## Plenary Council of Australia

From 3 to 9 July 2022, the Second Assembly of the Fifth Plenary Council of Australia commenced in Sydney. This marks the final assembly of the Council and conclusion of a four-year journey of collective discernment around the theme: 'Listen to what the Spirit is saying.'

As Archbishop Peter A Comensoli noted at the beginning of last year's deliberations, the purpose of the Council is to 'reveal the face of Christ' in our own time and place:

There are eight key areas that will be voted on in Sydney. The areas are:

- Reconciliation: Healing Wounds, Receiving Gifts
- Choosing Repentance – Seeking Healing
- Called by Christ – Sent Forth as Missionary Disciples
- Witnessing to the Equal Dignity of Men and Women
- Communion in Grace: Sacrament to the World
- Formation and Leadership for Mission and Ministry
- At the Service of Communion, Participation, and Mission: Governance
- Integral Ecology and Conversion for the Sake of our Common Home

We are invited to pray for the Plenary Members and for the Bishops that God's will be done and the Church in Australia can enter a new springtime.

## Free Emergency Food Relief Packages

Free emergency food relief packages are available if you cannot get food because of coronavirus (COVID-19). You don't have to be an Australian citizen or permanent resident to get the relief package.

**To get an emergency food relief package you must:** Be in self-isolation or quarantine because you have coronavirus, are waiting for test results, or are a close contact not have friends, family or other people who can help you.

**To get a package,** call the coronavirus hotline on 1800 675 398 and choose the option for support for people with coronavirus (this includes food relief). If you need an interpreter, choose option 0 when you call the hotline. If you cannot call the hotline yourself, someone you know can call for you.

**Financial support** if you need to miss work. For more information call the coronavirus hotline.

**What's in the package?** Basic food such as cereal, long-life milk, sugar, pasta and canned vegetables. It also has personal items such as soap, deodorant and toothpaste. If you need it, you can also get nappies and baby formula. The packages are free. The package will give you enough basic food and personal items for two weeks for yourself and anyone else you live with.

**Meals** If you are unable to cook for yourself, you may be able to get meals delivered. When you call the hotline, your details will be given to your local council who will contact you about support options.

**How will I get the package?** The package will be left at your door for you to pick up.



## 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C Good Samaritan

Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus,

We may well imagine the self-confidence of the man who undertook the dangerous journey from Jerusalem to Jericho. Then it was all of a sudden that he was robbed of everything including his self confidence. Having been attacked, wounded and left alone half dead, now all that he could see ahead was his immediate and sure death. He lost his trust and confidence even in his fellow men when he saw a priest and a Levite pass by, ignoring him. Then it was an unexpected Samaritan who brought him healing and helped him to regain his strength and confidence.



In our own lives too, there may have been experiences of helping someone or receiving help from someone else. It would be great to look back at our past and feel grateful to those who were helpful to us; (not necessarily from danger of death). We tend to forget the small instances of help given or received. However insignificant may have been the help we offered or received they are significant in the sight of God. May be just a 2 dollar coin towards the Vinnies; or a helping hand at Tony's Café or a prayer said for someone in distress, they are all counted as valuable help given to anyone who needed it. Even from one's sick bed one could be a Good Samaritan by just wishing the best for another in pain.

Whether one is the giver or the receiver, it is the Lord we represent. The giving person may be able to see the face of the Lord in the needy receiving person. for Jesus says, 'Whatever you do to the least of these, you do it to me'. Likewise, the needy receiving person may very well see the Lord in the giving person, for Jesus says, 'I came to serve'.

There may have been also instances, when we acted like the priest or the Levite of the Parable. We may have ignored to help someone or refused to get involved for whatever reason or excuse; We probably did not want to run into unforeseen troubles; so, thought it is much safer, and far easier, to close our eyes and go by the other side of the road, as though we have not seen and as though did not hear the cry.

The parable of Good Samaritan does not call for a lot of discussion. What it calls for is action; Jesus gives us the example of the Good Samaritan and says, "Go and do likewise."

In this Parable, the wounded man represents the humanity. During the journey of our life, we were the ones robbed of our grace-life by the evil one. We could no more place our confidence in ourselves nor in others. Being in sin we had become as good as dead. All that was ahead of us was our sure and eternal death. The Good the Samaritan who came to us was Jesus. No one else except Jesus could help us regain everything that we had lost. And in this way, Jesus proved himself to be more than a Good Samaritan. He did much more than did the Samaritan. Jesus took the place of the dying humanity and died in our stead, giving us his own life to be ours.

*Keep well, everyone.*

As she listens to the radio news, an elderly woman calls her husband in concern. She knows he is driving home, so she rings his cell phone and says "Dear, please be careful on the road today! I just heard on the radio that there is a car driver going the wrong way down the highway."

Her husband replies,

"Oh, darling, it's not just one car. There are hundreds of them!"
