



Sheep cannot survive without a shepherd; nor can we without Jesus.




Dear Brothers and Sisters in Jesus,

It was only a few weeks ago that we had reflected on the importance of sheep having shepherds to take care of them. Today the same theme is back. But why do only the sheep have such a great need for a caretaker? What makes them so different to other animals? Sheep unlike other animals

are vulnerable, helpless, and defenseless, so they need a shepherd. But then, how do we humans resemble such weak hopeless animals as the sheep?

The sheep are prey animals. They are not capable of defending themselves, for, they have no strong body features. They are not able to flee from

predators, for, their front legs are shorter than their hind legs, if they try to run fast, they are bound to nosedive and fall. And they have only a short vision, and they are also unable to raise their heads and lookout for enemies. Unlike their predators the sheep do not have long sharp teeth, nor claw-nails or strong horns. Adding to all these disadvantages, left to themselves the sheep tend to move about aimlessly, would wander here and there, and stray away from the rest and many sheep would get lost and be unable to find their way back to shelter. Nor are they capable of searching and finding pastures and running streams by themselves. So the sheep heavily and entirely depend on their shepherds for everything.



They require constant care and watching over. Without shepherds sheep would be in big trouble, they wouldn't survive on their own.

Is it not so surprising that Jesus should compare us the human beings with such vulnerable animals? Are we not the best of creation on earth? Yes, but despite our many amasing capabilities, talents, achievements and intellectual powers and more, we humans are extremely weak too. We are constantly preyed upon.

And that is why Jesus compares the people with sheep. Without proper leaders the people are lost and helpless, we could be easily misguided and dumped. We indeed need good guides and good leaders, who truly love us and care for us as their own.

From today's 1st reading and the Gospel we can conclude that there is none to lead and guide the people in the right way, none to feed them with good teachings, other than Jesus. We need Jesus himself as our own, the One who gave himself up for his own.

Keep in touch with him; don't lose sight of Jesus.
