GOSPEL

Mt 16:13-20

You are Peter, to you I will give the keys of the kingdom of heaven.

When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say he is John the Baptist, some Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he said 'who do you say I am?' Then Simon Peter spoke up, 'You are the Christ,' he said, 'the Son of the living God.' Jesus replied, 'Simon son of Jonah, you are a happy man! Because it was not flesh and blood that revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. So I now say to you: You are Peter and on this rock I will build my Church. And the gates of the underworld can never hold out against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven: whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.' Then he gave the disciples strict orders not to tell anyone that he was the Christ.

"Who am I to you?" If Jesus questions us deeply.

Biblical Reflection for 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time A

Today, the Gospel proposes two of the hundreds of questions that weave the biblical text: What do people say? What do you say? Jesus, the evangelists report, "did not speak to the people except with parables" (Mt 13:34) and with questions. Jesus chose these two particular forms of language because they make up a generative and engaging method of communication, which does not leave passive spectators. He was a teacher of existence, and he wanted his thinkers and poets of life: "The answers satisfy us and make us stand still, the questions instead oblige us to look ahead and make us walk" (Pier Luigi Ricci).

Jesus asks his people, almost as if for an opinion poll: Who do people say I am? The response of the people is unique, beautiful and wrong together: They say you are a prophet! A creature of fire and light, like Elijah or the Baptist; you are the mouth of God and the mouth of the poor. But Jesus is not a man of the past, even the greatest of all, who returns.

At this point the question arrives explicitly, directly: But who do you say I am? First of all, there is a but, an aversive, almost in opposition to what people say. As if to say: it is not believed by hearsay. But you, you who abandoned boats, you who have been with me for years, you friends whom I have chosen one by one, what am I to you?

In this question lies the beating heart of faith: who am I for you? Jesus does not look for formulas or words, he looks for relationships (I for you). He doesn't want definitions but involvements: what happened to you when you met me? His question resembles those of lovers: how much do I count to you? What importance do I have in your life? Jesus does not need Peter's answer to get information or confirmations, to know if he is better than the other teachers, but to know if Peter is in love, if he has opened his heart. Christ is alive, only if he is alive within us. Our heart can be the cradle or the tomb of God. Christ is not my words, but what of Him burns in me.

Peter's answer is on two levels: You are the Messiah, God who acts in history; and then, beautiful: you are the son of the living God.

Son in the Bible is a technical term: he is the one who does what the father does, who resembles him in everything, who prolongs his life. You are Son of the living God, it is equivalent to: You are the Living One. You are womb pregnant with life, fountain from which life gushes powerful, inexhaustible and unlimited, source of life. If we look beyond words, if we go down to their rising moment, we can still hear Peter's declaration of love: you are my life! Finding you I found life.

Jesus is not a heavy law, a superstition, a work of art, a historical man only, a blind judge, ready to penalize us, but a life experience.

Everyone at some stage must come to Caesarea Philippi and answer the question, "You, who do you say I am?" Where are the Caesarea Philippi places in my life where I have been challenged to identify Christ for whom he really is for me, for the Church and for the world?

Like Peter, do I struggle to accept how God acts in the world -- as Benedict XVI said, "through the defenseless power of love?" How does love transform scenes of tragedy and suffering today? How have I seen the power of God's love at work in the trials and tragedies of my own life? In the storms of life, what consolation have I received because I belong to the Church of Jesus Christ?



NEWS IN THE ARCHDIOCESE

Social Justice Sunday will be celebrated on **30 August 2020**. The 2020–2021 Statement, *To Live Life to the Full: Mental health in Australia today*, encourages faith communities, governments and each one of us to make mental health a priority. It is a timely message in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic. The pandemic is affecting many members of our parishes, schools and communities.

Understanding mental health will help us to be aware of those who need our support. The Statement encourages us all to reject stigmatisation, to work for the transformation of social determinants of mental ill-health and to call for policies and service provision that meets the needs of the poorest and most marginalised members of our community.

LEBANON DISASTER. Dear Caritas Australia staff and volunteers, It is with great heartbreak that we learnt of the explosion in Beirut which killed over 100 people and wounded thousands. Lebanon has suffered multiple waves of conflict and disaster. A drawn-out civil war, followed by years of conflict with her neighbours, has been compounded by the strain on resources caused by the Syrian war and an influx of refugees. Tuesday's explosion came at a time when the country is already gripped by an economic crisis and reeling from the impacts of COVID-19. The situation is dire. Yet the Caritas network is on the ground, doing what it can to alleviate suffering by delivering emergency food and medical resources at a time of intense crisis.

Caritas Australia has committed to provide immediate response in the form of crucial financial support as part of its already established Middle East Regional Appeal. Additionally, through its in-country staff and partners in Lebanon, the wider Caritas network is working to deliver:

- Food and water.
- Hygiene kits including masks and soap.
- Material for shelter repairs and the clean-up of debris.
- Medication and other health services.

Currently Caritas Australia supports two programs in Lebanon, including a Protection program supporting shelters for women and children who are survivors of gender-based violence, and a Humanitarian program supporting Syrian refugees and vulnerable Lebanese host communities. Caritas Australia will soon have a weblink for interested donors to support our current programs in Lebanon through our Middle East Regional Appeal. They can also call 1800 024 413.

At a time when prayer is so important, Sr Jo has written a beautiful prayer for the people of Lebanon, which is attached.
