The online booking is available only for Sunday Masses at - 9am, 11am, 5pm.


Saturday Vigil Mass has not been covered under trybooking due to the cut off time being 8pm on the preceding Saturday.

St. Vincent Pallotti

1795 - 1850. Rome.

**Founder of the Union of the Catholic Apostolate and
the Society of the Catholic Apostolate
“The Pallottines”**

Feast: 22 January.

St. Vincent Pallotti, born in Rome on 21 April 1795, was known as the apostle of the eternal city (Rome) at a difficult period of time in history. He had been raised up an apostle to undo the spiritual harm wrought by the Napoleonic wars.

Even from his early childhood, Vincent was known to be a little saint. His school mates and teachers said, ‘We have an angel among us’. His love for Mother Mary was obvious even as a toddler; he often knelt and with folded hands prayed, “Please Mother Mary make me a good boy”. Everyday before attending the Mass he would go to Confession. On his way to school and back he would enter the church and adore the Eucharist in the Tabernacle. From early childhood, Vincent practiced self mortification and penances combined with prayers. God paid him back with many miracles, spiritual ecstasies, bilocation etc.

All the same, he was poor at studies, until his mother asked him to do a Novena to the Holy Spirit, which he promptly obeyed. From then on, he stood first in the whole school. So much so, that many students of his senior classes came to him for learning and to clarify their doubts. Having excelled in his studies he received his Doctorates in Philosophy and Theology and engaged himself in imparting the knowledge to others. And it soon became clear that Rome possessed a Holy Priest.

He fully gave himself into preaching in the churches and the squares, giving retreats, visiting hospitals, prisons, orphanages, attending to the homeless, the poor and the unfortunate. He used to hear confessions into the late hours of night. He worked hard and whole heartedly. He used to say, “in heaven shall we rest”. Vincent’s zeal embraced the whole world and every need, spiritual and material. He did everything out of love for people and for the greatest glory of God.

To attend to whatever may be the need of the time and place he founded the Society of the Catholic Apostolate (for Fathers & Brothers), and Union of the Catholic Apostolate (which includes the Lay members). Pope Pius XI called him “a pioneer of Catholic Action”. His motto was “the Love of Christ urges us on”.

He died on 22 January 1850 aged only 55. He was Canonized on 20 Jan.1963, during the Second Vatican Council. His ideals of involving the laity in the life of the church was taken up by the Second Vatican Council. Thus, we can see its results in the universal Catholic church of today. St. Vincent’s body lies incorrupt in the church of San Salvatore in Rome.
