

Last Wednesday, 15th September, marked the 100th anniversary of the arrival of the parish hall on its present site. Over the years, this large old building has been host to many different activities: concerts, dances, basketball games, markets, cat shows, weddings as well as Kumon and Bingo which raised a lot of money for the parish. Christmas Dinner has been served there for nearly thirty years. When the school was renovating, the hall became a huge classroom. The hall was originally owned by the Australian Catholic Federation and was bought by our first parish priest, Father Cremin, at a cost of \$250.00. #### 25<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B. Dreaming at one's own expense.

Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus,

I suppose all of us have heard of 'dreams'. Probably at least some of us have been fortunate enough to have seen one dream or another. Sorry, I was kidding! I know, we all dream and dream a lot. I remember, some 50 years ago I had a dream and I was sharing it with my friends at school. They laughed at me and teasingly asked me if it was in B&W or in color. I answered them,



'it was in Eastman-color'. Really speaking I couldn't remember the color of my dream. And I always wonder if even the blind people can see dreams! I hope they can and they do.

Anyway, here I do not want to be talking about the sort of dreams we see while we sleep, nor do I want to talk about 'daydreaming', but about the sort of dreams that make us strive after something worth achieving. That sort of dreams or ambitions is what not everyone sees. That sort of dreams even the blind should be able to see for sure. Unfortunately such type of dreams many of us probably have stopped dreaming altogether.

If the whole world stopped seeing ambitious dreams, that would be tragic to the developments, discoveries and inventions; if so, the whole world would come to a stand-still. So, while it is important to dream and dream big, and have dream-projects, it is also important to make sure that we do not make our dreams come true at the expense of others.

In the Gospel of today Jesus gives his disciples a stern warning. Because, at least some of his disciples were dreaming of becoming the first among the Twelve. They were getting over ambitious, that too by pulling each other down, It is at this juncture that Jesus calls a little child to them and makes the child an example for his disciples to follow.

I remember a story about a little boy of grade 3, by the name Jimmy. It was the Annual Sports Day at his school. Jimmy was one of the contestants in a 50 meter race. All the contestants had only one thought in mind, to reach the finish line first. Their sports teacher had lined them all up. Before the whistle could go, Jimmy moved a bit away from the rest and buried his face in his hands and prayed for a few moments. Those who noticed him, wished that Jimmy should win the race. Moments later the whistle went. The race started, and Jimmy reached the finish line, but the last. Poor Jimmy casting his face down again, stood away from the crowd, but there were no tears flowing down his cheeks. Noticing him, his class teacher moved closer and tried to console him saying, 'Jimmy, I saw you praying before the race began, but don't be angry with God, you can win next time'. Jimmy raised his face to his teacher and said, 'but teacher, I did not pray for a win, I only asked God to give me enough strength to accept my defeat if I lose'.

Jesus did not mean to say that children do not have ambitions/dreams or that they should not have ambitious dreams. Jesus meant to point out to his disciples then, and he points out to us today that our dreams, our hopes, our desires and aspirations should all be holy and innocent as that of a child.

And again, we are not so much called to be entertaining our own dreams and aspirations. It



is God's Dream for us that we need to realise in our lives. Let's then strive to make the Dream of God come true for our own good and for the good of one another. God has dreamt a different dream for each of us. Only with his grace can we make it come true for the gloryof God.
