Church Guidelines for the Current Stage of Restrictions

In the light of the guidelines from the Archbishop of Melbourne and directives from the State Govt. of Victoria, St. Anthony's, Glen Huntly request all our church attendees to adhere to the following:

General Instructions:

- It is advised that those who are over the age of 70 may not attend church Masses during this stage of the Pandemic.
- Maximum of 50 Attendees + 1 Faith Leader are permitted in the church at a time. (Lookout for changing permitted numbers).
- On arrival all must sanitize their hands at the church foyer, Follow signages on doors, on floor, on notice-boards and on desks.
- All attendees must wear face masks, unless for medical reasons.
- On arrival all must register their contact details by scanning the QR Code displayed in the church fover.
- All must keep at least 1.5 meter distance from each other in every direction at all times.
- Sit only on seats facing the 'yellow-labels' on pews.
- Just before receiving Holy Communion in hand one should sanitise their hands. Those receiving Holy Communion on tongue may come last in line.

For this Weekend and for the following weekdays.

- There is no prior booking for this Weekend and for any Weekday Masses, during this stage of restrictions.
- Church doors will be shut 2 minutes before Mass time. Side doors maybe open for wheelchair/walker access, emergency exit and for ventilation purposes only.

For the Next Weekend Masses (19th, 20th June) new advance booking is a must. Please note: Bookings, previously made for 20 June 11am Mass, remain cancelled. For the next weekend Mass attendance the new trybooking links need to be used.

- Despite your bookings, please arrive at-least 10 minutes before Mass time.
- In the last 10 minutes seats may be allocated to those waiting.
- Despite prior booking, it's a must, on your arrival, to register your contact details using the QR Code displayed in the church foyer.
- Church doors will be shut once the maximum number of 50 people are in, and in any case 2 minutes before Mass time. Side doors maybe open for wheelchair/walker access, emergency exit and for ventilation purposes only.
- Thank you for your understanding.

St. Anthony and our Parish

On this Parish Day of ours (includes our School), in a very special way we thank God for having given us St. Anthony of Padua to be our Patron Saint. And we thank St. Anthony for his uninterrupted prayers on behalf of each of us, our families and on behalf of our Parish & School Communities as a whole. We are proud to have St. Anthony as our Patron, and acknowledge all the favors we have received through his powerful intercessions before God.



This is also the Day when we thank and appreciate one another for

being part of this Family of St. Anthony's, Glen Huntly. In many and various ways each and everyone of us has contributed to the life of our Parish & School. The unselfish and generous support of one & all be rewarded a 100 fold.

Some facts from the life of St. Anthony of Padua (1195-1231 AD).

Also known as St. Anthony of Lisbon, for he was born in Lisbon. He was baptised Ferdinand Bouillon. When he joined the Franciscan Order he took upon the name Anthony. He died on 13 June 1231, aged barely 36. Was canonized a year later. He is also the Patron of Portugal, of innumerable number of Parishes, of Schools and of other institutions and individuals. He is most popular for being the Patron of the poor. His intercession is often sought for recovering lost items. He was a great preacher of the Gospel and a defender of Catholic Faith. He is remembered also for his many miracles.

One of the many miracles of the saint.

Tommy was a 20-month-old boy who lived with his parents near the Basilica. His mother had left him playing in the kitchen, where there was a large pot on the fire with boiling water in it. The little boy took a stool and started to peep into pot. He saw his own reflection and wanted to touch it, but in doing so he fell into the boiling water. Immediately afterward, the mother was back, and when she saw Tommy's feet sticking up out of the pot, she run to pull him out, but the boy was already dead.

The poor mother's screams roused the whole neighborhood, and soon a crowd had gathered at the house, including some friars from the Basilica. Seeing the friars, the woman was reminded of the wonderful miracles done by St. Anthony, and began to pray loudly for his help, promising to donate her child's weight in bread to the poor if he were restored to life. While the mother was still praying, Tommy arose as if from a deep sleep.

The miracle of the little boy who was brought back to life gave rise to the much beloved pious practice of giving bread to the poor as a petition or in gratitude for favors received through St. Anthony's intercession. Today, bread isn't as important in our diet as it used to be in ancient times, so now the friars of the Basilica of St. Anthony in Padua encourage the faithful to participate in this beloved tradition by giving alms to the poor. St. Anthony's Charities, which promotes many solidarity projects in poor countries. In this way the great tradition of St. Anthony's bread is continued in today's troubled world. Like St. Francis of Assisi, St. Anthony too had a preferential option for the poor.
