Church Guidelines for the Current Stage of Restrictions

In the light of the guidelines from the Archbishop of Melbourne and directives from the State Govt. of Victoria, St. Anthony's, Glen Huntly request all our church attendees to adhere to the following:

Face Coverings

Must be carried at all times and worn indoors unless an exception applies.

Religious Gatherings and Ceremonies

No more than 75 people indoors (numbers include celebrant, musicians and technicians etc).

QR Contact tracing

All venue attendees must register using the QR Code displayed in the church foyer

Those waiting for test results

Under no circumstances should anyone awaiting a COVID-19 test verification, including Clergy (even without presenting symptoms) attend a church or parish setting until a diagnosis is confirmed. Additionally, under no circumstances should anyone attend who is closely connected to people who are awaiting test results or who have tested positive.

General Instructions:

- For the time being, all Catholics in Melbourne continue to be dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass until further directives from the Archbishop. We continue to carry the happy obligation to keep Sunday holy, whether we can attend Mass or not, and can do so by any kind of prayer with members of our household and parish, reading holy scripture, and encouraging one another in our faith. Prayerfully watching an online Mass continues to be a great source of comfort on Sundays.
- (Sorry about the misleading sentence in our previous Newsletter, regarding those who are 70 or above. It was meant to be a simple/friendly advise to be more cautious in our vulnerable age. The elderly are not barred from coming to church). Most welcome!
- If you are feeling unwell, get tested and stay at home.
- On arrival all must sanitize their hands at the church foyer, Follow signages on doors, on floor, on notice-boards and on desks.
- Sit only on seats facing the 'yellow-labels' on pews.
- Just before receiving Holy Communion in hand one should sanitise their hands. Those receiving Holy Communion on tongue may come last in line.

For Next Sunday 9am and 11am Masses advance booking is a required.

- Despite your advance bookings, please arrive at-least 10 minutes before Mass time. In the last 10 minutes seats may be allotted to those waiting.
- Despite advance booking, it's a must, on your arrival, to register your contact details using the QR Code displayed in the church foyer.
- Church doors will be shut once the maximum number of 75 people are in, and in any case 2 minutes before Mass time. Side doors maybe open for wheelchair/walker access, emergency exit and for ventilation purposes only.

12TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME, YEAR B. JESUS HAS POWER AND AUTHORUTY OVER WIND AND THE SEAS. HE IS MORE THAN ABLE TO CALM OUR STORMS OF LIFE.

Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus,

we are all well aware of the recent deadly storms that brought devastation to many lives in many parts of Victoria and elsewhere. This Sunday's Gospel is very apt for what the people of Regional Victoria, are experiencing these days, while in Metropolitan Melbourne we are experiencing much more of safety and warmth. (Opposte is true re. the covid situation).



The severe storms of wind and rain brought down

hundreds of trees over house tops, roads and powerlines. The loss of lives and the extensive damage caused by the storm to properties cannot be estimated. Our thoughts and prayers are with those experiencing the pain and sorrow in these troubled times.

The natural calamities of this sort or otherwise are happening not just here around us, but all over the world. Believe it or not, there have been more than 150 earthquakes (above 5.0 magnitude) in the last 30 days in different parts of the world; not mentioning other natural and manmade calamities.

Storms are raging in our own personal lives and in our family lives as well. Storms of sinfulness, of poverty, of misunderstanding, of broken relationships, of faithlessness, of immorality, of illnesses and death etc are too common. There isn't a life without a storm. And these storms of life take various dimensions and they scare us off from our trust in the Lord. If it were not for Our Lord coming to our rescue, we would have been in deep waters a thousand times over.

2000 years ago when the disciples of Jesus experienced a storm in the Sea and their boat was being tossed about, they called out to Jesus. The response was quick and complete. This miracle and many other miracles of Jesus reveal to us that Jesus is truly the Lord who has authority over the whole creation. He is the one we or anyone can callout to in any sort of storms of life.

I am reminded of a hymn that we used to sing in our seminary days; "When the storms of life are raging, stand by me". Author: Charles Albert Tindley (1905).Tune: (Tindley). The touching words of the hymn would bring tears to our eyes. It can be sung meaningfully, even if one is not caught up in any storm. It can be sung on behalf of millions of people right now experiencing untold devastation of whatever kind. We ask the Lord to stand by the whole humanity, as we are feeble, while the storms are far beyond our strength.

In the Gospel, Jesus shows his power and authority by rebuking the wind and commanding the sea to be calm. Jesus wants us to call upon him to calm the storms of our lives and bring about peace in our troubled situations.

God always rescues those who put their trust in him, even when he is seemingly silent. He always works out things for our good. As we renew our trust in the Lord this day, may our faith never fail us. And may the Lord calm every storm ragging in our lives.

We are all on a journey across the sea of time to the shore of eternity. Let's hold on to the Lord of the Sea and Storms and let's safely cross over. Keep well Fr. Leenus
