According to the story, the funeral of a rich man was being celebrated with great pomp in a city in Tuscany. Anthony was present, and is said to have commented that the dead man did not deserve such honour since he had exploited and oppressed the poor. “His heart is in his money-box”, said the Saint, echoing our Lord’s words that “where your treasure is, there your heart will be too”.

So far, so good; but the story goes on to say that, following Anthony’s words, a surgeon was called in, who cut open the dead body and found no heart! A little later, when the family opened the dead man’s treasure chest, there was the heart! As a result, the dead man was not buried in the splendid mausoleum that he had prepared for himself, but in a cave by the river. In the center of the fresco you can see the surgeon opening the body of the miser, and on the left a relative of the rich man who has just found his heart in the money-box.

Open Parish Meeting with Jacqui from the Archdiocese

Re. Formation of Parish Leadership Team or Similar and Other Committees.

Dear parishioners you are all invited to our Church to discuss and plan as to how we can best help St Anthony’s Parish going forward. I have asked Jacqui Giuliano from the Office for Mission Renewal from the Archdiocese Proclaim Office to help run a workshop

On Saturday, 6 August 2022 from 10.30am—12pm. at Padua Pavilion

Jacqui will help us to think and pray about where we are as a Parish community, where we see ourselves in the future, and how we are going to move forward.

Our time together will involve praying with scripture, especially the great commission given by Jesus to his followers to “go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you” (Mt 28:16-18).

How do we make this call real and concrete at St Anthony’s Glen Huntly? We will consider the place of our Parish in reaching out to the community and bringing Christ’s presence to God’s people. This is what Pope Francis recently wrote about as the missionary option, which is “capable of transforming everything, so that the Church’s customs, ways of doing things, times and schedules, language and structures can be suitably channeled for the evangelization of today’s world rather than for self-preservation”.

We will consider the five pillars of Christian life as found in the Acts of the Apostles:
Worship, Evangelisation, Discipleship, Community and Service

To help us move forward we’re looking for a cross section of gifts to be shared through Parish Leadership Team or Parish Pastoral Council or similar.

We need doers, managers, reporters, representatives and dreamers to formulate and then execute a vision for the future. The focus of PLT or PPC is not the daily operations of the parish or parish administration. Rather we are focused on the big picture: how do we foster the pastoral life of our parish looking ahead in a strategic and long term way.

Anyone is welcome to attend this session which will form a part of the process for appointing members to the Team and Committees. Even if you are a little bit curious, I warmly invite you to join us in this important meeting where we look to strengthen the future of our Parish as a visible sign of God’s presence in our community.

18th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C

Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus,

People in general seem to be of the opinion that, the world is going from bad to worse. There could be many reasons, why people think so. It could be because very often we come across people who resemble the farmer of today's Gospel. He was a selfish and greedy person. He never thought of sharing his crop with the needy. Instead he went on to hoard and accumulate it for himself.



It is sadly true that, there is a lot of greed and selfishness in the world. Very many people exploit others in order to amass wealth. Such people never think of sharing. They would rather let their possessions get rotten but would not give them to the needy. In every area of the society we come across people of this sort. Therefore, we may be inclined to think that most people are such. At the same time, we know that there are many people who are generous and unselfish.

I remember a story about two brothers. Both were farmers. The older was unmarried. He lived alone, all by himself. The younger was married and had a large family. One year, both of them had a good crop of wheat. They harvested the crop and stored them up in their own store rooms. That night the younger brother couldn't sleep. He was anxious about his older brother. He thought to himself, Oh! my older brother; he is feeble and has no one to support him; next year if he is not able to cultivate the fields what will he eat ! Then in the middle of the night he went into his store room and carried a sack full of wheat on his back and left it in the store room of his older brother. At the same time, also the older brother was anxious about his younger brother. He thought to himself, Oh! My younger brother, he has a large family to feed. Probably he may need more wheat to support them; after all I am alone I do not need all that I have. Then he got up, went into his store room and carried a sack full of wheat on his back and left it in his younger brother's store room. Night after night they kept doing the same. And no one knew what the other was doing, though each wondered why the amount of wheat in their store rooms remained the same; until one night when they accidentally met each other half way. There they hugged each other and knew they cared for the other. *(There are good people in the world).*

We come across many people, who care for the others and share with them. And this is how Jesus always wanted His followers to be. People living in unity and love are so dear to Jesus. Sharing and caring are the only ways to store up spiritual treasures in the heavenly store room. By sharing our wealth, our time and our talents in an unselfish and generous way we can store up treasures for our eternal future.

To conclude, let us remember the words of Jesus in Mathew 6:19-20, "Do not store up for yourselves riches on earth, where moth and rust destroy and robbers break in and steal; instead, store up for yourselves riches in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroy and nor robbers break in and steal".
