Third Sunday in Lent Year A

Jesus and a Samaritan Woman at the well

Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus, Today's Gospel begins with a very ordinary scene: a thirsty traveler, a deep well and a thirsty woman. But something extra-ordinary happens. The two strangers begin a conversation. The conversation begins with a request for water. By the end of the conversation the identity of the thirsty traveler was revealed and the life of the thirsty woman was renewed.



The name of the woman is not known to us. What we know about her is that she was a Samaritan woman of bad repute. We also know that the Jews of that time treated the Samaritans badly. They even used to call them "dogs". In the case of this woman even her own people looked down upon her, because of her immoral life. But Jesus, in spite of himself being a Jew and in spite of having known what she was like, accepts her as a daughter of his own Father and reveals himself to her.

Jesus reveals himself to her but gradually; at first the woman sees Jesus only as a Jewish man, therefore calls him (may be scornfully) as "You a Judean". Then she recognizes him as someone greater than her ancestor, Jacob and therefore addresses him respectfully as "Sir". Still later she accepts him as someone sent by God and therefore calls him a "Prophet"; and still later she believes that Jesus is in fact the "Messiah", "The Christ", therefore runs into the village to proclaim him to everyone.

This faith journey of the woman was guided by Jesus himself. He led her from scornful attitude to worship, from misunderstanding to understanding, from darkness to light, from doubt to belief, from confusion to clarity, from thirst to the life giving water. In our lives, too, we need only to enter into a conversation with Jesus to know him in an intimate way.

It was her physical thirst for water that led her to the well. But, it was her spiritual thirst for the Messiah that led her to recognise Jesus. In the First Reading of today we heard that the Israelites were thirsty. They were thirsty both physically and spiritually: Physically for water; spiritually thirsty for the Promised Land. It was because of their thirst that God provided them with water miraculously and gave them the Promised Land.



Deep in every human being there is a thirst or yearning for God. Unless we really want to quench this thirst for God we cannot be led to the fullness of life in Christ.

A greater truth is that just as we thirst for God, God thirsts for us too. The thirsty traveler at the well was God himself. God thirsts for each of us, for our faith, our trust, our love and our lives with Him. Now at the well and later from on the Cross Jesus would be crying out "I thirst".

Jesus was physically thirsty for water, but much more he is thirsty for our souls.

A teacher asked her students of Grade 1 "If I sold my house and my car, had a big garage sale, and gave all my money to the church and the poor, would I get into heaven?"

"No!" the children all answered.

"If I Prayed many prayers and did a lot of good works and cared for all, would I get into heaven?"

Again the answer was, "No!"

"Well," she continued, "then how can I get to heaven?" A five-year-old boy shouted out, "You gotta be dead!"
