## FEAST OF SACRED HEART

The Feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus (*Latin: Sollemnitatis Sacratissimi Cordis Iesu*) is a solemnity in the liturgical calendar of the Roman Catholic Church. It falls 19 days after Pentecost, on a Friday. The earliest possible date is May 29th, as in 1818 and 2285. The latest possible date is July 2nd, as in 1943 and 2038. The devotion to the Sacred Heart is one of the most widely practiced and well known Catholic devotions, taking Jesus Christ's physical heart as the representation of his divine love for humanity.

This year the Feast is celebrated on Friday 19th June.

## BIG THANKS TO EVERYONE!

Dear Parishioners of Sacred Heart, St. Peter's and St Thomas and St Mary's Parishes, Yesterday, the 17th of June, was a special day for me - my 50th Birthday. I have received many best wishes and prayers from you. Many of you have called me by phone and sent me best wishes on my birthday. Some of you sent best wishes and prayers by email. Many of you sent me messages of best wishes and support by phone, some of you sent me letters, cards with lovely writing with lovely wishes. Another family came to my door and brought a valuable gift for me on my birthday. I have also received many valuable gifts, presents from the Parishioners of our Parishes and even some people who are outside the Parishes.

Thank you very much for your attention, your care, your love, your kindness, your generosity and your support. May almighty God help me to bless you, protect you and keep you and your family safe always. I would like to take this opportunity to share something relating to my Birthday to thank God, thank my Parents, thank everyone who has been involved in my stages of growth, and thank all of you. To do this work, I went to the internet and Mr Google to help me know that the unborn baby spends around 38 weeks in the womb, but the average length of pregnancy is counted as 40 weeks. This is because pregnancy is counted from the first day of the woman's last period, not the date of conception, which generally occurs two weeks later. Following the Vietnamese style, we do not count how many weeks the unborn baby spends in the womb of the mother. Instead, we count by month, how many months. According to the experience of Vietnamese people they tell me that the unborn baby normally spends 9 months and 10 days in the womb of the mother. I tried to find out the time which an unborn baby spent in the womb because the situation of my birthday was unusual - I was born after spending only 7 months in my mother's womb, not 9 months and 10 days like others.

My Mum told me the real story about me. At that time my family was very poor. Everyone in the family worked very hard to fight for life because there was not enough food to eat. Although my Mum was 7 months pregnant with me, she still had to work on the rice farm. The temperature was 38-40 degrees in the summer time. The 17th of June 1970 was the hottest day in that month. My Mum collected rice from the early morning up to 11:30 am. On the road home, she felt too hot and so she went down into the stream to take a swim to help relieve the heat. She and another lady swam to a deep place and dived. When she floated out of the water and looked around, the surrounding water was all red. She was very worried and asked her friend to come close to her and check why the water around her was red. That lady came and helped my Mum to go up onto the bank of the stream. I was born there, on the bank of the stream. My Mum thought that she was having a miscarriage because she was only seven months pregnant. The friend went to the village to get help and the people came and used a hammock to carry my Mum and me home.

At that time the war in my country between the North and the South was still very terrible. Many troops built a camp and dug caves to live in my village. Fortunately, the military unit stationed in our garden contained military doctors. They set up a very simple clinic there to serve the troops and the people in the area. With my circumstance, the doctors looked after me very well. At this time also, most of the people were poor. We did not have enough food, not enough clean water to drink, no milk, no sugar, no medication. My Mum did not have enough breast-milk for me to breastfeed. Thanks to the military doctors who lived in my garden for they had milk, sugar and medication to help me and so I grew up slowly through the care of my Mum and the doctors. My Mum told me that at birth I weighted 0.7 kilogram. Everyone thought I could not survive. However, I did survive with the help of the military doctors and with my Mum's care. After one year I was normal size. On my journey of life, stage by stage I have grown up and am now living among you. I have done alright for half of my life. I think and I hope that I will live well another half of my journey of life - 50 or more than 50 years ahead.

Celebrating my birthday this year I would like to thank my parents, especially my Mum very much for her sacrifice in giving me life. I thank the military doctors who saved my life by their care and medication when they fed me with their milk, sugar.., Thank God and thank everyone who has been involved in building up my life - both my physical and spiritual life. May God bless all! My dear parishioners living with you in Australia, I have learnt many good things and recognize that the Vietnamese and Australian Catholics practice of celebrating Birthdays and Feast Days is very different. For example, the Catholic Vietnamese people do not celebrate or organize the birthday of their priests. However, they celebrate and organize a big party for their priests on their Feast Day (Baptismal Day - Patron Day). Every year on the Patron Day of the parish priest there is a day off for everyone in the parish. The parishioners choose some fat buffalos, some fat bulls, some big pig, or some fat goats to kill them for celebrating the feast day of their parish priest. I wonder if I were a priest in Vietnam if there would be some buffalos, some bulls, pigs and many goats killed to celebrate my feast day of the 13th of June (my Patron Day). However, I had nothing on my feast day here! On the Birthday of the parish priest the parishioners do not celebrate with him on that day. Up to this century, the 21st century, the people in my homeland in rural areas and the countryside do not know how to celebrate Birthdays for anyone. Therefore, the Vietnamese people's birthday is not important. Here in Australia it is the opposite, Australian Catholics do not celebrate the Feast Day (the Patron Day) for their priests, however, they organize and celebrate a big party for their priests and they give their priests many gifts both spiritual and physical presents on their birthday. Anyway, thanks be to God! Because I am a priest in Australia, my dear parishioners in these parishes have given me many precious gifts on my birthday. Once again, I would like to thank you all for your love, your generosity and your support!

death reigned over all from Adam to Moses,

fall. If it is certain that through one man's

according to Matthew**

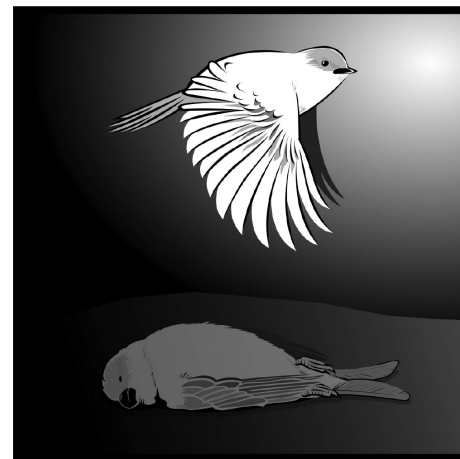
*Do not fear those who can kill the body.*

Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows:  
'Do not be afraid. For everything that is now  
covered will be uncovered, and everything  
now hidden will be made clear. What I say to  
you in the dark, tell in the daylight;  
what you hear in whispers, proclaim from  
the house-tops.

'Do not be afraid of those who kill the body  
but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather  
who can destroy both body and soul in hell.  
Can you not buy two sparrows for a penny?  
And yet not one falls to the ground without  
your Father knowing. Why, every hair on  
your head has been counted. So there is no  
need to be afraid; you are worth more than  
hundreds of sparrows.

'So if anyone declares himself for me in  
the presence of men, I will declare myself  
for him in the presence of my Father in  
heaven. But the one who disowns me in  
the presence of men, I will disown in the  
presence of my Father in heaven.'

The psalm responses are from the English Translation of the  
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**Reflection** by Fr Michael Tate

Our Gospel reads: '... not one [sparrow] falls to the ground without your Father knowing.'

But that is a bad translation. The Greek simply says 'not one [sparrow] will fall to the ground without your Father.' Full stop! Our Heavenly Father accompanies a dying sparrow as it dies! That is the measure of the Creator's love for all creatures. God wants to – does – enter into the moment of death, *our* moment of death.

Now, that *would* be consoling if I were facing what Jesus was foreseeing for his disciples in the first century.

One of the first Christian groups to hear this Gospel was that set around the Tigris River running through Baghdad in modern day Iraq. Now they face terrible persecution from fanatical Muslims. We can barely imagine hearing today's Gospel amongst the remnant, left in Baghdad today. How does 'Do not be afraid' really sound to them?

So, we could pause for a moment to pray for those for whom today's Gospel is a challenge beyond our imagining.
