be added to the Our Father.

How did the Our Father come about?

The Our Father came about at the request of one of Jesus' disciples, who saw his Master praying and wanted to learn from Jesus himself how to pray correctly.

What structure does the Our Father have?

The Our Father consists of seven petitions to our merciful Father in heaven. The first three petitions present our basic human needs to our Father in heaven.

What position does the Our Father hold among prayers?
The Our Father is the most perfect prayer" (St Thomas Aquinas) and the 'summary of the whole Gospel" (Tertullian).
The Our Father is more than a prayer—it is a path that leads direct-

In our Father is more than a prayer—it is a path that leads directly into the heart of our Father. The early Christians recited this original prayer of the Church, which is entrusted to every Christian at Baptism, three times a day. We, too, should not let a day pass without trying to recite the Lord's Prayer with our lips, to take it to heart, and to make it come true in our lives.

Where do we get the confidence to call God "Father"?
We can be so bold as to address God as Father because Jesus has called us to a close relationship with himself and made us children of God. In communion with him, "who is in the bosom of the Father" (Jn 1:18), we are privileged to cry, "Abba, Father!"

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
