
TAKE THE WAY OF THE GOSPEL RE-IMAGINING OUR LOCAL CHURCH AS MISSION COMMUNITIES

At Pentecost, Archbishop Comensoli wrote to all the faithful of Melbourne inviting us into a conversation, to reimagine our local Church as mission communities, that is, a family of communities, working together. As a diocese, we are now entering into a period of discernment, encouraging local communities to begin discussions for how they might respond, organically and creatively, to this missionary calling. It is proposed that regional gatherings will be held when restrictions ease.

In addition to the facilitated regional meetings, ongoing support and leadership training will be provided for parish priests, lay leaders and communities as they discern how they might come together in a Mission.

Most Rev. Martin Ashe is appointed the Auxiliary Bishop for the Western Region of the Archdiocese of Melbourne.




Most Rev. Terry Curtin continues to be the Auxiliary Bishop for the Northern Region of the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

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
Assumption of Blessed Virgin Mary. 15 August.

Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus,

Today we celebrate the solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This day could also be called her heavenly birthday. This is the day when Mary was received into Heaven.

Before she was received into heaven, she was taken up to heaven. This event of "being taken up" is celebrated as her Assumption. There is a difference between the 'Ascension of Jesus' and the 'Assumption of Blessed Virgin Mary'.

Both the events look alike, and the words sounds alike, but these events refer to two different types of going up. That is why we use different words; in the case of Jesus, we use the word 'Ascension'. In the case of The Blessed Virgin Mary Mary, we use the word 'Assumption'. Jesus "ascended", which means

We know that in the Bible there is apparently no mention of the assumption of Mary. But for more than a thousand years the people believed in her assumption. Therefore, on 1st May 1946 Pope Pius XII asked all bishops in the world whether they thought this belief in the assumption of Mary into heaven should be defined as a dogma. He wanted to know the desire of the whole people in this regard. The response was very positive. Therefore, on 1st November 1950 Pope Pius XII declared that Mary after the completion of her earthly life was assumed body and soul into the glory of Heaven.

Since it is defined as a dogma, it is compulsory for all Catholics to believe in her assumption. But it is not compulsory to believe that the Virgin Mary died before her assumption or whether she was assumed without having died. One may choose to believe either of the two possibilities. Most people generally accept the fact of her death.

Since she was sinless, she did not have to die. But she chose to die, because her Son Jesus too chose to die. So She did not want to be exempted from death. Therefore, God granted her the experience of death, but did not let her body to decay. God wanted that because Mary chose to share in the death of her Son, she should also share in the resurrection of her Son.

Even though it is optional to believe in the death of Mary, it is believed by many that the place of her death was in Ephesus. Some other tradition says that the end of her life on earth was in Jerusalem. We have no real knowledge of the place, day, year, and manner of her death, if she did die.

One tradition tells the story that When it was time for Mary to die, all the apostles were transported by white clouds to the deathbed of Mary, each from the town where he was preaching at that hour. There is a variation to this story, according to which St Thomas was not present at the death of Mary. But when he arrived few days later, they reopened the tomb of Mary, but did not find her body at all.

Assumption is a sacred mystery. We thank and praise the Lord for this great gift He bestowed upon our dear Mother Mary. It is also a sign for us that someday, through God's grace and our efforts, we too may be accepted and received into heaven, and that we too may have a heavenly Birthday. 'May Mary, who was assumed into heaven, help us to see heaven as our goal and assist us on our way'. Fr. Leenus
