  - Youth group

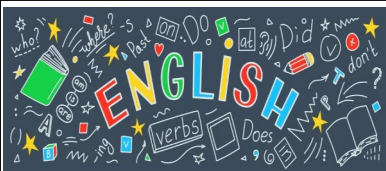

## Ordinary Sunday C 32: Life after Death

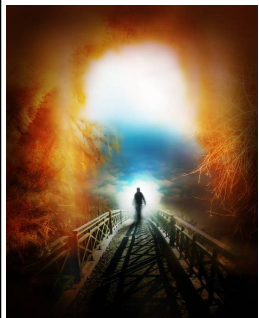


We Catholics have 2 versions of the Creed; the Nicæan Creed and the Apostles' Creed. The creed is the basics of our beliefs. We as Catholics have our beliefs different to the beliefs of other religions and other denomination. We begin the creed by saying, 'we believe in one God' and conclude by saying, 'we look for the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come'.

So, we Catholics believe that there is life after death; and that our bodies will rise again; i.e. not only will our souls continue to live, but our bodies as well. That is what we mean by saying 'we look for the resurrection of the dead'. But if we go about asking individual Catholics about what they really think of life after death, each might have a different opinion. A sick person in a hospital asked for a priest to bring Holy Communion. On her bedside table there was a Rosary and a prayer book; around her neck hung a small golden crucifix on a chain. The sick person was surely a person of deep faith. As she kept complaining about her pains the priest pointed to heaven and said, 'Well, when we get there we will never have any pain. She responded, 'I don't think so.'

Though the Church teaches us about Eternal-life and Resurrection and we keep repeating it in our creed and in our prayers, yet we have our doubts. We express our doubts in different words. The sick person said, 'I don't think so', some others might say, 'do you think so', or 'When you die you die.' 'I wish that were true.' All these mean to say that they do not believe in the resurrection or in life after death.

It is very hard to believe in resurrection or make someone else believe in it, because we have no proofs. As individuals we struggle with our faith. We live among people of other religion and denominations who do not believe in resurrection of the body, some others believe that only soul will continue to live, yet some others believe in re-birth. We get confused and therefore our beliefs are mixed with doubts.



The two religious parties during the time of Jesus were the Pharisees and the Sadducees. Their reason for division concerned resurrection. The Pharisees believed in resurrection but the Sadducees denied resurrection. Jesus very clearly said there is resurrection of the body. Therefore, for Christians, the idea of resurrection to eternal life is basic and intrinsic to our faith. We should have no reason to doubt.

A truck driver stopped by a café and was about to have his lunch. Just then, three motor-bikers walked in. One grabbed the trucker's cheeseburger and took a huge bite from it; the second drank the trucker's coffee, and the third ate his apple pie. But the truck driver didn't say a word or react, but paid his bill and left.
