Dear Parishioners of Sacred Heart, Diamond Creek, St. Mary's, Greensborough and St. Thomas, North Greensborough,

I recently listened to an interview on ABC Radio of a remarkable young man by the name of Abbas Nazari discussing his recently published book "After the Tampa: From Afganistan to New Zealand". He was a seven year old boy fleeing the Taliban with his family, when he, with over 430 refugees, were rescued from a sinking boat off the coast of Australia by the cargo ship, Tampa, 20 years ago in 2001. Taken to New Zealand as his new home, his exceptional life journey about surviving, arriving and thriving from being a refugee to a Fulbright scholar in New York is a wonderful story about gratitude, resilience, growth and flourishing. You might like to listen to one of several podcasts of interviews of Nazari. What he said at the end of this particular interview struck me – "Adversity is a GIFT that everyone receives. Opportunity hides behind adversity, and so it can be used to become stronger, wiser and more prepared." The huge adversity for Nazari became the source of wonderful growth as a human being.

I reflected on the relevance of Nazari's story to the common adversity we have faced globally with the COVID Pandemic. Despite all the hardships, deaths as a result of the Coronavirus, the economic chaos and the collapse of businesses and industries, perhaps these past two years have also been for individuals, societies and globally, a time that should afford the opportunity to make changes in our lives and lifestyles. What are the good things we have learnt that we can take into the future, and what are the life-sapping, maybe even destructive behaviours that we need to leave behind? These are some of the thoughts I have as we

conclude this year about adversity and opportunity for growth and change.

I am extremely grateful for the support and dedicated commitment to pastoral work in our parishes by Jacinta Bright and Sr. Margaret Sapsford, our Pastoral Associates. These last two years have placed considerable demands on our pastoral activities, especially in relation to organising, developing and maintaining extraordinary processes of COVID-safe practices. A team of volunteers has responded to calls for cleaning and sanitising our churches after each ceremony as well as COVID Marshalling as people enter our churches for ceremonies. I am particularly grateful to Pat Guatta, Lisa Leahy, Francesca Olofsson and Sharon Prosser, our parish secretaries who are the immediate face and voice of the parish offices and who especially assist me in my administrative responsibilities. I also thank Denise Chang-Faux, who organised the Trybookings process for our Masses at St. Mary's. They have all worked either at home or in the parish offices when they were able to do so, under very difficult circumstances.

Over the past two years, as we have been restricted to our own homes during the many days of Lockdown, opportunities have presented themselves to work differently and explore innovative ways of being connected. Our Friday Morning Teas across the parishes have enabled people to be connected and socialise with one another online. Two sessions of presentations over Zoom entitled "The Wonders of the Cosmos" led by a parishioner, John O'Connor, a cosmologist, Jacinta and myself have explored the connections and interrelationship between the truths of our Catholic Faith with the new insights gained from the physical and natural sciences. Sunday Masses have been videoed and live-streamed since March 2020 to connect with parishioners in prayer and worship. Faith Formation nights with parents whose children are preparing for the Sacraments have been held using a communications platform - "Zoom" – a word that has taken up an entirely new meaning during the Pandemic. These are just some of the examples of how we have used modern technology to offer opportunities for faith formation and social interaction.

Parishioners have also reached out through phone calls and letter drops to express our parishes' expression of care for each other. I am grateful for the ways they have expressed this outreach.

The year has placed massive demands on our schools to provide online learning. The coordination of this for the education and welfare of our children has required a great deal of wise leadership and coordination with staff and parents. Parents have realised the wonderful work that teachers do as they have more actively participated in the education of their children. I would like to express my deep gratitude to Jim O'Sullivan, David Delaney and Marisa Matthys, our school principals; because it is together that we lead the parishes in pastoral care, education and spiritual formation.

We are also reliant on the many groups and committees with whom we work collaboratively, particularly the Parish Pastoral

Councils, Finance Committees, the School Advisory Boards and Parish Education Board. I would like to express my deep gratitude to the many individuals and groups who dedicate so much time and energy to the life of our parishes in liturgy, pastoral care, catechesis, faith formation, fundraising, peer support and ministry and property maintenance and development because they are committed to the enrichment of our communities by what they do. In general I would like to thank everyone's involvement in the life of our parishes because your contribution and participation is what continues to give these communities their great spirit and energy and expresses a welcome to those who come to us with their needs.

Finally, I thank the many parishioners who have showered me with gifts for Christmas; for your thoughtfulness and care of me throughout the year. I pray that each of you may have a joyous, peace-filled celebration of Christmas with your loved ones. May God guard you and keep you safe these holidays, especially as you travel. I pray that you may be revitalized for the coming year and that God blesses you abundantly with all you need throughout 2022 – a new year of new opportunities for growth within ourselves, in our relationships with one another, and with God who continues to make his home among us in the messiness of our lives.

MESSAGE FROM FR TAO PHAM

My dear Parishioners of St Mary's, St Peter's, Sacred Heart's and St Thomas the Apostle Parishes,

Perhaps many in our Parishes would be surprised not to see me in the special liturgical celebrations of this Christmas Season?

Maybe some of you have heard about my sickness due to Covid 19.

I was hospitalized in ICU (Intensive Care Unit) last Friday morning with heavy Covid-19. I was hospitalized in critical condition - the Covid virus has entered and infected my lungs and internal organs.

From last Friday morning 17th December 2021, I must use oxygen ventilator/life-support to Yesterday evening (Monday 20th December 2021). 3 days and nights I was numb in ICU bed.

Last night (Monday 20th December 2021) the doctors asked me to stop using oxygen ventilator and I am back to practice to breathe normally.

At 11:20 pm last night (Monday 20th December 2021) the doctors made a decision to move me to a new Isolation Area which is called Covid Station which is located on 8th Floor of St Vincent's hospital, Melbourne.

There are 12 Covid patients like me in this new Ward.

Maybe I must be here to treat Covid problems during the Christmas Season.

At the moment I am getting better a little bit and I am out off the critical condition and try to eat, to walk again and try go to toilet and have a shower by myself.

For me, I try my best to gain my health again because I know that all you in Australia and many people around the world are praying fervently for me to gain my life.

With my faith and absolute trust in God's mercy, I trust God to restore me soon to return to serve you in the Parishes.

Thanks to your prayers, I'm sure God will do what I ask for!

Due to my health condition now I cannot phone you and to write long essays to tell you all details. I just let you know that I have received a lot of greetings and messages for all of you during these days.

I am very sorry NOT to Reply to everyone of you.

Please kindly forgive my shortcomings at this time!

I am very appreciate that many of you wishing me the best and I am always in your thoughts, and in your prayers. Many of you wish me to be recovered as soon as possible and go home this time.

I am isolated in this Area I can't see you face to face and can't communicate by voice with you, however I have a lot of time to think about each and everyone of you.

I mise every one and each of you very much!

In this hard condition I will pray for you and your family more and more.

May the Infant Jesus, Our Lord will bless all and everyone in our Parishes in the Christmas Season and New Year ahead.

May The Lord bless all of you and give you a Wonderful, Merry Christmas and Joyful, Happy and Peaceful New Year!

MESSAGE FROM FR DIXON GEORGE

Let me begin this year my Christmas message with a beautiful story from the 2019 Christmas homily of Pope Francis. at the birth of Jesus the shepherds hurried to the stable with different gifts. Each brought what he had; some brought the fruits of their labour, others some precious item. But as they were all presenting their gifts, there was one shepherd who had nothing to give. He was extremely poor; he had no gift to present. As the others were competing to offer their gifts, he stood apart, embarrassed. At a certain point, Saint Joseph and Our Lady found it hard to receive all those gifts, especially Mary, who had to hold the baby. Seeing the shepherd with empty hands, she asked him to draw near, and she placed the baby Jesus in his arms. That shepherd, in accepting him, became aware of having received what he did not deserve, of holding in his arms the greatest gift of all time. He looked at his hands, those hands that seemed to him always empty. They had become the cradle of God. He felt himself loved and, overcoming his embarrassment, began to show Jesus to the others, for he could not keep for himself the Gift of gifts.

The Christmas Story reminds us that, whatever others may think of us, each of us is of value to God. God loves us for who we are. God values us whether we are young or old, rich or poor, famous or unheard, believers or atheists. God loves us individually, regardless of whether we are able-bodied or disabled, popular or rejected, healthy or addicted.

As Saint John Henry Newman prayed, "May each Christmas, as it comes, find us more and more like Him, who at this time became a little child for our sake, more simpleminded, more humble, more holy, more affectionate, more resigned, more happy, more full of God. May it be a time for innocence, and purity, and gentleness, and mildness, and contentment, and peace."

Christmas Message 2021

Greetings everyone!

Clearly this has been another year of struggle for so many. Our on again - off again lockdowns have taken a toll. Yet, in all that difficulty, we can see the Spirit at work. Many employees who have had to work from home have found more flexible working arrangements to be immensely beneficial to their home/life balance. That's not to say that parents of school aged children and under, haven't struggled trying to balance caring for children and completing their work. I know many parents work until late at night, once the children are in bed, to meet the demands of their employed work roles – and they are exhausted.

However what I think has happened is that more than ever people have come to reorganize priorities because what was seen as important prior to COVID is no longer high on the list. Instead, time for leisure, family and rest have become our more conscious desires. This is the Spirit raising up for us what we have covered over, with excess – long work hours, material possessions, trying to please and trying to control ... all those things that we think will make us happy or secure. To be forced to relinquish those things that we thought were important opens us up to a space when we can experience peace, which is what God desires for us. This life passes and at the end of our times, we might imagine what we have appreciated more – financial success, possessions, status – or relationships.

We have also become aware of how some people have experienced greater isolation and loneliness and increased anxiety, during COVID. This includes those people who for their, or your own, reason have not been vaccinated. We are called to be healing and reconciling followers of Christ. Hence when we create division with our words and thoughts, rather than creating opportunities for healing in the world, it is very subtle because we can feel justified, but we work against God's desires for Creation. Maybe we can try to reach out and understand each other, even though we have differences. The virus of judgment and rejection and self-righteousness – which can come from either side of an argument, is just as deadly, in that when we sow seeds of division we can kill a person's spirit and we can become a divisive society.

So, with all that, may Christ's birth bring hope and peace and joy. May his humanity inspire ours; may it permeate our very beings and our greater society with compassion and love.

Thank you for all the love and support you have given me over the year.

May your Christmas be grace-filled.


We thank you all, our dear parishioners for your support for us during the year. We hope that we have been able to keep you all as informed as possible on things that are happening.


We are grateful for the care and support from our wonderful team here in the Parish Office. And for the continued support and help from our wonderful Parish Groups.

God is portrayed as a valiant liberator who champions the cause of justice and who brings a liberation that reverses history and the ways of war, power and oppression. This reversal is made more shocking by the fact that the one who is the mighty warrior and conqueror of the nations is a child. This child is the weak and voiceless one, the one who has neither power nor legal rights. God's reversal of the long-standing realities of this world is accomplished through the apparently insignificant, through the gift of this child who is given to us in the middle of the night.

Something new has happened: the age of God's fulfilment has arrived. The age of grace and fresh hope, made available to all people of good will, is an era of redemptive presence. Now all people can walk in the newness of life and grace. Yet, while this new age has begun, it is not yet fully realised. We live believing in its presence and awaiting its fulfilment. Although we are celebrating Christmas, we still await the final coming of the Lord.
