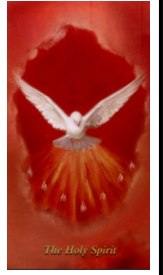

Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, Year B.

Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus,

Today is the last **Sunday** of this Liturgical year. The last **day** of the liturgical would be next Saturday. Throughout the Liturgical year we have been experiencing Jesus as our teacher, our friend, our doctor, our Good shepherd, our Saviour etc. And now that the Liturgical year is coming to an end, it is fitting that we acclaim Him also as our King. Therefore, on this last Sunday of the Liturgical Year the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Christ the King.

Though in our times kings are very rare, we still have an idea about them, because we read about them in history books, fairy tales etc. We know that, kings used to wear royal robes, a crown, and ornaments; they used to hold a scepter and sit on a throne. All these were well decorated with gold, jewels and diamonds to show their power, splendor, authority and wealth.

If such were the kings, how right are we in calling Jesus as a "King"? He certainly didn't wear like a king, didn't look like a king, didn't live like a king and didn't act like a king. He didn't wear a crown of gold; rather, a crown of thorns. And Jesus didn't wear royal robes, rather very simple robes and ordinary sandals. He didn't carry a scepter; Instead, he carried the burden of our sins, in the form of a heavy cross.

Jesus, the King is unlike any other king. He is totally different kind of a king than the ones we know of. In fact our languages do not have any adequate word to mean exactly what Jesus is. So, we call him 'King of kings'. He excels every other king. He is the best kind of King. There is no other true King.

The other kings were limited to particular kingdoms, limited by boundaries of their territory. Jesus the King is not limited to any country or a kingdom. He is the King of the whole universe and beyond. His Kingdom has no limits. He is the King of Heaven and earth. In Him all things hold together." At the Name of Jesus every knee bends.

The other kings had no power and authority over the nature; while Christ the King has it. He keeps the nature in unity and harmony. All things, visible or invisible come under the authority of Christ the King. The Sun, the moon and the stars are all obey Him. They are all brought into being by this King of kings.

The other kings were limited also by time. They were kings for a short term of a few years only. Unlike them, the Kingship of Jesus is eternal. His kingdom shall never end. He is the King forever. His rule stretches from the alpha of time to the omega. All ages and seasons are guided by Him. All seasons and times obey his orders.

The other kings were known for their might and power. But their might and power were not in themselves, rather in their horses and armies. Their might was shown in wars and battles. While Jesus, the King is Almighty in Himself. His strength does not depend on others. His might is often shown in gentle care. He makes the impossible possible.

The other kings could never know their people as Jesus knows his. They did not know even themselves properly. Jesus, the King knows us much more than we know ourselves. Jesus knows each of us by name and by our needs. Our weakness and our strength are all known to Him alone. He is all knowing. Our past, present and future are all known to him.

The other kings expected their subjects to die in order to save their king. But Jesus the king lays down his own life in order to save us. Other kings expected others to serve them. But Jesus the King came not to be served but to serve.

But Jesus the King Jesus never referred to himself as a king. But he did refer to himself as the Good Shepherd. He took special care of the suffering, the poor, the marginalized, the needy and the handicapped, the wounded and troubled. Jesus is our Shepherd King.

Let us always remain loyal to Christ not only on this feast of Christ the King but every day of our life be submitted to Him. He loves to be the King of our hearts, the King of our lives. Let us invite Him to rule over our lives as he wills. Wishing everyone lots of blessings from Christ the King. Fr. Leenus
