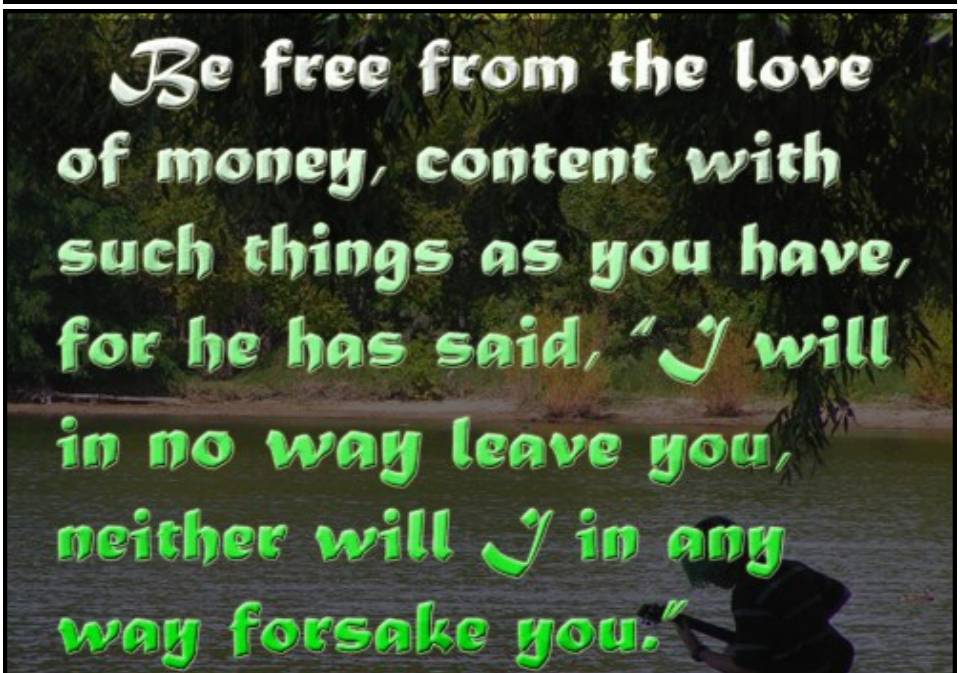

## 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C

### *Dishonest Servant*

Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus,

Today's Gospel is a bit puzzling one. It sounds as if Jesus is praise of the dishonesty of the servant. It only sounds so; in fact Jesus was praising not the dishonesty but the thoughtfulness of the servant in planning his future. Today's first reading says that, dishonest business system is not tolerated by God.

The Gospel passage has at least 3 topics. The 1st topic is about thoughtfulness. The steward of the parable was very thoughtful of his future and he did something about it. We should also be thoughtful of our future life and do something about it now. All our thoughts, words and actions have some impact on our life after death. Therefore be thoughtful of it.

Secondly the Gospel speaks about being trustworthy; Trustworthy in all things, in little things as well as in great things. Trustworthy in matters concerning one self and in matters concerning others; especially while handling money; Jesus says, only then one can be counted worthy of the Kingdom of God.

Third topic is that, money/wealth must not be given too much of importance. God should be given the highest of importance. Money will give you some success but one day it will fail you. Do not become a slave to money. God alone is our Master. We pay our loyalty to God and not to anything worldly. There are people who say, 'money is surely not god, nor is it anything less than a god'. That sort of attitude is not acceptable to us.

Yet, we know we can't live without money. Most of us have to make it, and all of us have to use it. We have to balance our budget and pay our bills. Everyone knows that. What then the parable says is that, in using the money one should use also his brain. The parable tells about a man who used his brain, to buck the system. Yet the point of this parable is not that it is ok to buck the system, but that, to enter the kingdom of God we need to use our brains and use the system accordingly.

Money in itself could be seen as something neutral. It depends on our attitude towards it and also on how we use it or misuse it. If we use it thoughtfully and responsibly, that is ok. If we use money thoughtlessly and irresponsibly it can put your life in the reverse gear. It can ruin our life forever. We know very many people who end up their lives in jail, go mad, or become murderers etc. all because of money. According to Jesus money is not even something neutral. He calls it straightaway as "mammon". That word is not a neutral word. Mammon means: anything we put our heart and soul into so that we forget everything else. Money is like that: it makes us forget more important things in our lives. It takes us away from healthy relationships. It blind folds us.

Jesus adds a practical thought: all this works out very well in little things. Most of life is made up of little things. We don't have to have big budget to take care of little needs. Just - each ordinary day - use your brains, think of our life after death, and use what you have, over and above one's own needs. Be open to sharing some of it with others around you.

Any way we shall not be as foolish as the rich businessman who was stopped by a robber at gun point. The robber said, 'your money or your life'; the businessman, mad after money, replied, 'take my life, I keep my money'.

We cannot forfeit our eternal life for the sake of little wealth here on earth.
