First reading: Leviticus 13:1-2,44-46

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron, 'If a swelling or scab or shiny spot appears on a man's skin, a case of leprosy of the skin is to be suspected. The man must be taken to Aaron, the priest, or to one of the priests who are his sons. The man is leprous: he is unclean. The priest must declare him unclean; he is suffering from leprosy of the head. A man infected with leprosy must wear his clothing torn and his hair disordered; he must shield his upper lip and cry, "Unclean, unclean." As long as the disease lasts he must be unclean; and therefore he must live apart: he must live outside the camp.'

Gospel Mark 1:40-45

'Be cured!' And the leprosy left him at once and he was cured. Jesus immediately sent him away and sternly ordered him, 'Mind you say nothing to anyone, but go and show yourself to the priest, and make the offering for your healing prescribed by Moses as evidence of your recovery.' The man went away, but then started talking about it freely and telling the story everywhere, so that Jesus could no longer go openly into any town, but had to stay outside in places where nobody lived. Even so, people from all around would come to him.

WEDNESDAY 14TH FEB: ASH WEDNESDAY: **DISTRIBUTION OF ASHES AT THE 1.05PM** MASS. Ash Wednesday is a day of fasting and abstinence. This means no eating of (abstinence) and meat limiting consumption of food (fasting). The Catholic Church prescribes that on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, Catholics aged 18 to 59 years inclusive should eat only one meal (without meat). We can also have 2 snacks during the day (which combined should not equal a full meal) and unlimited drinks. Meat is forbidden if you are 14 years old or over. One should also abstain from meat on all Fridays of the year, or substitute another form of penance, such a prayer, fasting or almsgiving if one cannot do so.

The Stations of the Cross, otherwise known as the 'Via Crucis' are traditionally the remembrance of 14 events Jesus went through during His Passion and death.

They are:

1. Jesus is condemned to death 2. Jesus takes up his Cross 3. Jesus falls the first time 4. Jesus meets his Mother 5. Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus carry the Cross 6.Veronica wipes the face of Jesus 7. Jesus falls for the second time 8. Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem 9. Jesus falls for the third time 10.Jesus is stripped of his garments (sometimes called the "Division of Robes") 11.Jesus is nailed to the Cross 12. Jesus dies on the Cross 13. Jesus is taken down from the Cross 14.Jesus is laid in the tomb
