Letter to Parishioners of the Partnered Parishes of Sacred Heart, St Mary's and St Thomas the Apostle
from the Partnered Parishes Pastoral Council

Dear parishioners,

It has been seven years since our three parishes came together into a partnership, with Father Steven Rigo as Parish Priest for all three parishes. Each parish has its own special history and culture, community and ways of being. Each has a Parish Pastoral Council, responsible to its community by supporting the spiritual and personal growth of all people and building a flourishing parish.

In 2023 the Partnered Parishes Pastoral Council was formed. This occurred in recognition that *"there are matters which affect and connect the three parishes, both now and into the future"* (PPPC Rationale). *"The Council works collaboratively with the individual councils (PPCs), building strong and respectful relationships, recognising the strengths of each faith community and assisting the partnership to discern, plan and work together for the benefit of all"* (PPPC document 2023).

In this time of change and reflection in our Church, parishes are commissioned to discern their vision and mission as Christians and to build strong communities of faith and action. This work has begun in our individual parishes and in our partnership. The strengths of being in partnership have been recognised and are being developed. They include:

- The formation of a Partnered Parishes Pastoral Council.
- The Liturgy Teams working together to set themes for Advent and Lent and to plan and organise joint liturgies and activities.
- Social Justice teams working collaboratively – e.g. concerning the Referendum
- Shared formation for special ministers of Baptism, the Eucharist, Communion to the sick, readers.
- Collaborative work between the schools and between the parish offices.
- Opportunities for spiritual and personal growth – for example, various courses about the Gospels, Faith Circles, Families in Spiritual Harmony, Alpha.
- Prayer services.
- Support groups.
- Information sessions on various topics.
- Social events.
- Shared newsletter.
- Partnered Parishes Plenary Council Facilitators Group.

It is important that we now look further into the future and recognise that there are many challenges now and ahead for faith communities. We need to envision and plan for how our partnership will function and thrive in years to come. This will come about through open and collaborative work across the parishes, identifying ways in which we can maintain and build our spiritual life and the financial livelihood of our partnership. Through open and honest communication, we will enable the voices of our parishioners to be heard through the decision-making processes.

We look forward to working supportively and cooperatively with all parishioners to strengthen and enhance our partnership.

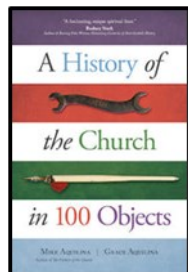

Alleluia!

Gospel Mk 5:21-43

or shorter form Mk 5:21 1-24. 35-43

Young girl, I say to you, arise.

When Jesus had crossed in the boat to the
 other side, a large crowd gathered round him
 and he stayed by the lakeside. Then one of the
 synagogue officials came up, Jairus by name,
 and seeing him, fell at his feet and pleaded
 with him earnestly, saying, 'My little daughter is
 desperately sick. Do come and lay your hands on
 her to make her better and save her life.' Jesus
 went with him and a large crowd followed him;
 they were pressing all round him.

Now there was a woman who had suffered
 from a haemorrhage for twelve years; after long
 and painful treatment under various doctors,
 she had spent all she had without being any
 the better for it, in fact, she was getting worse.
 She had heard about Jesus, and she came up
 behind him through the crowd and touched his
 cloak. 'If I can touch even his clothes,' she had
 told herself 'I will be well again.' And the source
 of the bleeding dried up instantly, and she felt
 in herself that she was cured of her complaint.
 Immediately aware that power had gone out
 from him, Jesus turned round in the crowd and
 said, 'Who touched my clothes?' His disciples
 said to him, 'You see how the crowd is pressing
 round you and yet you say, "Who touched me?"'
 But he continued to look all round to see who
 had done it. Then the woman came forward,
 frightened and trembling because she knew
 what had happened to her, and she fell at his
 feet and told him the whole truth. 'My daughter,'
 he said 'your faith has restored you to health; go
 in peace and be free from your complaint.'

While he was still speaking some people arrived
 from the house of the synagogue official to say,
 'Your daughter is dead: why put the Master to
 any further trouble?' But Jesus had overheard
 this remark of theirs and he said to the official,
 'Do not be afraid; only have faith.' And he
 allowed no one to go with him except Peter and
 James and John the brother of James. So they
 came to the official's house and Jesus noticed
 all the commotion, with people weeping and
 wailing unrestrainedly. He went in and said to
 them, 'Why all this commotion and crying? The
 child is not dead, but asleep.' But they laughed
 at him. So he turned them all out and, taking
 with him the child's father and mother and his
 own companions, he went into the place where
 the child lay. And taking the child by the hand
 he said to her, 'Talitha, kumi!' which means,
 'little girl, I tell you to get up.' The little girl got
 up at once and began to walk about, for she was
 twelve years old. At this they were overcome with
 astonishment, and he ordered them strictly not
 to let anyone know about it, and told them to
 give her something to eat.

In the gospel, Jesus reaches deep into
 the world beyond life and rescues a
 young girl from the jaws of death.
 Earlier, he was jostled by the crowd
 and felt healing power leave him in
 order to restore an afflicted woman.
 Repeating the words of last week's
 gospel: Who is this man? Is this
 someone with whom we want to
 become involved? On the other hand,
 can we afford not to get involved with
 him? This is a man who can lead us to
 life even in the midst of death. He is
 someone who is interested in the well-
 being of everyone, even those who
 may not be highly valued by society –
 women and children, the chronically ill,
 those who carry the seeds of death
 within them.

God's graciousness toward us should
 prompt us to be generous toward
 others. What we receive as life-
 enhancing gifts, we must share with
 those in need, those to whom life has
 not been kind. As we have been
 favoured by the healing touch of God,
 so we must extend that same loving
 touch to others. The love of Christ
 impels us to be openhanded as we
 approach those in need. Following
 Jesus' lead, we must not only give to
 them, we must also allow them to take
 from us. At times this will require that
 we share material resources; at other
 times it might mean that our energy
 will be drained in our service of them.
 In all of this, Jesus has set the
 example for us to follow.
