How do we fill in the time from day to day? It may be a good opportunity to do some spiritual reading. It's easy to order on veritatis.com.au *Love Unveiled: The Catholic Faith Explained* by Edward Sri (Ignatius Press) and YOUCAT, The Church's Catechism for young people.

Beyondblue.org.au suggests practical ideas for good health and well being: maintain a healthy and balance diet: regular exercise, perhaps a walk or a jog, some fresh air; balance the day with adequate rest and sleep, good mental stimulation like reading and music. While working from home try to demarcate your work area from family space and time. For us, build a dedicated prayer time each day, perhaps in the garden or a nearby park, for Holy Rosary, Scripture reading.... Us.magnificat.net/free provides great resources for daily Mass readings, morning, evening and night prayer, lives of the saints. MagnifiKid is great for family prayer and catechesis with our children.

3rd Sunday of Easter Vear A

Readings: Acts of the Apostles 2: 14, 22-33; 1Peter 1:17-21; Luke 24: 13-35

Holy Gospel

Two of the disciples of Jesus were on their way to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were talking together about all that had happened. And it happened that as they were talking together and discussing it, Jesus himself came up and walked by their side; but their eyes were prevented from recognising him. He said to them, 'What are all these things that you are discussing as you walk along?' They stopped, their faces downcast. Then one of them, called Cleopas, answered him, 'You must be the only person staying in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have been happening there these last few days.' He asked, 'What things?' They answered, 'All about Jesus of Nazareth, who showed himself a prophet powerful in action and speech before God and the whole people; and how our chief priests and our leaders handed him over to be sentenced to death, and had him crucified. Our own hope had been that he would be the one to set Israel free. And this is not all: two whole days have now gone by since it all happened; and some women from our group have astounded us: they went to the tomb in the early morning, and when they could not find the body, they came back to tell us they had seen a vision of angels who declared he was alive. Some of our friends went to the tomb and found everything exactly as the women had reported, but of him they saw nothing.' Then he said to them, 'You foolish men! So slow to believe all that the prophets have said! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer before entering into his glory?' Then, starting with Moses and going through all the prophets, he explained to them the passages throughout the scriptures that were about himself. When they drew near to the village to which they were going, he made as if to go on; but they pressed him to stay with them saying, 'It is nearly evening, and the day is almost over.' So he went in to stay with them. Now while he was with them at table, he took the bread and said the blessing; then he broke it and handed it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognised him; but he had vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, 'Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?' They set out that instant and returned to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven assembled together with their companions, who said to them, 'The Lord has indeed risen and has appeared to Simon.' Then they told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised him at the breaking of bread.

Meditation

The liturgy of the Eucharist unfolds according to a fundamental structure which has been preserved throughout the centuries down to our own day. It displays two great parts that form a fundamental unity: the gathering, the liturgy of the Word, with readings, homily and general intercessions; the liturgy of the Eucharist, with the presentation of the bread and wine, the consecratory thanksgiving, and communion. The liturgy of the Word and liturgy of the Eucharist together form "one single act of worship", the Eucharistic table set for us is the table both of the Word of God and the Body of the Lord.

Is this not the same movement as the Paschal meal of the risen Jesus with his disciples? Walking with them he explained the Scriptures to them; sitting with them at table "he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them.

God, our Father, our hearts burn within us as we listen to your only begotten Son; accept the prayers of pilgrims on the path of life. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.
