Dear Friends,

I wish to convey the sad news that Father Michael Anthony Patrick Wheeler PE passed away early Tuesday morning, 11 August 2020 at Epworth Hospital. He was aged 82 years.

Fr Michael was ordained a Catholic priest at St Patrick's Cathedral, East Melbourne on 22 May 1971. He was appointed Assistant Priest at Belmont (December 1971 – March 1972), Collingwood (1972), Jordanville (1975), Manifold (1978) and Newport (1979). He was then appointed as Chaplain to the Repatriation Hospital, Heidelberg in 1981 and then appointed Parish Priest of the newly established parish of Wheelers Hill in 1986. In 2016, Fr Michael retired and was appointed Pastor Emeritus.

The Archdiocese is most grateful for the untiring service to the Church of Melbourne of this kind and gentle man.

O God, listen favourably to our prayers offered on behalf of your servant and priest, and grant that Michael, who committed himself zealously to the service of your name, may rejoice forever in the company of your saints. We ask this through

Christ our Lord. Amen'.

May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

### **CARITAS AUSTRALIA/LEBANON DISASTER**

Dear Caritas Australia staff and volunteers,

It is with great heartbreak that we learnt of the explosion in Beirut which killed over 100 people and wounded thousands. Lebanon has suffered multiple waves of conflict and disaster. A drawn-out civil war, followed by years of conflict with her neighbours, has been compounded by the strain on resources caused by the Syrian war and an influx of refugees. Tuesday's explosion came at a time when the country is already gripped by an economic crisis and reeling from the impacts of COVID-19. The situation is dire. Yet the Caritas network is on the ground, doing what it can to alleviate suffering by delivering emergency food and medical resources at a time of Intense crisis.

Caritas Australia has committed to provide immediate response in the form of crucial financial support as part of its already

established Middle East Regional Appeal. Additionally, through its in-country staff and partners in Lebanon, the wider Caritas network is working to deliver:

- Food and water.
- Hygiene kits including masks and soap.
- Material for shelter repairs and the clean-up of debris.
- Medication and other health services.

Currently Caritas Australia supports two programs in Lebanon, including a Protection program supporting shelters for women and children who are survivors of gender-based violence, and a Humanitarian program supporting Syrian refugees and vulnerable Lebanese host communities. Caritas Australia will soon have a weblink for interested donors to support our current programs in Lebanon through our Middle East Regional Appeal. They can also call 1800 024 413.

### What is #EndCOVIDForAll and how is Caritas Australia involved?

The **#EndCOVIDForAll** campaign is an initiative that has brought together a broad collective of organisations including churches, aid agencies and other faith-based organisations across the country to mobilise public support for Australia to step up its assistance to vulnerable countries in responding to COVID-19.

Why do we need the #EndCOVIDForAll campaign?

The worst impacts of COVID-19 will be experienced by the communities who were already facing poor sanitation, overcrowding and limited access to healthcare. In many places, overcrowding makes social distancing almost impossible, and puts vulnerable communities even more at risk, while a lack of running water, soap and face masks means containing the spread of the virus is incredibly difficult.

During widespread lockdowns, many families also struggle to put food on the table. Countless households are losing income, which pushes those who are already living at the margins further into poverty and hunger.

How can people get involved?

For the campaign to be successful, we need as many parishes and people as possible to get involved by:

# PLENARY COUNCIL 2020 DEVELOPMENT

Plenary2020 is the first Plenary Council since before Vatican II, and so is a unique, once in a lifetime opportunity for you to be involved in the process to make major changes for the better in the way our Church thinks and works. We are the Church.

### Phase 1

This process officially started when after an extensive time of deliberation, our Australian Bishops proposed a Plenary Council be held in Australia to engage the Australian people to focus on what the Holy Spirit is asking of the Church in Australia today, in light of social values evolving in our community and in the need to address a serious breakdown of trust, and the need for governance to be greatly improved.

Pope Francis gave his approval, and the first phase in 2018/2019 was a listening and dialogue process where Australians were asked to voice their stories and share their concerns. It was our job to listen to those concerns, write them up and pass them on to a national committee who collated the responses into six themes. There were 220,000, responses received by the National Plenary Facilitation Committee including submissions from the Plenary groups that met in our own Parish and we thank you deeply for that.

### Phase 2

Phase two in 2019/2020 was a process of Communal Discernment on each of the six themes and again groups in our own parish met to pray and consider each theme. The discernment process resulted in proposed actions both national and local being submitted to the National Facilitation Committee. Our parish's submissions are available for you to view on your request via this website.

A national writing group for each of the themes considered all the national and local actions and proposals for change, and delivered a Discernment Paper on each theme. These will form the agenda for the Plenary Council of Bishops and lay people. Their assembly has been delayed because of COVID19 to October 2021 and again in July 2022. ### Phase 3

The next phase will include preparation towards the first Plenary Council Assembly. It is a time for the delegates selected to sit on the Assembly to prepare and an opportunity for Australians to further consider the Discernment Papers which reflect the original concerns expressed by the people of Australia. We urge you to take advantage of this opportunity.

They are necessarily lengthy and for that reason we have prepared a summary of them, with a subject index for ease of access to any area which interests you in particular. This summary will be made available to you if you request via this website.

### What we are doing as partnered parishes:

As the final meeting of the Plenary Council is now two years away due to the virus, the facilitators of the Plenary groups from our partnered parishes are meeting to think together about what the next steps might be for our three parishes. Presently, we are looking at local changes that we may be able to suggest initiating from the list of suggestions that have come from our own parishioners. We have had two meetings to set up those proceedings and will keep you posted regularly on each step we take and your input and involvement is critical to a successful outcome.

### THE ASSUMPTION OF MARY

Dear Parishioners,

Catholics celebrate the Feast of the Assumption of the Virgin Mary on August 15th each year. This Saturday, Catholics around the world mark the Feast of the Assumption of Mary, commemorating the end of her earthly life and assumption into Heaven. The Catholic Church teaches that at the end of her life, Mary, the mother of Christ, was taken body and soul (i.e. both physically and spiritually) into heaven to live with her son (Jesus Christ) forever. Human beings have to wait until the end of time for their bodily resurrection, but Mary's body was able to go straight to heaven because her soul hadn't been tainted by original sin.

The belief in the Assumption of Mary was a widely-held tradition, and a frequent meditation in the writings of saints throughout the centuries. However it was not defined officially until the past century. In 1950, Pope Pius XII made an infallible, ex-cathedra statement in the Apostolic Constitution Munificentissimus Deus officially defining the dogma of the Assumption.

"By the authority of our Lord Jesus Christ, of the Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and by our own authority, we pronounce, declare, and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory," the pope wrote.

The Feast of the Assumption is marked as a major feast day and a public holiday in many countries. In most countries, including Australia, it is a Holy Day of Obligation, and Catholics are required to attend Mass. On this important feast day, it's important to mark the significance of the feast as especially vital by emphasizing the necessity of celebrating the Eucharist that day.

Assumption Day is a chance for Christians to celebrate the heavenly birthday of the Virgin Mary. It is a Holy Day of Obligation - a day when Christian denominations are obliged to attend church service, so many people attend mass (church service) on this feast day.

Due to Coronavirus pandemic lockdown and the time of curfew in our state, we cannot gather to celebrate the Assumption of Mary this year, we can stay at home watching online Mass and receiving Communion in spiritually with the following Spiritually Communion prayer:

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things, and I desire to receive you into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, please come in spiritually in my heart. I embrace you now as if you were already there and I unite myself wholly to you. Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.

And on this Feast Day, please pray the Rosary and ask Our Lady to intercede for us all in our parishes. This Feast Day is a time to pray for our country, that the mother of the one who embraces all people without distinction, might help all of us.

Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, you have great faith. Let your wish be granted.' And from that moment her daughter was well again.

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# Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

The overarching theme derived from today's readings is the question of insider-outsider. We see here that the divisions and barriers that emerge out of human experience have been shattered by the graciousness of God. Jesus' openness to "the other" finds a precedent in the prophetic tradition. Isaiah spoke of a time when outsiders would join insiders in worshiping God, thus dissolving the categories of insider and outsider. He was, of course, referring to the age of eschatological fulfillment. This age dawned with the coming of Jesus. Jesus himself moved out of the constraints of his own cultural worldview, and he directs us to do the same. People are either excluded because of gender, culture, or religious perspective, or included only because they are able and willing to conform to discriminatory standards. In the reign of God, this should not be the case. People are accepted along with their own cultural profiles.

God's embrace first enclosed even those who rejected Jesus, and then God's plan of salvation unfolded in a new way. An invitation to enter the kingdom was issued to the Gentiles, those who had been considered outsiders. If outsiders are now insiders, what has happened to the former insiders? Paul insists that they are still insiders. God has not simply shifted the identifying boundaries; God has dissolved them. In the interim between the dawning of the eschatological age and the end of time, the invitation to be included remains open to all.
