Sunday 24 September—National Day for Migrants and Refugees

Deacon George Piech Meat is one of three South Sudanese deacons serving his local migrant community in Melbourne. In 2004, Deacon George fled South Sudan with his wife and three children as a result of the Second Sudanese Civil War, one of the longest civil wars on record, lasting 22 years (1983–2005). Like a lot of their fellow South Sudanese brothers and sisters, they sought refuge in Egypt before finally being able to make a new life for themselves in Australia.

Since their resettlement in Melbourne, Deacon George and his wife have been blessed with another three children and three grandchildren. But without any South Sudanese priests in Melbourne, there was a clear need for his community to have some kind of chaplain, so his training as a catechist in South Sudan slowly developed into a calling to the permanent deaconate.

Deacon George was recently appointed as Chair of the South Sudanese Youth Justice Advisory Group, coinciding with announcements from the Victorian Government that new grants are being offered for community programs that support Victoria's young South Sudanese population.

For Deacon George, this presents a welcome change of approach. He says their community has often been treated poorly by both the government and the media, especially when it comes to dealing with crime among South Sudanese young people and understanding the root causes of it.

'Now the government realises there is no way to solve this problem by themselves,' Deacon George says. 'They need to work together with the community.'

As he sees it, one of their primary challenges is supporting the fractured families who migrated because of the war. 'The majority of families that came here, they're single parents, especially mothers. These children, their fathers were killed during the war. Raising up these young children without a father, it creates a lot of problems.' For some of these young people, there are no role models in the family, and this is why there are a lot of challenges now happening.

Deacon George hopes to facilitate more of a conversation between the South Sudanese community and the government. 'What we hope to see happen is for government to listen to the community. You know, it is our community. We know the best for us and the best for our next generation.'

25th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A

Today's Gospel is a parable of the "Laborers in the Vineyard. In it Jesus explains the two aspects of the Kingdom of God: 1) God calls everyone to work for his Kingdom; 2) God wants to give everyone the same reward, the eternal life.

The owner of the vineyard who represents God, goes out at dawn and hires a group of workers, agreeing with them to pay a fair



wage. He goes out five times on that day and hires more and more workers. At the end of the day, the landowner orders that an equal wage be paid to everyone, even to those who had worked only for an hour. Naturally, the laborers who worked the whole day long complained, because they felt unfairly treated. The landowner however, reminds them about what had been agreed. No injustice was done to anyone.

In fact Jesus' topic is not 'employment or fair wage', but 'the Kingdom of God'! And this is the message: there are no unemployed people in the Kingdom of God. Everyone is called to do their part; and there will be a reward from divine justice for everyone in the end. The reward will be the salvation that Jesus Christ acquired for us with his death and Resurrection, a salvation which is not deserved, but offered.

With this parable, Jesus wants to open our hearts to the logic of the Father's love which is free and generous. It is about allowing oneself to be astonished and fascinated by the "thoughts" and the "ways" of God which, as the Prophet Isaiah recalls, are not our thoughts and not our ways (Is.55:8). Human thoughts are often marked by selfishness and personal advantages, and our narrow mindedness. But God's thoughts and ways are far beyond our. He uses mercy, he forgives broadly, is filled with generosity and kindness which he pours forth on each of us. He opens for everyone the boundless territory of his love and his grace, which alone can give the human heart the fullness of joy.

Jesus wants to make us contemplate the gaze of that landowner: the gaze with which he looks upon each of the labourers searching for work and calls them to go to his vineyard. It is a gaze which is filled with attention, kindness. It is a gaze which calls, invites one to get up and begin a journey because he wants life for each of us; he wants a full, committed life, safe from emptiness and inertia. God excludes no one and wants each of us to achieve his or her fullness. This is the love of our God, of our God who is our Father. *God bless!*
