

A RARE DISEASE JOURNEY—NIAMH AND MAREE DALTON—Part 5

Weeks of Lent Themes - Week 5 - Waiting, Anxiety, Trust

Niamh and Seb both had an amazing time at the NTSAD Conference in Jacksonville . Whilst Mark, Jane and I spent the four days of the conference learning about research into GM1 – and how far it has come in the US, developing support networks, understanding physiotherapy, music therapy and other therapy options, learning about drugs that may/may not help, practising laugh yoga, and attending parents and relatives support groups, Niamh was in Camp Snuggle whilst Seb attended Camp Sunshine.



There was a professional photographer there too – and we were able to get some amazing memories of the experiences we shared together.

And, before we knew it, time was up! And it was goodbye to the heat and/or humidity that we had been enjoying for the previous almost three weeks in California and Florida, and onto the cold and wet of Washington, DC and the National Institutes of Health.

It was like an army operation to 'check-in' to the NIH – as bad as getting through the airport! High gates and security at every entrance, passports to be handed over and passes to be issued, and baggage checks every time we entered or exited. But our 'home away from home' here was amazing. Called The Children's Inn, Jane described it as 'Ronald McDonald House on steroids', and she had a point!

They organised activities there, and children who are at the NIH can go to school within the Inn itself. Every night, volunteer groups come in and cook dinner for however many guests are staying – and the three fully appointed kitchens are for use by all the families too. The staff even organise events for the kids, like the mascots of the Washington Nationals baseball team showing up one afternoon while we were there to play with the kids – and cheat while racing them across the playground!

The week at the Institute was pretty hectic. There were blood tests and scans and appointments and consultations and x-rays and confusion over exactly who everyone was (Mark and Jane stopped correcting people after the second day of being called 'Mom' and 'Dad' constantly).

Part of the research is also about her genetics. Blood tests and biopsies not just for Niamh. That meant that both myself and Niamh's father were required for the testing too. He only stayed for the one day, and once the testing was done, he went back to his holiday away from home. But Niamh didn't care! She was the centre of attention – from the staff and us as well. She

had her family around her, and some of the best medical experts on her condition in the world looking after her.

GM1 is extremely rare, and both parents have to be carriers of the gene in order for the child to inherit the condition. Niamh is even rarer still, as I am not a carrier of the gene – she inherited a double copy of the GM1 gene from her father on her third chromosome. This proved to create further interest in Niamh, and what this means in the future.
