



On Friday, 6 May after the 9.15am Mass all are welcome to join in a Cuppa at the church and afterwards enjoy a short easy walk.





Month of May: Month of Mary










Third Sunday of Easter Do you love Jesus, really?

Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus,

There was a man by the name Jimmy. He was not a loving person. He was very irritable and could easily be upset. Some of his well wishers advised him to change for the better. Jimmy himself was struggling through his problem and tried his best to be a loving person. But he just could not change himself a bit. Others kept on insisting, 'you must change'. In spite of his earnest



efforts, Jimmy never succeeded. Years passed by, but Jimmy remained an unloving person. Then one day one of his friends told him, 'Jimmy, stop trying; we accept you and love you just as you are'. That day saw the beginning of his change.

God is love and He loves us beyond measure. He loves each one of us as if he has no one else to love. And in return He wants us to love Him and He wants us to love one another. But in spite of our earnest efforts to love God and others we fail very badly.

In today's Gospel we hear Jesus insisting Peter for his love. Jesus asks, 'Peter, do you love me? Even though, Peter's answer was 'yes, I love you', Jesus repeats the same question. But why? The reason could be found in the original Greek text of the conversation.

According to the Greek text, Jesus used the word "Agape?" to mean 'love'. Agape means a 'strong, intimate and very deep devoted love'. That is what Jesus expected from Peter. But Peter in his reply used a very weak word to mean 'love' in Greek 'Philein', which meant 'I have regard for you', or 'I have affection for you'. Jesus asked for 'real friendship' but Peter could assure him only being just 'friendly'.

By repeating the question using the word, 'Agape', Jesus invites Peter to a 'higher level of love' than mere 'affection'. Jesus expects Peter to love as much as he is capable of. Probably, Jesus remembered all those occasions when Peter expressed his deep love, concern and loyalty to Jesus. Peter on the other hand may have remembered all those occasions, when he had badly failed to stand by Jesus and had denied Jesus. Therefore, knowing his own weakness, Peter a second time uses the same word for weak love, 'Philein'. He could not change for the better.

Now it's the third time Jesus is asking, 'Peter, do you love me?'. We would think, 'at least this time Peter would use the word Agape instead of Philein. But we can see in the Greek text that Jesus himself changes his question/expectation. Jesus uses Peter's word 'Philein' instead of 'Agape'. Jesus comes down to Peter's level.

Peter felt very sorry that Jesus is now asking only for mere "affection, Philein" and not the deepest form of Love, "agape". And yet, a third time Peter answers using the weak term 'Philein'. Jesus accepted Peter's sincere answer. God does not disregard or despise our love even if it is not as good as expected. He accepts our love even though it is a weak love.

thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength: this is the first commandment.

It is good to note that, all three times Jesus asks Peter to feed and tend his sheep. That would mean: no matter how much we love Him or fail Him, no matter how strong or weak is our love for God; yet, He wants us to love and care for one another. He will consider the love shown to others as if love shown to Him.

Keep well, Everyone.
