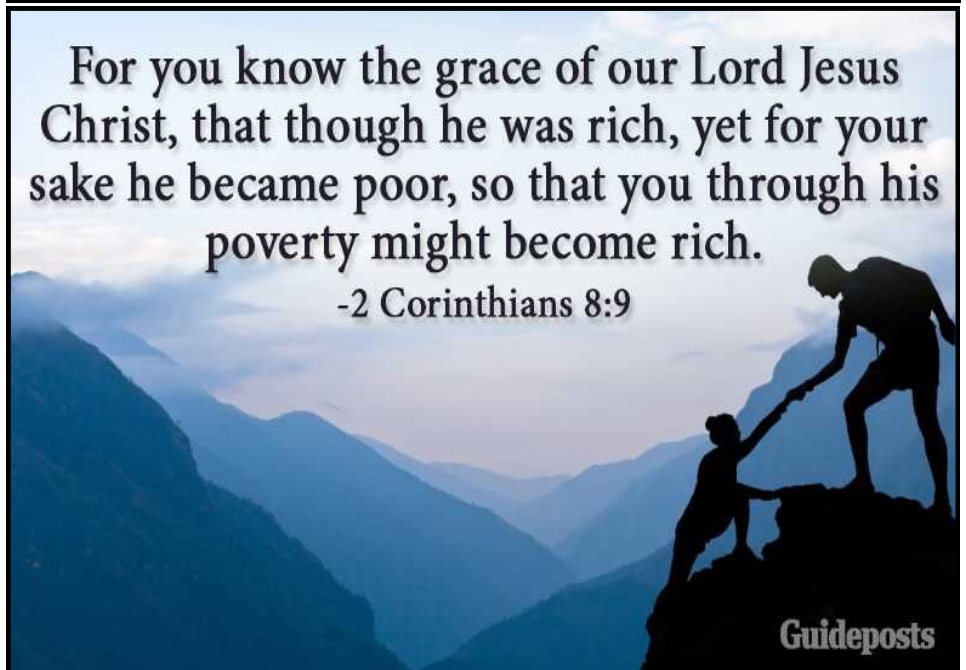

Lazarus and the Rich Man



Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus,

In the first part of the parable of Lazarus and the rich man, we feel sorry for Lazarus. He was sick, full of wounds, too weak even to stand up, uncared for, hungry, thirsty and poor. Anyone would feel sorry for him. In the second part of the parable it is the rich man who is the reason for our sadness. He is in untold pain, no consolation from anyone what so ever; His requests are all being rejected. We feel sorry for him because his pain is for all eternity.

Suppose, the parable had a third part, would that part too, turn out to be a sad one for anyone? In fact, the parable has a third part, though it is not yet told. The untold third part of the story is about all of us. The rich man was saying that, he had five brothers still living on earth. Who are his brothers and sisters still living on earth? We ourselves; our life-stories forms the third part of the parable. The tragic end of the rich man shall not be ours too. Therefore, today's Gospel comes to us as a warning.

How did the rich man end up in hell? We see him to be a good man. What was his sin? Being rich is not a sin. Did he become rich by unfair means? probably not; Did he harm Lazarus or anyone else? Did he kick Lazarus out? Did he get rid of Lazarus for being a nuisance? Nothing of this sort happened. According to our understanding the rich man was kind hearted. He allowed Lazarus to be there and allowed him to eat of the crumbs etc. Then why was the rich man punished for all eternity?

The rich man was punished not for doing anything bad, rather for not doing anything good. His way of life was so self-centred. He did not bother to care for anyone. Even though Lazarus was at his door steps, still he closed his eyes to him. Caring for the poor was not an aspect of his life. Therefore, he was punished with an eternal punishment. In today's first reading Prophet Amos strongly speaks against the rich people and warns them if they do not care for the poor.

Now, that we are still here on earth, let's do something for the poor. Though the poor are not at our door steps, we know that they are within our reach. It is so practical to help them for example through our Tony's Café or St. Vincent D' Paul Society or the like. No one has any excuse, because in many and various ways we could help the needy. St. Vincent De Paul used to say, "If we love the poor and do something for them, we can die without fear".

According to St Mary MacKillop, "Never see a need without doing something about it". Jesus said "whatever you did to the least of my brothers you did also to me." We have the teachings of someone who rose from the dead, so we have an obligation to reach out to every person in need; be it spiritual, emotional, physical or financial help. Fr Leenus
